WILLIAMS & ENGLAND BANK.

Receiver Paying Dividend of 38 Percent.

Receiver McNary began this morning paying 38 per cent of claims allowed by the court in the case of the Williams & England Banking Co., insolvent.

The claim of Richard Williams of \$24,380 was not allowed, but two of his items of \$319.65 were allowed. The total number of claims is 185, amount \$100,307.76. Claimants are paid in checks on the First National Bank of Salem.

The largest claims are as follows: Ladd & Bush, \$10,000; Edward C. Giltner, agent, \$25,000; F. H. Bryan, \$4000; Mrs. M. C. Penter, \$6,200; J. S. White, guardian, \$2,380; Cora L. Prescott, \$2,550; T. L. Davidson, \$10,246.67; Theo. Nolf, \$600; Jas. R. Davis, W. M., \$600; Anna Briggs, (D. C. Sherman, attorney), \$950; A. B. Buren, \$717.40; W. H. Odell, \$5,047.27; J. B. Stump, \$250,971; State Insurance Co., \$617.79; Phil Mettschan, \$789.73; Cal Jones, \$887.05; Geo. Williams, guardian, \$249.46; H. P. McNary, trustee, \$432.09; McCrow & Steusloff, \$714.09; R. M. Wade & Co., \$1,619.80; J. L. Riggs, \$684.14; Wm. Waldo, \$545.21; F. C. Perrine, \$269.33; Phil Mettschan, state treasurer, \$8,013.50; E. J. Swafford, city treasurer, \$7,349.33. The other claims are sums ranging from a few dollars up to several hundred, deposits of cash on current account and certificates of deposit. Interest is allowed on these sums up to November 14, 1895, the date of closing.

There will be no dividend declared in the affairs of the State Insurance Co. until its affairs are all settled up. It may be a year or more.

The stockholders of the bank never paid but one-half of the par value of the stock, but many of them are now insolvent. Under the Oregon law the officers and stockholders are liable only for the original stock subscribed.

The ugliest feature of the failure is still commented upon on the street—the transfer by George Williams of property at Portland worth about \$100,000 to his brother, Richard Williams, a sharp lawyer of that city. Receiver McNary still has hopes that he can pay depositors in full.

A Runaway.

A short but quite exciting runaway occurred this morning at 8:30 o'clock. Herbert Farrar, delivery boy for the Cross meat market and Fletcher Long were riding along Commercial street in the delivery cart and when opposite the brewery one of the wheels came off, precipitating the boys very suddenly to the pavement. As a result Herbert Farrar was somewhat bruised while nimble little Fletcher Long escaped without a scratch. The horse took fright and ran rapidly to State street when it ran in a westerly direction and was stopped near the engine house. No serious damage was done to the cart or harness. A team attached to a wagon and standing in front of A. Klein's shoe store became frightened and broke loose. They started down the street but were caught before they had made much headway.

MORE BASE BALL.—A team of juvenile base ballists came down from Albany this morning and are playing a match game of baseball this afternoon with a team of young Salemites. We hope the local team may make a better showing than they did in the game played on the Albany diamond.

BEATTY BOUND OVER.

But His Bond Reduced to a Nominal Sum.

Lawyer Ford did not succeed in getting Frank Beatty, of Chemawa, acquitted on preliminary trial, but he is bound over on a merely nominal bond.

Condit opened the case for the state. His main reliance was Dr. Byrd's statement; the wounds were all struck in a vital place, the throat, the heart and across the abdomen. The character of the injuries were such as to destroy the theory of self defense.

He denied that Mr. McCormack was a desperate or dangerous man. If he was Beatty sought a quarrel with him. There was no evidence that McCormack had a club when Beatty pursued him and he fell and was stabbed and slashed by Beatty. He painted Beatty a villain of the most bloodthirsty character. They had a quarrel. After Beatty was put out of Edward's house he should have gone away. McCormack tried twice to get away, he said. He said there was no evidence of self defense. He assaulted twice and should be bound over.

Lawyer Ford described Beatty's wounds to the court, and declared the defendant might have killed from concussion of the brain. Beatty was somewhat dazed when he came to the doctor's office. Such wounds frequently proved fatal.

