GOSSIP BY THE WAYSIDE.

Letter from a Traveling Scribe Eastward Bound.

ON THE TRAIN FOR ST. LOUIS, July 20, 1896.

There is a great deal of plowing going on in North Dakota, and altogether the country presents a beautiful and inviting appearance of abundant verdure, thrifty herds of cattle, and immense fields of grain. I should think there would be about a half crop of grain. It is all headed out but short in the straw, which will make it very hard to harvest where there are any Russian thistles. Many fields are headed out less than a foot high. But even a half crop of fair quality means immense wealth for Dakota. With abundant grass and hay, plenty of potatoes and good gardens there are good times ahead for the Dakotans. Who can find perfection anywhere? We find complaints at our Willamette valley, although it is a world-beater.

At Valley City, North Dakota, on the Cheyenne river, I found fairly good crops, a great increase in hogs and cattle compared to two years ago when I was out here. There are some fields that are bare, but most show a fine color and stand. There are no Russian thistles here, but some reported in other directions. There is fine elm, ash and oak timber along this river, which empties into the Red River of the North. We saw beautiful groves far away on the curves of the river, and with the rolling hills this is one of the most satisfactory parts of North Dakota. A man at the station said 75 per cent of the voters were for silver.

Casselton, North Dakota: Crops very good. Three free coinage men where there used to be one.

Detroit, Minnesota: Crops very poor, wheat badly burned and rusty, much in need of rain. One man said politics was all one way—McKinley. He told me this alone. A few minutes later I asked another man wearing a copper button. He said: I will have to answer you in the Irishman's prayer. He prayed God to "bless this mixed-up mucked-up people, for God only knows where we're at."

As we got into central Minnesota, we found crops short and badly burned.

Anyone who doubts that the United States is a homogeneous nation of people should take a trip from Salem to St. Louis and talk to the people along the road. There is not only the same language, dress, food and houses, but the same set of ideas, the same phrases of expression, the same mold of thought and the same vocabulary. Everywhere the term Populist is considered by a certain class an opprobrious epithet. Indeed, a great many Populists treat themselves as a joke and expect others to do so. The Cleveland administration is usually spoken of with a sneer and there is no enthusiasm over Republicanism. The time is ripe for a new Union party with bimetalism as a platform. I do not mean the long-to-be deferred banker's international bimetalism, but big two-l bimetalism, immediate independent bimetalism. Just as the northern Democrats and Whigs, the free soilers and abolitionists, the American and anti-Masonic, the cranks and creatures of political epithet of all names and nature, united in 1860 to make the great national Union Republican party, so now the issue on the money question will unite Populist, Democrat, silver Republican, greenbacker, Prohibitionist and whatnot to overthrow the old parties.

Dr. Bentley, of Bismark, is liable to be the Populist nominee for governor of North Dakota. It is conceded free silver two to one. Senator Hans-

brough is a candidate for re-election. He has always been a free coinage man. He stood up for free coinage at the St. Louis convention, made his fight, and then did not withdraw, but has been trying to swallow the gold standard platform. Now the gold men have no use for him and silver Republicans are leaving the party. Hansbrough will find himself out with his people. But he may yet take a stand. The only fear of his friends is—too late!

S. M. Owen of the Minneapolis "Farm, Stock and Home" is the Populist nominee and will be endorsed by the silver Republicans and silver Democrats. His election is almost conceded. Indeed it is impossible to see how the next congress can be otherwise than a free coinage congress two to one. Democrats who are gold standard men cannot be elected outside of New York City. The Republicans cannot elect many gold standard men. Where are the gold majorities in the next congress to come from? How will McKinley maintain the gold standard and change the tariff with the house and senate against him? Ask yourself something easy.

Japs Investigate.

SEATTLE, July 24.—Following closely in the wake of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha, which announced Seattle as its American terminus only a few days ago, comes the accredited reports to this city of another Oriental steamship line, the Toyo Kisen Kaisha, which is also seeking American connections. The party consists of Sochiro Asano, president of the company, and H. Okawa, director of the Oji paper company, near Tokio. The visitors, who represent great wealth, came to the city quietly, spent the day in making an investigation and leave this evening for Tacoma. Thence they go to Portland for a day, thence to San Francisco. From the latter point they will proceed to London and place contracts for twelve 5,000-ton vessels to be used on the line which will be run from the American terminus to Tokio and Hong Kong. The result of the investigation, while nothing definite has been announced, leads to the belief that the terminus will be either Seattle or Portland.

Drowned.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 24.—Corporal H. L. Edson, of company F, Fourteenth Infantry, and Private Charles Morris, of the band, and Laura Guard and Emma Young, two girls of this city, while out on a boating excursion on the Washougal river in this county, were all drowned near Fleming's mill, the boat upsetting in an eddy. A party has gone to the scene of the accident to recover the bodies. Corporal Edson is a brother of Colonel Edson, a prominent attorney of Seattle.

BRAINARD, Minn., July 24.—At five minutes after 1 this morning John Pryde, who murdered Andrew Peterson five months ago, was hanged in the county jail. Peterson was Pryde's friend and was murdered for \$42. Pryde, whose real name is John B. Miller, made a full confession.

There is a general misapprehension as to the nature of the silver certificate which could be easily corrected by a careful reading and consideration of the words it bears on its face. In the case of the \$5 note these are: "This certifies that there have been deposited in the treasury of the United States five silver dollars, payable to the bearer on demand." It is nothing more, therefore, than a certificate of the fact that the silver has been deposited and that the bearer of the note may have it at any time he chooses to ask for it. There is nothing on the face of the note to justify the impression that it is to be redeemed in gold, for the assurance it bears is directly to the contrary.

OBJECT LESSONS IN SILVER.

W. H. Sebastian Tells of Progress in Mexico.

LOS ANGELES, July 24.—W. H. Sebastian, general manager for W. J. Brandenstein & Co., tea importers of San Francisco, has just returned from an extended trip through Mexico. One result of his trip was to convert him from an ardent gold man to an advocate of silver. In connection with his change of mind on financial matters, he said:

"When I went out on this trip I was a full-fledged gold bug, but have returned a free silver man. I found Mexico one of the most prosperous countries in the world. Old adobes that have stood for 100 years and over are being torn down and in their place are being erected magnificent business blocks. They are doing little if any trade with Europe for the reason that they are manufacturing everything they need. The only thing you can sell them is teas, matting and Japan silks, and in a short time they will be manufacturing the two latter articles."

"Eastern capital is being invested in Mexico with good results. I found several Eastern capitalists who also went to Mexico as gold bugs, but changed their opinion as to free silver. Why, free silver I consider one of the best protection arguments that can be brought out. If free silver has done so much for Mexico, which it undoubtedly has, it is good enough for this country. I could relate numerous incidents of Mexico's progress during the past four years that would surprise the American people. In one city alone during the past four years there have been fifteen factories built and they are doubling their dividends every year. The Mexican central is making more money than any railroad in the United States of its size."
