TO BE TAKEN OFF.—It was re-
ported this morning that the Salem
local would soon be taken off its run
between this city and Portland. The
report could not be verified at the
report since the officials there are not
kept informed as to the intentions of
the railroad company from time to
time. The managers of the road re-
cently placed a low rate in effect be-
tween Salem and Portland, only \$1.50
per round trip, but they claim to have
suffered, injustice at the hands of the
traveling public, "scalping" having
been perpetrated daily. Frequently
they claim, passengers will purchase
the round trip ticket that they may
get the benefit of the low rate, and
when they reach their destination,
dispose of their return ticket at a
nominal price.

With Speeches, Declamation
and Music.

THE RATIFICATION CONTINUED

Until a Late Hour Saturday Night
at Marion Square.

After three hours solid ratifying in
the afternoon, Chairman Holmes
again wielded the gavel, for three
hours more, as master of ceremonies,
Saturday night.

As in the afternoon, a solid mass of
earnest, attentive, intelligent—almost
an entirely new audience—men and
women—many of them holding chil-
dren in their arms—many who had
stood up all the long hot afternoon—
now stood or sat through another ses-
sion of speaking, music and recita-
tions. On the platform, as in the af-
ternoon, were as many as could be
packed, while active boys climbed up
and covered the roof.

After the Second Regiment band
marched into the grounds, the chair-
man introduced Lewis J. Allen, a
Marion woodchopper, who sang an
original song—"Democrat Alley." It
was well received.

THE DECLARATION
of Independence was now hurled forth
in a spirited manner by Miss Marie
Vandersol, Salem's popular young
elocutionist. She was arrayed in
beautiful costume as a Goddess of
Liberty, with golden eagles on her
head and bosom, wreathed in jasmine.
She elicited applause time and again
for the immortal sentiments of de-
fiance sent out at Great Britain in
1776.

THE SPEECHES.
First on the program was a scholarly,
dignified and patriotic address for
Bryan and Blinettism by Col. F. V.
Drake, a Portland silver Republican
leader. He was warmly applauded as
were the excellent addresses of Jas. K.
Weatherford and M. A. Miller, of Linn
county, and Judge McFadden of Ben-
ton. THE JOURNAL will present the
speeches of these gentlemen if they
can be obtained in a few days from
the gentlemen who delivered them.

THE JOURNAL must plead its poverty
as the only excuse for not having a
short-hand reporter and printing its
own report, as the speeches certainly
merited. Equally well with the
speeches and declaration of Independ-
ence, and in fact with an ovation, was
received an original effort by Master
James Mott, a Salem boy, of whom
the entire city must feel proud—we pre-
dict he will be in great demand in
this campaign all over this state. The
Albany and Portland gentlemen pre-
sented declared they would have young
Mott before their ratification audi-
ence.

most effective manner following origi-
nal poem, from the pen of Dr. W. S.
Mott, of Salem.

THE MORE GOLD MAN.
Though hunger grow the laboring
mass,
And poverty comes thick and fast,
