Populists and Silver Men All Endorsing Bryan.

N. Y. GOLD DEMOCRATS.

Eckels' Wants Another Ticket In the Field.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 16.—The headquarters of the national committee is beginning to show signs that the convention will soon meet.

Ex-Governor Waite, of Colorado, who will head a contesting delegation from that state, is out for endorsing Bryan and Sewall.

In discussing the probable action of the Populist convention in the matter of endorsing Bryan for president, J. Flynn, who is a delegate-at-large to the American bimetallic convention from California, and editor of the Populist, of San Francisco, said:

TOPEKA, Kans., July 16.—The state silver convention met at 2 o'clock today. Of those present, at least three-fourths have been prominently identified with the Republican party.

Silver leaders are elated over the arrival of John R. Foster, president of the First National bank of Garnet, a Republican, at the head of the Anderson county delegation.

WAS TIRED OF LIFE.

A Portland Man's Unsuccessful Attempt at Suicide.

HAD it not been for interference of several bystanders at the O. R. & N. Co.'s dock this morning, a suicide might have taken place.

About 10:30 o'clock a Portland traveling man, known as "French Louis," walked onto the lower deck of the steamer Elmore, which was laying at the dock taking on freight and passengers preparatory to going to Portland.

The man arose to his feet, brushed his clothes and walked from the boat onto the deck. The fireman determined to keep his eye on the man who seemed bound to end his life.
