

MICHIGAN'S BENEFACTOR.

The postoffice department has discontinued the free delivery service at Roseburg from and after the first of this month.

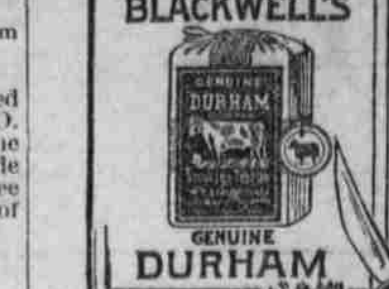
