That committee appointed by the Salem Republican club to revise the lists of the club and strike off silver members met and decided not to strike off a name.

The Democratic convention met to select the strongest candidate the party could present. There is no questioning the judgment of the convention. To the credit of Mr. Bryan let it be said that he had no managers grooming him for the nomination.

Governor Boies, of Iowa, says: "I think it the very strongest ticket that could be made for the doubtful states in the Northwest, which are Kansas and Nebraska, and both the Dakotas, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana and Michigan, with probably Wisconsin added."

BASE BALL NEWS - The Albany Colts defeated the Portland Monograms in a game of base ball Saturday afternoon with a score of 21 to 10 in their favor. It is hard to tell which team will be given the credit since protests are filed on each side. However, the playing of the Albany team was far superior to that of the Portland team. Fleming as pitcher for the Albany team did remarkably good work and supported as he was by such an excellent company of players, much was accomplished. Sunday morning the Portland Monograms and the Astorians played a game that resulted in victory for the Monograms with a score of 32 to 12. Thus it will be seen the Albany Colts will represent Oregon in the baseball tournament with the California teams - provided protests that have been filed against members of that team cannot be proven. It is claimed that several of the members of the Albany team are above the age of 18 years and 6 months. The protests have been forwarded to San Francisco where they will be considered.

REVEALED BY POST MORTEM - A great many will remember of the death of J. W. Jones at Jefferson last week. Concerning a post mortem examination held over the remains, the Jefferson Review contains the following: A post mortem held by Drs. J. N. and J. C. Smith and W. C. Hawk on Thursday revealed a curious fact. The heart of Mr. Jones was on the right side of the body, the liver on the left side, the internal organs were completely transposed, what should have been on the right side was on the left, and vice versa. Such a case is new to the medical world.
