TO THE PUBLIC.

THE SCHOOL OF POLITICS.

The Herald of Utica, N. Y., prints the following: "E. Hofer, a former member of the Oregon general assembly, in a little book entitled 'The School of Politics,' discusses the evil features of our primary system and emphasizes the necessity of and suggests methods of reform. He treats his subject under three heads: First, the primary and spoils politics; second, how primaries are conducted; and third, the primary as it should be safeguarded by law. The book emphasizes the fact that a vote at the primary is of as great importance as one at an election, if good government is to be secured. The book is well worth a perusal by every voter. Notes for a Secretary to Craik.

A correspondent of the "Ohio Farmer" asks questions of Secretary Carlisle as follows:

The secretary says of the laboring man:

"Can he prosper when the fluctuations of currency are such that he cannot certainly know the value of a dollar in which his wages are paid?" Question: Was there much "fluctuation in the value" of gold and silver dollars as long as both were "standard money?"

The secretary further says: "You are asked by the advocates of free coinage to join them in destroying one-half of the purchasing power of the money in which you are paid." Question: How much difference will there be in the purchasing power of a gold or silver dollar if both are standard money?

The secretary further says: "The attempt to maintain what is called the double standard of value, that is, the attempt to keep the legal tender coins of the two metals, gold and silver, in use as money at the same time, upon a ratio of value fixed by law, has repeatedly been made by kings and parliaments in every civilized country in the world, and it has failed in every one of them." Question: Was there any such serious failures in the United States so long as "the attempt" was adhered to?

He declares in favor of the use of silver at a parity with gold. Question: How can a permanent "parity" be maintained, unless both are legally regarded as standard money, real money, money of final redemption, equally a legal tender at a "ratio fixed by law?"

He is one of those who contend that a parity can be maintained by giving the payee the option to choose which he will take; the theory has been tested by two administrations, and the secretary quotes the silver in a silver dollar at 52 cents. Question: Is he right?

He is opposed to the "coinage of silver at the public expense." Question: Does he or anybody else oppose the coinage of gold at said expense?

He virtually insists that "every obligation recognized by the laws of the land" ought to be paid in dollars "intrinsically" worth 100 cents each. He also explains to us that we have 620 millions of the 100 cent dollars, 413 millions of the "52 cent dollars" of course, the "intrinsic" value of the paper in the paper dollar is too insignificant to be quoted. He also explains that certain corporations are indebted to certain people more

than 164 billions. Now add to this sum all the other "obligations recognized by the laws of the land." Question: About how many billions are there of said obligations, all told, and what per cent of them will about 826 billions pay? About how much other money can be maintained at a parity on a 620-million gold basis? E. P. P.

BRYAN'S GREAT SPEECH.

Synopsis of the Eloquent Nebraskan's Talk.

CHICAGO, July 10.—The sensational event of today's proceeding was the speech of Bryan of Nebraska, in favor of the majority report on the platform. Even the attention given Hill and Tillman did not equal the breathless eagerness with which thousands peered forward to watch the first sentences of this young man, whom many Westerners consider their foremost orator.

They were not disappointed. He spoke depreciatingly of himself, "but," he added, "the humblest citizen in the land, when clad in the armor of righteousness, is stronger than all the hosts of error." This struck the keynote which sounded to the rafters. Thereafter the silverites sent up yell after yell after each striking period.

The cause of silver, he declared, was the cause of liberty and humanity. "Therefore he deprecated any denunciation of President Cleveland, because the issue was not to be brought down to the level of personality. To the complaint of the east that the silver men would not discuss the question, he replied that the convention was assembled merely to render their judgment by order of the plain people, but the greatest of all was the enthusiasm stirred by his comparisons of the business man down a thousand feet into a mine and him who in a back room counted the money of the world.

"We are fighting in defense of our homes, our firesides and our families," proceeded Bryan as the assemblage rose for another wild demonstration. "Our petitions have been scorned, but now we have no petition to offer for we are strong in our right and defy them. They ask if Robespierre will arise. No, instead of that the people need an Andrew Jackson to do, as Jackson did, in resisting the encroachments against the people.

Turning his attention to the income tax, Bryan declared it was not unconstitutional until one of the judges had changed his mind, and the great economic principles of the income tax could not rest upon the change of mind, of any single judge. Concerning the banks, he said, they claimed the government should go out of the banking business, but he answered with Jefferson, the banks should go out of the governing business. The speaker paused a moment as if to close, when all sides shouted "go on, go on."

"The Republicans nominated at St. Louis William McKinley, of Ohio," Bryan continued, "he is a man who used to boast that he looked like Napoleon." There was a half minute of laughter, when the speaker continued, "yes they nominated him on the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo, and already we can hear with distinctness, the waves beating on the shores of St. Helena." [Great applause.] The American nation, he said, was about to legislate without the advice of any other nation on the globe.

The American nation was able to legislate on every question without the aid on any other nation. On such an issue, made in this platform, the Democratic party could not carry a single state in this union. He would not, he said, slander the great states of Massachusetts or New York, by saying that on such an issue they would declare the helpless impotence of the merciless domination of power in the past and added, "but I warn them they shall not crucify the Democratic party on the cross of gold."

The conclusion of Bryan's speech was marked by the most enthusiastic demonstration of the convention up to that time. The whole convention sprang to its feet and 20,000 throats roared while twice twenty thousand arms waved frantically. Handkerchiefs and flags flew wildly. Hats were hurled aloft and umbrellas were waved. Men shouted like maniacs, and from every quarter of the hall came a hoarse roar.

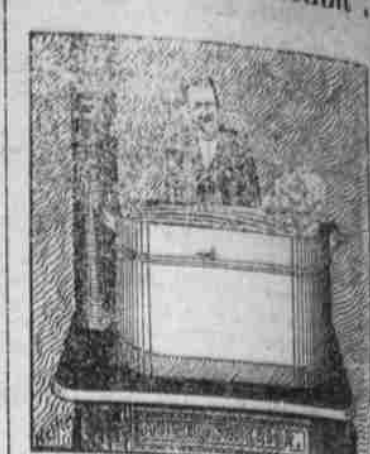
