THE WORKINGMAN'S CLUB

Is Addressed by Hon. S. C. Spencer of Portland.

The Workingman's McKinley and Hobart club held a meeting at the opera house last evening when they were addressed by Hon. Schuyler C. Spencer, an attorney from Portland. The gallery was fortunately closed, and the two hundred Salenites, including about fifty ladies, were obliged to gather on the first floor making a very respectable congregation.

About 8 o'clock the speaker of the evening, accompanied by Hon. J. N. Smith, Wm. Cherrington and Richard Holman, came upon the platform when they were met by "Pres." Race, the sewer boss. Seated upon the platform besides those mentioned, were Banker E. P. McCormack, W. S. Dunniway, Hon. Jno. Minto, Rev. G. M. Irwin, and Capt. Adams, water carrier for the sewer gang.

"Pres." Race presented Mr. Dunniway, private secretary to Gov. W. P. Lord, who, in a ten minutes address, attempted to refute the statements of Garfield, Blaine, Carlisle, Voorhees and others with reference to the "crime of 1873." Mr. Dunniway labored very hard in his attempt to prove that the bill of '73 was not passed in a "stealthy and surreptitious" manner. At times he was quite vigorously applauded.

At the request of "Pres." Race, Mr. Dunniway introduced Attorney Spencer, of Portland, in a neat presentation speech.

Mr. Spencer whoever he may be, was frequently interrupted in his address by applause. He contended that it was an historic fact that protection made good times. The speaker lamented very much indeed that the Democratic national convention that met in Chicago last July, approached so closely to the "danger line of anarchy and socialism" (two opposing terms) when they denounced in their platform certain reforms attempted by President Cleveland. He also gave his explanation of bimetalism and spent considerable time in discussing the "fifty-cent dollar."

The audience seemed well pleased with the address, indicating their approval of the principles advocated by the speaker.

BISHOP DILLON HOME.

He Talks About the Heavy Crops and Politics East.

Bishop Wm. Dillon, who is in charge of all the territory west of the Rocky mountains, for the United Brethren church, arrived in the city last evening, after an absence in the east of about three months. During this time the eminent divine visited Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and the northern tier of states west. The fruit crop, especially apples, he reports unusually abundant. All crops are heavy, but some difficulty has been met in harvesting owing to the heavy late rains. Of course the prices are very low, and the farmers are correspondingly blue.

Bishop Dillon reports the chief object of attention there, as here, as centered in politics. While he is not a politician or agitator he says it is apparent on every hand that the sentiment for silver is growing everywhere. The people he says are going by land-slides from McKinley to Bryan. Republicans by thousands are asserting themselves against the gold standard. They will not endure it. Party lines he thinks were never in the history of the country so broken down as now. Indiana he feels assured will go for Bryan by fifty thousand, Illinois will also give him a majority. In the home state of McKinley much money is being used by the Hanna management, and a Herculean effort will be made to save it for the tariff Napoleon, but there are many evidences that look as though Bryan would carry it, notwithstanding this capitalistic combine against him.

In the states west of the Mississippi Bishop Dillon is confident that nothing can be done to get a state away from Bryan. In fact, the McKinley management will spend its efforts where there is better hope of success.

Bishop Dillon leaves today for Goshen, Lane county, to hold a camp meeting. From there he proceeds to California, where he holds the state conference. His work is constantly growing, and his efforts in the good work are always in the interest of the common people, which above all others accounts for his success as an organizer.
