POLITICS IN THE HOP YARD.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—I have been there four days. I saw there some of the "beautiful" results of goldbug rule.

I have seen the dire results of "reducing wages in the United States to the European plane."

We are pointed to Mexico, where the average "Greaser" gets 40 cents per day, and parched corn for food. I have seen Americans, good citizens, stout men, men with families, and single men, (some of them will vote goldbug,) working all day in the hot sun for less. They may average 40 cents per day, and the children make something.

Men take their teams and wagons, tie up their horses in the hot sun, and leave them all day, without water, while themselves and their wives, and children, pick hops for ten or twelve hours, eat a cold lunch, and go home and do up their chores and get their supper after night. Up again at 4:30 and off far the hop yard by 6 o'clock to go the same old grind for a "Greaser" wages and no parched corn. They have water furnished but not very plenty of that. There's gold standard "good times" for you. There's the goldbugs solicitude for the "American workingmen."

The people have been blinded by lies and sophistry, party prejudice and party glamour, until the present condition is reached; a few rolling in riches; the many working for "greaser" wages, to keep bread for the mouths of their children, and "pay taxes," that other men may eat cake. I am simply stating facts. Now, we have a canvass of goldbug lying; bribery; threats; bulldozing, and intimidation; ridicule, and abuse.

Have the American people lost their manhood? Can they govern themselves? They are not doing it now. They are being governed by Shyllock, Goldbug & Co. Will they change the conditions?

The money power used to flatter and cajole us. They would do anything for the dearly beloved workingman. But now they feel secure in the seat, and drive by threats and abuse, by whip and spur. Will the patient mule kick them off?

A LETTER FROM TEXAS.

DALLAS, TEXAS, Sept. 20, 1896.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—In compliance with the request you made some time ago that I should give you some facts relating to the campaign in the intermountain states, I will briefly say that in my intercourse with men in various stations of life in the states of Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado and Texas, I have been fully impressed with the belief that there is no doubt that Mr. Bryan will carry all of them with the possible exception of Wyoming. In this latter state neither the Democrats nor Populists have done much to secure the electoral vote of that state while the McKinley Republicans are working with great zeal and energy. As indicating what public sentiment is in these states I will say that while I was in Salt Lake City the Republicans held primary meetings in all the precincts of the city to elect delegates to a county convention and in that city of 80,000 people less than 200 votes were cast. A lady who lives at Idaho Springs, Colorado, and who is a keen, shrewd politician, informed your correspondent that in one city of 3,000 inhabitants there were but two McKinley voters to be found, and that in Georgetown, another city of that state, containing 1,800 people, but one McKinley man could be found when the poll was made. Her statement was verified by a Philadelphia pig iron drummer, who had visited both towns, and who himself is a very earnest McKinley man. I have talked to a dozen well-informed Texans, and they all assure me that Texas is just as safe for Bryan as Arkansas is. But I find here the same purpose on the part of railroads and other corporations to intimidate their employees into voting for McKinley as exists in Oregon. But more anon.

The Salem Statesman, commenting on the large attendance of ladies at the Bryan club rally, concludes that they were "of no palpable value to the cause represented." We believe that was a slip of the reporter, who is himself a gallant gentleman. A majority of Salem women are admirers of Wm. Jennings Bryan.

The Bryan campaign managers should send some speaker to camp on the trail of T. T. Geer in Tillamook county. His chestnuts and ignorance on the money question need only to be shown up to make votes for bimetallism. Any ordinarily intelligent man or woman can do it.

The only hopes of the goldites now rests on carrying Multnomah and Tillamook counties—one the most corrupt and the other the most difficult to reach with speakers.
