A SALEM BRYAN CLUB. Steps have been taken to organize a Salem Bryan club. The undertaking is meeting with good success although this city and county are the hotbed of official Republicanism.

"Unless we can do something at this election to raise the price of farm products, how can the farmer employ labor at cash wages or buy manufactured goods freely?"

"Come up to my business place and I will show you," said the merchant. "There is John Sherman's speech. Read that. Charley come here," he said calling his clerk. "You talk to this man," The clerk got off something about Mexico.

But the question remains unanswered. The farmer must compete in the open markets of the world with his surplus crops against products bought with cheap silver bullion. The way to stop that ruinous competition is to restore silver. If not the farmer and laborer will be driven to the wall still more.

A great many farmers have not yet got their eyes open and may blindly vote for the very thing that will cut their own throats—the gold standard. How can you tariff prosperity into the demoralized wheat bins of the Oregon farmer when you force him to sell in competition with the products of the cheapest labor in the world and furnish cheap silver on top of that to cut the heart out of his profits?

THE BATTLE IN OREGON. The political fight is now fully on in Oregon. It is probable no money will be sent here from the east, but Oregon is regarded as a doubtful state in the east. In June the total silver vote on congressman was two to one for silver. On supreme judge the vote stood: Bean, Republican, 40,450; Burnett, Democrat, 18,623; Gaston, People's Party, 26,136; total opposition 44,757; opposition majority 4,307. But Judge Bean ran ahead of his ticket and Mr. Gaston ran behind; so that there is a combined vote of about 10,000 over the Republican vote. It is thought the gold Democrats will cast 3000 votes. This would leave a margin of 7000 for Bryan, and will be increased by the silver Republicans. The fight will be close with chances in favor of Bryan.

THE UNION ELECTORS. Two Peoples party, one Democrat and one silver Republican are the Oregon electors for Bryan and Watson. We print the Union electoral ticket at the head of our columns, and request all Bryan papers to copy the same. All four electors have been regularly nominated by both the Peoples and Democratic party, nominations filed and accepted. THE JOURNAL editor, whose name appears on the electoral ticket as a silver Republican, not being nominated by a state convention, must have a petition of 250 voters. In a few days over 200 voters have called and fixed their names to the petition at this office. If you are a silver man and can do so come in and sign the petition to the secretary of state. Let us make it 500.

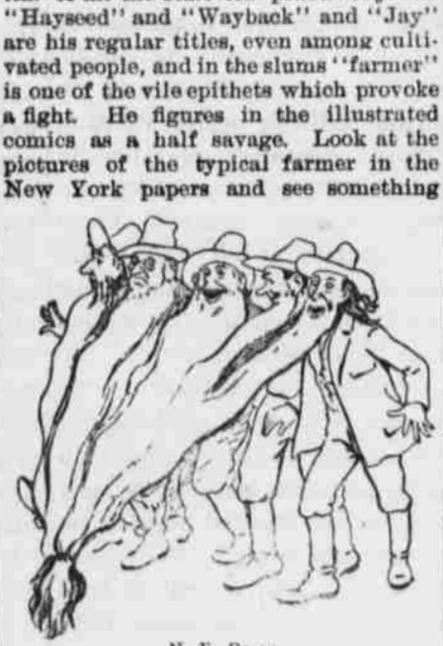
As He Was and as He Is.

A PERNICIOUS FINANCIAL POLICY. Evils of Contraction—The Concentration of Wealth—Rise and Fall of Gold—The Effect of the Free Coinage of Silver. What Gold Monometallism Stands For. An Honest Payment of Debts—The Help Offered by the Ballot.

He is the gibe and the sneer of every clown who can get on the city stage in spotted breeches. He is the butt of vile jokes in the city saloons. He shares with the mule and the mother-in-law, the plantation darky, the rusty stovepipe and the tramp as the stock material for cheap caricatures. He is brought on the stage of every low theater as the stock victim of all the stale old practical jokes. "Hayseed" and "Wayback" and "Jay" are his regular titles, even among cultivated people, and in the slums "farmer" is one of the vile epithets which provoke a fight. He figures in the illustrated comic as a half savage. Look at the pictures of the typical farmer in the New York papers and see something

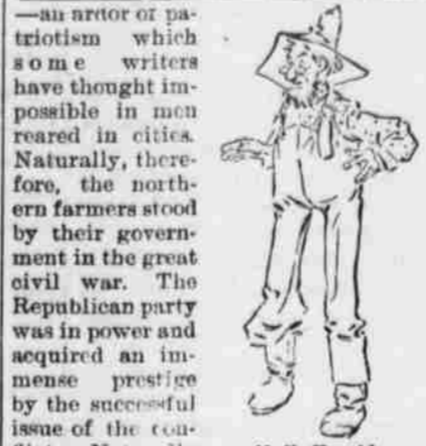
