COURT HOUSE NEWS.

County Experts Still at Work—Court Adjourns.

The board of experts who have been examining the books of the county treasurer have nearly closed their work and will report to the court in a few days, or as soon as certain duplicate vouchers can be obtained from school clerks and other sources, to verify the accounts.

Work was begun on the books of the county clerk this afternoon and the experts will push the job of the other offices as fast as they can.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Dept. No. 1 Geo. H. Burnett, judge, adjourned this morning sine die.

The judge has rendered a decision in favor of defendant in the case of the Silverton Loan and Investment Co. vs. J. E. Hammond, tried before him at the last term of court for Marion county. He gave plaintiff's attorneys twenty days in which to prepare an appeal to the supreme court.

The complaint in a suit, instituted by the Capital Lumbering Co. vs. Sarah T. Learned and J. B. Stump, was filed with the county clerk yesterday. It is an action to recover on a bond to the amount of \$304.40 and arises out of an action for \$388 or more brought by plaintiff against N. M. Learned on January 29 of the current year. In the course of this latter case Sheriff Knight attached some calves and other live stock and property of Learned and held them.

A few weeks later plaintiff obtained judgment against Learned for the amount heretofore mentioned. A writ of execution was issued to the sheriff directing him to sell the attached property at public sale on the 27th of February, but on the 26th Sarah T. Learned instituted an action in replevin against Mr. Knight for the property mentioned. An undertaking for the recovery of said property was executed by Mrs. Learned, with J. B. Stump as surety, to A. M. Clough the corner, the amount of the bond being \$370. Mr. Clough took the property from the sheriff and delivered it to Mrs. Learned and she has been ever since in possession of it. Mrs. Learned was beaten in her suit against Mr. Knight, but has not returned the property or paid the value thereof or any part of the costs and disbursements of the suit and Mr. Knight claims damages in the sum of \$204.40. Mr. Knight transferred to the Capital Lumbering Co., his judgment and the undertaking for the return of the property and his claim for damages against Mrs. Learned and Mr. Stump.

ANNIVERSARY EXERCISES.—The exercises held at the state house last evening in honor of Robert Burns, the Scottish poet, were well attended.

Prof. J. B. Horner of the Agricultural college at Corvallis, was introduced by Hon. John Minto. The Corvallis gentleman gave an excellent biographical sketch of Burns, which was made more interesting by water-color illustrations. Mrs. H. B. Holland sang "Coming Thro' the Rye," and H. G. Kundret sang "Annie Laurie," each performer kindly responding to an encore. Hon. John Minto also participated in the program by singing some Scotch ballads and also giving a recitation. Hon. T. W. Davenport read "Tom O'Shanter" very acceptably. The exercises closed with "Auld Lang Syne," led by Prof. Heritage.

WILL LOOK AFTER HIS CLAIM.—B. B. Cronk, the well known blacksmith, left this morning for his ranch at Oak Point, Washington. Mr. Cronk has a timber claim, of 160 acres, in that part of the state and it abounds in heavy timber, which is quite valuable. Recently Mr. Cronk has been informed that parties have been cutting timber rather close to his land, and he goes to look after his property.

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AT WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY.

The 1895-6 Catalogue Published and Ready for Distribution.

The Willamette University catalogue for 1895-6 has been issued and copies may be secured by those wishing them, by calling on or addressing the president. The catalogue contains over 100 pages of interesting information concerning this pioneer educational institution and is worthy of the most diligent perusal of any one who expects to attend college next year.

The following items are taken from the calendar.

September 15, the first term begins.

September 21, Theological and Law departments open.

September 24, Medical department opens.

November 23, Second term begins.

February 8, Third term begins.

Vacations. One week Christmas and all legal holidays.

The faculty of last year was re-elected, without an exception, and the work will continue with even more enthusiasm.

The following is taken from the catalogue concerning the Oregon institute:

"The reinstatement this year, of the old name 'Oregon Institute' to designate the 'University Academy,' recalls the fact that the Oregon Institute preceded Willamette University and was the stock upon which the later and larger growth was grafted.

