ACCIDENT WITH A TANDEM.

T. C. Smith Jr., and B. H. Wagner

Severely Bruised.

Last evening about 7 o'clock oc-
curred an accident that fortunately
did not result fatally. Dr. T. C.
Smith and Basil H. Wagner were
riding along State street on a tandem
at a very high rate of speed, when,
at the intersection of State and Church
streets, the fork of the front wheel
broke and the two riders were thrown
violently onto the hard roadway. The
faces of the young gentlemen were
badly lacerated, considerable skin be-
ing lost in the encounter with the
roadway.

The unfortunate wheelmen were
picked up at once, placed aboard a car
and taken to Dr. T. C. Smith's dental
office in the Patton block where their
bruises were attended to. Mr. Wagne-
r did not regain consciousness for
over an hour after the accident.

The wheel, a Crescent, is certainly
not a credit to the firm manufacturing
it.

HORSE STEALING CASE.—James
Rich was brought up from Oregon
City last evening and placed in the
county jail on a charge of horse steal-
ing filed against him by one McNeil,
residing near Salem. Rich was ar-
raigned before Justice H. A. Johnson
this morning and plead "not guilty."
Saturday morning at 9 o'clock was
the hour set for trial. W. H. Holmes
will defend Mr. Rich.

pointment by his excellency to fill the
vacancy. Upon the formation of

IN THE POLICE COURT

Brown's Case Taken Under
Advisement.

CHARGE AGAINST M'DOWELL.

Being Tried Before Recorder Edes
This Afternoon.

City Recorder Edes' court room was
crowded before 3 o'clock, Thursday
afternoon, at which time began the
trial of Ed Brown, of East Salem,
charged with the larceny of a steer,
the property of George Frendrich,
District Attorney S. L. Hayden as-
sisted by John H. McNary conducted
the prosecution. Attorney W. H.
Holmes appearing for the defendant.
Before opening the trial Recorder
Edes ordered all witnesses and also
those under age to leave the room,
thereby making room for the older
parties present.

The hide of the steer, the owner-
ship of which was the important
question to be decided, was the sub-
ject of considerable wit and humor
at the hands of the counsel, who fre-
quently alluded to the odor of the at-
mosphere of the room while the hide
remained therein.

The prosecution opened the case by
calling on Geo Frendrich as its first
witness. Mr. Frendrich has been in
butcher business for 16 years. On the
evening of August 3, the witness
stated that he had in his pasture
eight head of cattle. The next morn-
ing one had disappeared and the gate
which was closed, and securely fast-
ened the night before, was wide open.
The witness then stated when and
where he found the head and hide of
the animal which he positively iden-
tified as those of his steer. He then
gave a description of the beef with re-
gard to color, age and weight and was
dismissed to be recalled later.

Dave Richards, an itinerant meat
seller, who purchased one half of the
beef, was next called by the prosecu-
tion. He told of hauling the beef
from the slaughter house to Brown's
meat market. In the cross examina-
tion the witness stated that he hauled
the meat Tuesday morning about 6
a. m. assisted by the defendant
(Brown). Beef had been butchered
in usual manner. The prosecution
then ascertained by inquiry of the
witness that beef had been killed
during the early part of the night.
Mr. Richards stated that he had
made arrangement with McDowell
Monday forenoon whereby he was to
be furnished one-half of a beef on the
following morning. To questions
asked of him by Attorney Holmes,
for the defense, Richards stated that
the beef was not cold when he ar-
rived at slaughter house. Takes a
beef more than a night to cool off,
although it depends considerably
upon the weather and the size of the
beef.

Salmon P. Brown, father of the de-
fendant, was next called. When
asked by District Attorney Hayden
if the defendant was his son, Mr.
Brown caused an outburst of laughter
by his answer "I think he is." Mr.
Brown stated that himself and son
were engaged in the butcher business;
that they frequently received hides in
sacks in which condition they were
disposed of to a hide buyer. The
witness stated the hide was in pos-
session of the police. In the cross-
examination the witness stated again
that it was the usual way they re-
ceived hides.

At this point the prosecution wished
the hide brought into the court room
which was done so by an expressman.
The presence of the hide was very
evident from the atmosphere that pre-
vailed in the court room.

Geo. Frendrich was recalled, and
positively identified the hide as that
of his steer.

Wenkle, an employee of Frendrich,
was next called by the prosecution.
He also identified the hide and stated
that he had fed the steer in question,
on Monday evening, and that on the
following morning it had disappeared.

Frendrich recalled and stated for the
prosecution that the animal was a
steer. Cross-examined by Holmes, the
witness stated that he purchased
eight head of cattle of Stelwer, three
of which he had since killed. The
cattle got out of the pasture between
9 p. m. and 5 a. m. Found four about
6 a. m. near Yew Park school in pos-

session of a policeman. Drove them
back to pasture. Saw two heads next
evening and identified one with
white spot on forehead as that of the
missing steer.

Mr. Wenkle was recalled and was
cross-examined by Holmes. Mr.
Wenkle drove the cattle from Stel-
wer's place to Salem and had since
had charge of them. They escaped
from the pasture Monday night and he
assisted in bringing them back Tues-
day morning. There was no marks to
go by, but the witness was just swear-
ing to the identity of the animal from
its general appearance. There had
never been any marks on head at any
time.