If McCormack struck Beatty over the head once or twice, and knocked him down or dazed him by the blow, should Beatty walk off? That was not human. That was not law. That was not God's law. A man who has been wounded defends himself. That is the man who must be considered, not the cool, rational man in his right mind, but the wounded, dazed and bleeding Beatty.

McCormack followed Beatty out of the house, went between him and the gate and told Beatty to put up his knife and then took a club to him. He gave Beatty the lie, he followed Beatty out, he made the first demonstration, he made the first assault, knocked him down, and got cut. McCormack was a quarrelsome man. All the neighbors said so. His reputation was bad. He was bound to have a fight and got it. He commenced this row and ought to be held instead of Beatty.

District Attorney Hayden complimented Mr. Ford on trying the case hard. He reviewed the case of the state in a clear and logical manner. Beatty came there to have a row. He was warned away by Edwards. That was his avowed intention and he got what he came after. The testimony of Edwards was good. He was a man of good character and his testimony was not shaken. Beatty's life was no longer in danger when McCormack turned and fled and Beatty should have quit.

Beatty had gone to hunt this man for the purpose of having a row with him and he got it and should be bound over. In the Hawkin's murder trial where a man went to find another for the purpose of having a quarrel and a murder resulted the supreme court held that he was guilty of murder in the first degree. The court deemed the evidence sufficient to hold Beatty to the grand jury in the sum of \$500. The bond before had been fixed at \$1500. Mr. Beatty had no trouble in giving this bond and was released. The case now goes to the grand jury.

The Council Considers the Matter—A Gobalet Elected City Engineer.

At the regular meeting of the city council last evening the mayor and all councilmen were present.

The committee on streets reported against the claim of Mrs. Nellie J. Lottritz for damages sustained by falling through sidewalk. Adopted.

Bach & Nandestank were granted a liquor license.

The fire committee reported against the establishment of a hose station in East Salem, as petitioned for by E. C. Cross and others. Adopted.

Alderman Lamport reported a nuisance in the shape of some hogs on Front street. He also moved that the city marshal should remove said nuisance and clean all alleys in the city. Carried.

The special committee on grade of sidewalks on North Commercial street, asked further time. Adopted.

The committee on fire and water reported in the matter of buying sixteen valve gates for hydrants, reported the bid of Barr & Petzel was recommended, and upon motion the matter was referred for further investigation.

A petition from several citizens on North Commercial street, asked for grade on sidewalks and also on bridge across Mill creek. Referred to special committee of aldermen from first ward.

A petition was received, asking for repair of hydrant at the corner of High and Mill streets. Referred.

A special communication with large plots was received from J. H. Albert about the fence on his south line. He enclosed history and data to show that his fence was O. K., and protesting against the "dastardly" attempt to remove the same. Alderman Farrar suggested that a special session be held for its consideration, but the mayor thought best to proceed, so Recorder Edes read the letter. Upon motion of Alderman Murphy the matter was "referred to Volunteer Attorney Bingham." Adopted.

A communication was also received from Attorney Bingham on the matter, in which he set forth the claims opposed to Mr. Albert's line, showing from his standpoint that said fence encroached upon the street. The attorney very forcibly set forth the interests of the dear people. Both these letters contained much of a personal nature, and caused audible smiles when read.

When Mr. Bingham's letter had been read it was suggested that it might be proper to refer this to Mr. Albert, inasmuch as his letter was referred to Mr. Bingham. A motion of Mr. Holman to indefinitely postpone the matter, brought about some discussion, Mr. Murphy thought it was the duty of the council to protect the city in this matter, and said it was plain that this was a bold attempt to appropriate a street which has been traveled for twenty years. Mr. Farrar favored the motion, and made a very practical talk on the subject. He believed that there was to much personal interest in this case, and that the city had to little interest in the matter to go to law. Mr. Rigdon hoped the matter would be settled right, and objected to any action that would not be correct and final. He hoped the matter would be settled by the courts. Mr. Murphy again suggested that the city's only resource was to remove the fence and arrest the obstructor. The motion to postpone was lost.

Mr. Legg moved that the city marshal be instructed to remove the fence. Carried.

Marshal Dilley asked where he should dump the rubbish from the alleys. When told to dump where former officers had dumped, he stated that the alleys had never been officially cleaned. He also asked for authority to employ teams to haul away the filth.

On Motion of Mr. Holman, the recorder was instructed to ask for bids on city printing for one year.
