THKEN UNDER ADVISEMENT.

Recorder Edes Will Render Decisions Monday Morning.

The case of State vs. H. C. McDowell charged with the larceny of a steer the property of George Fendrich, consumed the entire afternoon in Recorder Edes court yesterday.

About 6 o'clock an adjournment was had until this morning.

It was after 10:30 when the trial was resumed this morning. The prosecution examined an additional witness, Geo. Fendrich, after which the case was given to Recorder Edes for his decision, the usual closing arguments being dispensed with. Mr. Edes stated he would take the matter under advisement until 10 a. m. Monday when he will render a decision in the two cases, against Brown and McDowell respectively. The trial has caused considerable interest and has been very hotly contested. The result will be anxiously awaited.

COUNTY COURT MATTERS.

The Big Bridge to Be Temporarily Repaired.

The final conference yesterday between the two county courts resulted in an agreement to have the bridge temporarily repaired for the winter, with the expectation of giving it a complete overhauling, replanking and repainting next spring. It is found that the approaches are badly racked, and will require some substantial improvement. It is agreed by the two courts that this shall only be done when the city of Salem agrees to pay one-third, the two counties to each pay a similar amount.

County Treasurer Brown yesterday presented the following letter to the court:

"To the Hon. County Court of Marion County:—

"The safe which the county court has provided for the keeping of the county funds is neither burglar nor fire-proof and I don't feel like taking all of the responsibility of keeping the responsibility of keeping the funds in it or to deposit them in any bank. I would like to have the advice of the court as to where to keep the funds."

G. L. Brown."

The expression of the court was to the effect that the safe or vault was sufficiently strong to serve as a depository for the county's money and that Mr. Brown should seek the advice of his bondsmen if he desires a place of deposit outside of the court house.

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RICH IS DISCHARGED.

Evidence Not Sufficient to Bind Him Over.

The case of state vs. James Rich charged with larceny by bailee of a horse, the complaining witness being Wm. McNeil, was tried before Justice Johnson this morning commencing at 9 o'clock.

Acting Prosecuting Attorney J. H. McNary conducted the case for the state, while W. H. Holmes appeared for the defense. A large number of witnesses were examined, the testimony of whom went to show that there was no intention whatever on the part of Mr. Rich to steal the animal.

Justice Johnson, having summed up the evidence discharged the man. The evidence was not sufficient to bind the man over to the grand jury at an additional expense to the county and accordingly the defendant was ordered discharged.
