OREGON WILD FLOWERS.

Who goes afield now will be delighted at the wealth of Oregon wild flowers. The earlier bloomers have passed away but a second and more glorious crop spreads its beauties in meadows, forests and by the brooks. On the stoniest and driest soils are found the tar flower, the Spanish needles and French pinks. But Oregon is the home of lilies and the yellow tiger lily is in its glory, arrayed in colors of gold, orange and crimson. Candelabra lily on a single wiry stem, royal dark bell-shaped corolla, petals like molten wax and buds like glass, springs out of the heat cracked earth where grasses die. In shaded places the blue larkspur, the wild hollyhock, the columbine and camas may still be found. It is to be regretted that the children in our schools cannot be taught to know these beauties of the field and forest.

APOLOGY TO PROF. NORRIS.

A BACKWOODS REPUBLICAN. REFUGEE FOR PIGS.

One very common source of loss to pig breeders is through sows lying on their young, more especially if the sow is heavy or clumsy. The best way of guarding against such accidents is to place a rail round the pen, about eight inches from the floor and the same distance from the wall. If the sow be then bedded with a small quantity of cut straw, so that she cannot fill up the space behind the rail with her bedding, the little pigs will have a chance of running beneath and behind the rail, and so escaping being crushed against the wall by the sow. When a pig has been laid upon and is not killed outright, the best remedy we know of is hot water, used as follows: Take a pail of water as hot as ever the hand can bear, and immerse the pig in it all but its head, lifting it in and out rapidly, and allowing it to remain in a little longer each time, rubbing well afterwards with a wisp of straw till dry. We have frequently revived pigs that were apparently at their last gasp by this method.—Swine Breeder's Journal.

CO-OPERATIVE STARCH FACTORY.

Those labor exchange men of Stayton, who can, in the face of the present price of starch enter into such an enterprise as building a starch factory, have great confidence. Good authorities say there is nothing in the business, at even better prices than the present. It is to be hoped that honesty of purpose, push and enterprise of the co-operators, will surmount the difficulty and make potato culture one of the principle occupations of the farmers. In many states a bounty is paid to potato starch factories. In the co-operative factory, this would go directly to the producer instead of to some syndicate.
