LEFT SALEM SUDDENLY.

A Heartless Husband Leaves His Family in Unpleasant Circumstances.

The majority of the residents of North Salem are justly indignant at the actions of a Salem man towards his family, who resides in that part of the city.

The husband in question was formerly engaged in the real estate and insurance business in Salem, having an office in the central part of the city. About one month since he went to Albany on some business and being absent longer than the trip necessitated, his wife followed him several days later when she found him beastly intoxicated. She returned with him to Salem where they have since lived agreeably. About ten days ago, the husband informed his wife that he had some urgent business to transact in Silverton that demanded his immediate attention. He also told her that she could visit with Portland friends in the meantime, if she so desired. The loving wife accompanied by the children went to Portland and visited about a week when she returned to Salem, expecting to find her husband at home to meet her. But there was no one at home and no information was left to inform her of the husband's whereabouts. A few days later however (about the first of this week) she received a letter from him in which he stated that in his opinion they had lived together long enough. He thought she would probably wish to keep the children and so would ask for no other disposition of them.

The loving wife was considerably affected and overcome at receiving such a message from the man whom she thought to be true to her. She was left in very unpleasant circumstances, not having a cent in the house, and three children to provide for. That she might purchase some eatables Wednesday she disposed of a flock of chickens that had been retained for family use, besides selling other effects about the place that could be disposed of.

Yesterday the woman received a letter from the man who left her so suddenly in which he stated he would return Saturday of this week and also stating that he wished to rescind all statements made in letter No. 1. His actions are certainly queer and unaccounted for to say the least.

The wife is a handsome and accomplished woman and is highly esteemed by her neighbors. By her agreeable disposition she has made hosts of intimate friends whose sympathy she has in her trouble. From what can be learned she is undoubtedly far too nice for the man who has thus sought to leave her.

A Burglary at Turner. The depot at Turner was broken into last Tuesday night and robbed. The robbery was committed between midnight and 5 o'clock. The burglars broke a small hole in one of the window panes, making it an easy matter to raise the window and effect an entrance. The mail to be forwarded on the morning overland had been tied and locked up. The bag was cut, the letters removed and at least one letter opened. Two of the letters already in the cases were opened. They then opened four express packages and a valise, taking a hat from the latter. They carried the ticket case about 100 feet from the office and burst it open, tearing up 12 tickets but taking none. They also took a watch that was in one of the rifle drawers. So far as known, the hat and watch were the only things taken.

THE STATE SEWER.—Work today began on the state sewer branch of the immense sewer that is being constructed between the asylum and the Willamette river. The branch will require an excavation about 2 feet wide and as deep as necessary to unite with the main sewer. The work of excavating began at Center street this morning in the alley between Summer and Capitol streets. Owing to the limited space in which to work, the task will not progress quite as rapidly, in proportion to the amount to be excavated, as air the main sewer. A ten-inch pipe will be laid for the exclusive use of the state capitol. The large conduit has been covered to Winter street, while it is constructed as far as Summer street, with the exception of about 100 feet between Winter and Summer streets.

A COBURG DEATH.—J. C. Alford, aged about 49 years, died at Coburg, August 27, 1896, of dropsy. Deceased leaves a wife and two daughters. One of the daughters still resides at home and the other is Mrs. Charles Goodale, of Coburg. The funeral will be held at 2 p. m. tomorrow and the remains will be interred in the Coburg L.O.O.