The Oregon Institute was conceived on board the good ship 'Lausanne,' the Mayflower of Oregon Puritanism, October 25, 1839, upon the Atlantic ocean. Jason Lee said, 'We will have our century on shipboard and apply the fund to the starting of a school in the Willamette valley.' The fund raised on that memorable occasion amounted to \$650. The missionaries, out of their poverty, bequeathed in their self-sacrificing act and in their unselfish lives a priceless heritage to posterity. The Oregon Institute never had by succession or otherwise any connection with the 'Manual Labor School' connected with the Oregon Mission for the education and Christianization of Indian children, and established in 1845-5. The Oregon Institute was designed for the education of white children, Miss Chloe A. Clark coming expressly for that purpose. The first session began in October, 1844, under a constitution and by-laws adopted March 15, 1842. This delay of three years before opening the school was due to the sale of the buildings just erected, and before occupancy and to the purchase of the new Mission school building from the Missionary society together with the lands included in the present university campus—a most fortunate delay when we consider the advantage of the present location and its influence in successfully evolving the idea of its far-seeing founders.

A new method of grading has been adopted by the university. The manner of reckoning credits is to count as one credit a recitation occurring once a week for a year; a study reciting three times a week for a year will count as three credits. The number of credits required to be earned before graduation in any university will depend upon its system of reckoning the credits to be allowed to any study.

Three more chairs in the medical department have been filled; O. D. Butler, M. D., professor of Obstetrics; J. L. Hill, M. D., of Albany, professor of genito-urinary diseases, syphilology and diseases of rectum; L. L. Rowland, M. D., F. R. S., Emeritus professor of physiology, will lecture on special subjects. Salem now has a well-equipped hospital that is at the disposal of the medical students. Several complaints have recently been made concerning the careless manner in which the dissecting room of this department has been attended to. It is reported the building is not kept locked up, while within are to be found not only skeletons but partly-dissected bodies. We hope any further such complaints will not be necessary.

The enrollment at the university last year in the literary department was nearly 200, while the total enrollment of the school in its different departments nearly reached the 500 mark. The prospects for a large attendance during the coming school year are thought to be quite flattering.

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CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Regular Session Work Closed Up in a Hurry.

At the regular meeting of the City Council last evening Mayor Gateh Councilmen Lampert, Smith, Holman, Murphy, Rigdon and Legg were present.

The application of O. E. Dageny for a liquor license was referred to committee on licenses.

Recorder Edes stated to the city council that the annual dog licenses were due and asked that a dog pound be provided. Referred to committee on licenses.

The committee on health and police recommended that the marshal and policemen have a month's vacation to

be divided among them. On motion granted.

Bids were received from the State and Journal for city printing. Referred to committee on printing.

The city hall committee recommended payment of \$1100 to Hutchins & Southwick for labor and material, and \$25 to W. D. Pugh for services, allowed.

Marshal Dilley reported that he had been enjoined from removing the celebrated fence on Mission street.

A remonstrance from J. M. Payne, T. J. Cherrington, Mark Skiff and Ben Forstner, that the North Commercial street sidewalk grades be not changed as per petition presented July 7; was referred to the aldermen of the first ward.

Mr. Holman moved that the architect be instructed to draw up plans and specifications for city hall walks, grates, etc., receive bids for same and submit to next meeting of the council. Adopted.

An ordinance changing salary of street commissioner and engineer to \$600 per year was read the first and second times. Referred.

Mr. Rigdon moved that the ordinance for a vacation of a portion of Chemeketa street (the Osborn property) be taken from the committee on streets and placed on its passage. Passed by unanimous vote.

Chairman Rigdon of the committee on streets stated that he had had a conference with the county judges of Polk and Marion county in regard to improving, repairing and painting the Willamette bridge. The two judges were favorable to having each county bear one-third of the expense, and asked that the city bear the other one-third of the expense.

Mr. Murphy spoke on the subject and suggested that the mayor and committee on streets consult the courts with a view to placing less of the cost on Salem. Fire Chief Hutton, who was a councilman at the time the bridge was built, stated that when Salem paid \$20,000 on the bridge the city was to be relieved from all expense of keeping up repairs.
