The Marion county court Tuesday signed a contract with Geo. D. Barnard & Co. of St. Louis, Mo., for a set of steel and metallic vault furniture for each, the offices of the county clerk and recorder.

An order was entered on the journal that the Salem Water company hereafter shall receive fifteen cents per 1000 gallons of water used in the court house and grounds, where less than 20,000 gallons are consumed in any calendar month, and ten cents per thousand gallons for the water used in excess of twenty thousand gallons in any one calendar month.
