S—Very well, then you may do so and the free and unlimited coinage act will be a dead letter on our statute books, and all the millions of dollars the gold syndicate is spending to carry this election will be lost to them and gained by the people, to whom it is paid, and the McKinley calamity howlers will be out of a job.

G—Well, well, you are determined to put me in a box either way it goes.

S—No, I don't want to put you in a box at all, I only wish to show you that if the silver owner has his silver converted into coin labor will get the first pull at it, and if he does not get it coined no harm can come from the law.

The man who works for 50 cents per day can buy more of the necessities of life at a high price than the man who has no wages at all can at any price. G—Well, well, I never saw it that way before, but I believe you are right, but do you think wages will be but 10 cents per day under free coinage?

S—No, such a supposition is foolishness. I only used 50 cents as an illustration. Whenever there is a demand for labor of the country, prices will soon adjust themselves to the condition.

G—Yes, that is so, when there is a demand for labor, prices will take of themselves. Good day, I will see you again. W. T. RIGDON.

BEGIN AT HOME.

The state asylum for the insane employs now some 130 people. They receive from \$15 to \$208 a month for their service. The average is probably \$40. The majority of the men and women giving their whole time to their work, twenty-four hours of every day. Sundays included, receive less than \$40 a month. No doubt, during these "good old Democratic times," of which we heard so much four years ago, most of these people are glad to have and keep their places. But they receive no more than they earn. Free coinage would cut down their wages one-half.—Statesman.

Our esteemed contemporary must take the employees at the asylum for inmates instead, as by its assertion it ascribes to them about as much intelligence as an idiot. If this "laboring man's friend" wants to do something for the impoverished employees of the asylum, it ought to begin at home. At the last session of the legislature, these employees asked to have a bill passed to pay them off monthly instead of leaving the money idle in the state treasury for three months. It was a just bill, and should have become a law, but when the matter was presented to a senator for introduction, he informed the committee that he would require twenty dollars in cash before he could proceed. Of course, this senator is a gold man, a lover of working people, and a great favorite of the Statesman's, but thank God, the sturdy asylum employees would not countenance such "sound money" methods. Why didn't the "organ" take up the cause of these employees at that time?

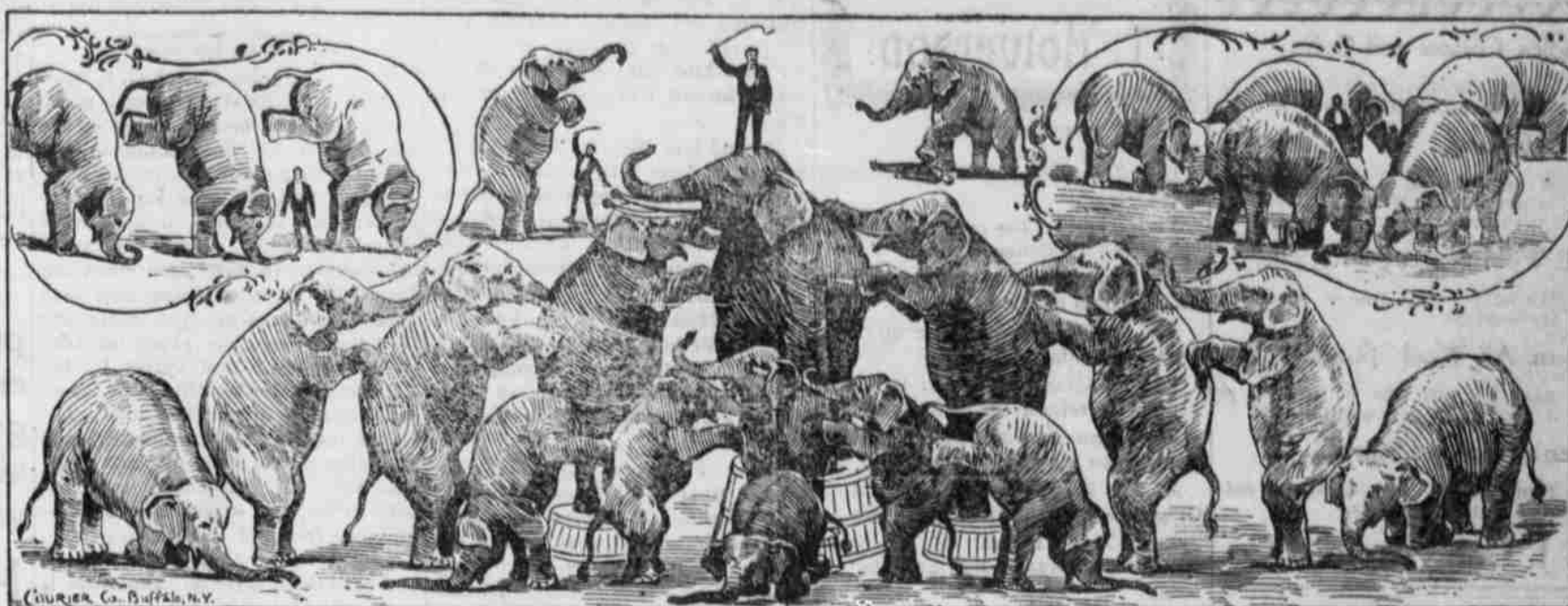

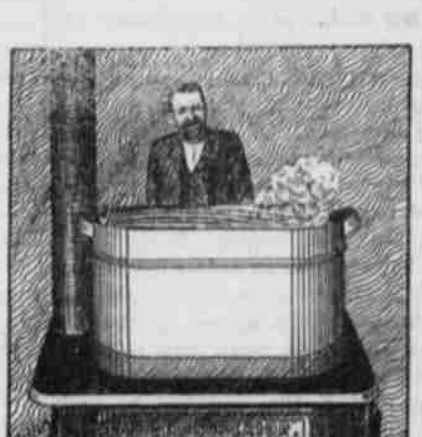
