TARIFF AND LABOR.

THE EDITOR OF THE JOURNAL is a Republican and a protectionist. He has been named as a Bryan Presidential elector. Mr. Bryan voted for the Wilson tariff bill. The editor is asked how he can support a Democratic revenue tariff when he is a Republican protectionist.

He believes with Senator Cameron of Pennsylvania, that silver and tariff are two sides of the same subject, and that we cannot have a true national policy without bimetalism. And therefore protection without silver is a snare and a delusion that enriches the manufacturer, robs the farmer, and does not protect labor.

Why? Because the farmer has to sell his surplus products in the foreign market in competition with silver standard countries and pay his debts in gold. We furnished \$47,000,000 silver bullion to European countries in 1895 to buy farm products at half their price, and the American farmer was to compete with them.

Unless we can restore silver under free coinage we cannot restore the prices of farm products, the farmers cannot pay interest, cannot employ labor, and cannot buy manufactured goods. If all the factories are running, they cannot employ half our laboring men and can manufacture twice as much as the farmers can buy.

What results? The unemployed laborers go to cutting down the wages of laborers that are employed and cheaper men displace old employees. The rest must be fed at the soup-houses or become tramps and prey upon the poor in the villages and suburbs.

What follows? The prices of the farmer's products are so low he cannot meet his fixed expenses and employ any labor at cash wages.

When the farmer cannot employ labor at \$15 to \$30 a month, labor is driven to the cities. The factories in the cities cannot employ half the idle labor.

How will a little higher tariff raise the price of farm products without a restoration of silver? Demonetized silver is the endless chain that is pumping the gold out of our country, the laborer out of employment, and the farmer out of business.

A little higher tariff without stopping foreign immigration, is nothing but a bonus or stimulant to bring more laborers from Europe to compete with those who are here. There is no agricultural immigration coming to our country. It is going to the silver standard countries where agricultural interests are flourishing.

We would like some of the darlings on the public payrolls who are telling the people to vote the gold standard ticket this year to know that the exports of grain and cotton from the silver standard countries are doubling while ours are falling off. Can they grasp that fact? Can they grasp any fact except protection of their salaries?

If they will show us how they are going to help the laboring man without stopping foreign immigration and putting an end to the destructive competition the farmer is subjected to by destroying silver as a measure of value we will vote for McKinley.

We will ask them what interest have the trusts and syndicates and corporations who make a profit out of foreign immigration in protecting the laboring man anyhow?

We ask the Christian men and women of our country to study this question and not sell their souls to Mark Hanna to further protect the rich and rob the laborer and producer.

Go to church tomorrow where they don't preach politics or plutocracy. The Devil was a Plute and offered our Saviour the earth. What did he say?

A NEW YORK LETTER

By a Workingman Who Heard Burke Cochran's Reply to Bryan.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22. (Correspondence to THE JOURNAL.) This evening I attended a meeting, at Madison Square, and heard Burke Cochran, a goldbug Democrat. On the evening of the speech, of William J. Bryan, our candidate, with a ticket of admission, I could not get any nearer than three blocks, of the hall, at 6 o'clock, although I went twice, with a friend, around the hall.

At 8 minutes to 8 o'clock the hall was not nearly full, some sections, of seats, having only 13 in them, as I counted and verified the count by a city editor, who wanted to know if I came to "hear" the meeting. At half past 8 o'clock, half an hour after time for the meeting to begin, the hall was not nearly full, not crowded, plenty of room and those on the stage looking like parties who had been to a horse race and bet on the wrong horse.

His speech was a rabid attack on the farmer, the wage earner, the miner and even the slave owner, before the war and after the war, at this late day. It is hereby more completely and fully summed up in the words, of two New York city dailies before the passage of the Bland bill, in 1878, and who said of the industrial distress, at that time, which was immediately relieved, by the passage of that law, and we gained more than \$200,000,000, of gold, in our markets.

First, the Democratic paper said: "The American laborer must make up his mind henceforth not to be so much better off than the European laborers. Men must be content to work for less wages. In this way the workingman will be nearer the station, in life, to which it has pleased God to call him."

Second, the Republican paper said: "There seems to be but one remedy. It is the change of ownership, of the soil, and the creation of a class of land owners, on the one hand, and tenant farmers on the other."

In 1847 and 1848 when the American ships loaded down with the products of our farms for starving Ireland, received from the homes of the farmers, who then owned all their farms, and when there were no landed tenant estates in this country as now, and still increasing, as evinced by Mr. Whitney's purchase of 7000 acres in Berkshire county, Mass., as a wedding present for his daughter, and where there is today a farm of 80 acres, with good buildings for sale for \$700, and where one hundred and forty acres was recently sold for \$1150, because the owner could not pay off a mortgage of \$550, and his income was only half that allowed a pauper and one-sixth that paid for convict labor, this home containing all buildings necessary for a happy home.

Burke Cochran said there were no mortgages on western farms, but his coat tail was pulled and the mouthpiece of Napoleon, the silent, was given notice he was getting beyond his ken, and do not these facts show that a few now of the farm mortgages remain and are not yet called in to establish this class of "land owners on the one hand and tenant farmers on the other," for the scions of this being-established class of Plutocratocracy, of this no longer, free America and republic.

Those ships coming out of the ports of this Democracy found on coming on the Irish coast that other English ships were coming out of Ireland's harbor's with, not less than \$72,000,000 of Ireland's products of the tenant farmers, so truly there was no famine in Ireland; where wheat (harvest) reaches into wheat harvest and two crops in every year, but the tenant farmer, reduced to the substance of potatoes alone for his semi-annual and continuous diet, then because, forsooth, that one crop of all the dozen others had failed, was compelled to go and lie down on the graves of his fathers and, on the soil by Ireland's laws to him entailed to give his soul to his maker and his God, unconfessed, but with the sin not upon his character, that from starving tenant's he had taken the means to sustain his lives.

James A. Garfield, speaking on this same subject, and immediately, too, after his return from England, where