D. W. Gibson, city policeman, was
called and related conversation had
between himself and Brown, the de-
fendant on Tuesday evening, con-
cerning the beef. In the cross-
examination Mr. Gibson stated that
he did not inform Mr. Brown that he
was an officer. Witness then stated
he did not have a warrant for anyone.
The state rested its case.

The defense opened its side by call-
ing on the defendant for the first
witness, a synopsis of whose testi-
mony is given below: McDowell and
myself started from McDowell's house
near the Yew Park school house for
beef. We started for McDowell's
pasture where there were several head
of cattle but McDowell thought it
would be difficult to catch one of
the animals since the pasture
abounded in very dense brush. We
at once returned to Salem and left for
W. T. Ramsden's 7 miles east of Sa-
lem. We secured the beef and
brought it to McCrows & Steusloff's
slaughter house. McDowell had
made arrangements to furnish Rich-
ards with one-half of a beef and I was
to take other half. Richards and my-
self went to slaughter house early
Tuesday morning. McDowell left \$12
at shop and father and myself paid
\$18 for steer on Monday. Did not see
Ramsden when we got steer. Animal
had no ear marks, white spot on
forehead the shape of a heart. I
butcher whenever I get a beef. Some-
times McCrows & Steusloffs and some-
times at Frendrichs, whichever is the
more easily reached.

The witness then related how he
skinned the beef after his usual
custom.

"Did not know Diley or Gibson
when they called Tuesday evening.
Thought they were inquiring into my
private business affairs which I
thought none of their business and so
I cut my answers short. Heard of
Fendrich's cattle getting loose Wed-
nesday.

Cross examined:—Steer was red
with exception of forehead and flanks
which were white. Left Salem for
steer about 5 p. m. Arrived at pasture
at 6:30, found animal at once and had
no trouble bringing him to Salem, ar-
riving here about 8 p. m., killed the
animal between 9 and 10 o'clock.
When we reached slaughter house
steer was very warm and we thought
we would allow it to cool off, so we
went to South Salem to look at a cow
but the owner was not at home and
we at once returned to slaughter
house, stopping at a store and pur-
chasing some candles."

The witness related how the animal
was killed and what disposition
was made of the head, ears and feet of
the beef.

"My object in skinning so much of
the animal's head was to get as much
hide as possible. Since both of my
horses were not at home I was obliged
to have Richards haul the beef to
town for me. I rode a white horse
and McDowell a bay. It is always
my way of skinning a beef. We did
not weigh the animal at all, but
bought it on sight paying \$18 there-
for."

Mr. McDowell was the next witness
called and related the same story as
did Brown. Their testimony did not
differ in the least. The witness ac-
knowledgeed that he told Chief Diley
that the animal they killed was pur-
chased near Waterloo, thinking it
none of his business.

W. T. Ramsden testified that Brown
and McDowell purchased the animal
of him. He recognized the head of the
animal by its peculiar horns. E. C.
Cross, Mr. Morris, and F. Steusloff, who
have been butchers and cattle buyers
ranging from 16 to 26 years each, were
called by the defense and stated that
the hide and horns of a slaughtered
animal were the best means of iden-
tification.

Frank Smith, an employee of McCrow
& Steusloff, stated that Brown had ac-
cess to their slaughter house at any
time.

The closing arguments were made
by the respective counsel before Re-

corder Edes commencing at 9 o'clock
this morning. The case is being
hotly contested and while the ap-
pearances are rather unfavorable for
Brown, yet the testimony of both de-
fendant and McDowell coincide so ex-
actly that Mr. Brown's acquittal is
expected. Recorder Edes took the mat-
ter under advisement until 10 o'clock
Monday morning. It was arranged by
the counsel to have the charge against
McDowell tried this afternoon begin-
ning at 1 o'clock.

Shortly after 1 o'clock this after-
noon the trial of H. C. McDowell be-
gan. He retained W. H. Holmes as
counsel. A large number of witnesses
were examined, the most of whom
also gave testimony in the Brown
trial. At press hour the trial was
still in progress.

JAIL BREAK.—The same parties
who broke jail at Dallas some time
ago and returned from Seattle have
again escaped and officers were in
search in the vicinity of Salem last
night and today.

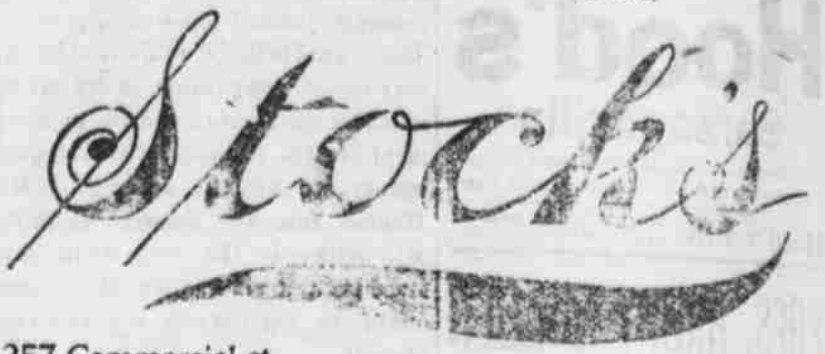
