Men here are saying that we are going to have a convention of the ablest men of the state assembled.

Col. Cooper, of McMinnville, writes that he has reports from nineteen counties that will be represented at the McMinnville state convention of the Union Bimetallic party July 9th, and that about 280 delegates will be present. It will be a large and representative convention. The ladies Bimetallic Union are preparing a big dinner for the delegates.

Politicians of a certain class have very little idea of the magnitude of this movement. The silver men are quiet but there can be found, in quarters least expected, a firm principle fixed in the minds of voters, that will show itself by investigation and be overwhelming when the votes are counted. These ballots will fall as gently as the snows fell on the brilliant army of the "Little Corsican" in his investment of Moscow, and the retreat before the storm will be as disastrous.

JACKSON COUNTY.

The county mass convention met at Medford, Saturday, with one hundred present.

M. F. Eggleston was elected chairman of the convention and C. E. Wolcott, of Medford, secretary.

The committee on order of business reported for organization by a county central committee, composed of M. F. Eggleston, J. J. Houck, of Gold Hill, H. S. Evans, of Ashland, J. B. Welch, of Sams Valley, W. M. Luckey, of Ashland, N. A. Jacobs, of Jacksonville and C. E. Wolcott of Medford.

The attendance was a representative from all parts of the county and included many of Jackson county's best citizens. Speeches were made by Gen. E. Applegate, Judge Howell, Henry Klippel and others.

General Applegate, who has been in feeble health for some time, threw in to his speech some of his old time fire and energy and gave his friends hope that he might be able later to take an active part in the campaign.

The following delegates were elected to the state union convention, to be held at McMinnville June 9:

The following resolution offered by C. E. Wolcott was adopted unanimously:

Whereas: A meeting of the independent bimetallics of Jackson county assembled in mass convention recognize in Hon. Henry M. Teller, of Colorado, a logic leader for united action in securing the remonetization of silver as standard money. Therefore, be it

Resolved: That we unanimously endorse the action of Senator Teller in leading the bolt from the recent National Republican convention because the platform adopted declared for a single gold standard, and do most heartily endorse and urge the candidacy of Senator Teller for the office of President on a Union-Bimetallic ticket.

has a clear voice and a ready delivery. Her impassioned rendition of the Jeffersonian classic held the closest attention of the immense populace and she was cheered at its close.

The choral society now sang the "Anvil Chorus" with the clanging of the blacksmith as an accompaniment, with Winkler at the piano. Heritage's chorus was not more than half represented on this occasion but threw such force and expression into this gem from the opera "Il Trovatore" that the audience went fairly wild.

NOW THE EAGLE FLEW, as for 120 years past the Americans have met to celebrate their independence and President Bloss was received with hand clapping and applause. He recited the words of Great Britain and said we still felt at times as if we'd like to whip her once more. (Laughter and Applause.) In homely and practical sentences the orator reviewed the progress and development of the century. His delivery was pleasant and often forced a smile from the reluctant stolidism that usually sits on the countenances of a Fourth of July crowd. Patriotism and humor mingled with each other in inseparable veins like the gold and silver in the mountains of Oregon—16 to 1. He thought we could whip England 16 to 1. (Laughter.)

He gracefully alluded to the admission of Utah at the exact hour of noon and won a good round of cheers. The speaker possessed the prime essentials of a good open air speaker, he was both dramatic and entertaining. Music by the three bands was announced after the applause at the close of the oration had died away. It was a fitting conclusion for so grand a program.

MIDSUMMER ENTERTAINMENT. Saturday evening was indeed a warm and sultry summer eve and the temperature in the opera house was quite tropical, but still a well-filled house witnessed the Midsummer entertainment.

The program was opened by a selection from the Alpine Quartet, who sang in their native Swiss tongue. The selection was warmly applauded.

Chas. H. Burggraf is always perfectly at home when in the role of a negro, and Saturday night was not an exception to the rule. As "Rastus White" on the issues of the day, Mr. Burggraf kept the house laughing almost continuously. The "cuddled gemman" expressed himself quite freely on the money and tariff questions and also made a few remarks on the suffrage question. He also engaged in several personalities, much to the amusement of the audience. Responding to an encore, "Rastus" recited an amusing poetic selection of his own production.

Miss Mabel Carter recited "Old Ace" upon request, and the audience showed its appreciation of the number by giving the talented young elocutionist a generous applause. It was a thrilling account of a horse race in which the prize was a handsome maiden's hand. As in a game of cards the Ace always beats the Jack, so it did in this love affair. Miss Carter will be remembered as a graduate from the college of oratory from Willamette university this year under Prof. S. N. Borwn-Savage.

Chas. D. Ford, one of Salem's accomplished vocalists, sang "If Hearts Could Only Speak" and received a hearty encore to which he responded with a second ballad. Mr. Ford possesses a rich tenor voice.

Miss Jeanette Booth recited a pretty selection but the audience was deprived of the pleasure of hearing it all, owing to the continual disturbance that took place along Court street. Miss Booth always delights an audience and has many admirers.

The Irish Sketch by R. W. Holman and C. Taylor caused considerable amusement. A great many jokes were introduced.

Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges, Salem's prima donna, was greeted with an applause when she stepped upon the platform. Mrs. Hinges sang a beautiful selection and kindly responded to a generous encore.

These numbers served as a prelude to the number which had aroused considerable interest. The burlesque, "Queen of Hearts" or Faust up to date, gave evidence of some clever work on the part of its composer, C. H. Burggraf. It was something new, and proved most enjoyable.

Mr. Burggraf, as Mephistopheles, ruler of the lower regions, carried out his part well. Miss Emma Murphy, as "Martha, Queen of Hearts," surprised her many friends. "Marguerite" found a pretty and suitable representative in Mollie Bernardi. Murray Wade, as the "Modern Faust," did exceptionally well. Messrs. C. L. Smith, C. W. Gillingham, Geo. Sanderson and R. Davis, the musical "Tups," gave several delightful selections on the banjo, mandolin, guitar, and jewsharp.

THE NATIONAL GUARD. At 7 in the evening about two thousand persons gathered on Willson park, where the Salem city council, including his honor, the mayor, reviewed companies "B" and "I," Second Regiment, O. N. G., with Lieutenant-Colonel M. W. Hunt, aide-de-camp to Governor Lord, as chief in the field and Mayor Percy Willis commanding the troops.

The band of the regiment was there and Major Willis put them through the tactics, assisted by Captains Evans and Holman and Lieutenants Leabo and Lenon. The boys deserve great credit for their fine appearance and able drills. The maneuvers consumed about an hour and adjournment was taken to the opera house.

THE PLUG COLIES. These citizens made their appearance on Commercial street about 5:30 o'clock and had everything their own way for an hour or more. The display was highly enjoyed. The procession moved north to Marion square and counter marched to the Willamette hotel. The awards of prizes were as follows:

The procession of brownies including real little Chinese boys, the queen of fairies, the Rathbone sisters, the queen of bikes, the old fire department, the Woodmen's goat with the new woman in bloomers, were all highly realistic and amusing.

THE HANDS. Never was a celebration or civic occasion better supplied with bands. The Salem military band in full uniforms, made a striking appearance—

the best our city has ever had and it completely won the hearts of our people. The Silverton Marine band also made a splendid appearance and played exceedingly well. Both that band and the Salem band would be a credit to a large city. The Dallas band in full uniform also played well and was the largest and most formidable musical organization ever turned out of Polk county. When these three bands marched and played in a body they numbered nearly a hundred men, and they played in remarkable unison.
