STATE NEWS.

A Bryan club at Myrtle Creek has 101.

Yon Colla has a Bryan club of 89 members.

There are 111,736 acres of tillable land in Polk county.

The gross valuation of Polk county for '96 is \$4,388,693.

The poll of the voters in the hop yard of Alex Miller one day last week for president, which resulted 55 for Bryan and 39 for McKinley.

The annual meeting of the Presbyterian synod of Oregon will be held in Union, October 8, 9, and 12, in the First Presbyterian church.

The poles for 60 miles of telegraph line are being landed at Warrenton, by the Western Union Telegraph Company, says the Astorian.

Council Bluffs, Ia., has a Bryan club of 1,200 members, and 25 per cent of them are old Republicans, who have never before voted anything else.

According to the assessors' books of Multnomah county there are 125,223 acres of tillable land and 371,391 untillable land and the total valuation of all assessables \$1,232,414.

Charles J. Bishop, of Albany, who was injured recently by an explosion in the mines at Quartzville, resulting in an almost total loss of eyesight, has brought suits for \$10,500 damages against the Lawler Mining Company.

Harvey Lockwood and "Zip" Overton, two small boys, while trawling in the Rogue river, near Wedderburn, last week, hooked and landed a 40 pound salmon. They hooked another one, which broke the line and escaped.

Mrs. Mercy Simons, who lives in Linn county, this state, has now reached the age of 103 years, having in 1893. She crossed the plains in 1853, and walked over 1000 miles of the way.

A Decided Frost

The McKinley meeting at Pendleton Thursday night was a gigantic frost. After E. L. Smith, a Republican candidate for presidential elector, had finished his speech, a wooden mule, labeled "Populist Mule," was pushed out on the platform. Simultaneously, a tremendous yell, "Hurrah for Bryan," fairly shook the building. Three-fourths of the audience, which was supposed to be composed entirely of McKinleyites, immediately rose to their feet, and repeated the yell. "Silence!" Commanded Fell, the wool man, who casts away his political opinions whenever Congressman Ellis says "Hop, Thereon." Hurrah for Bryan, "came the yell the third time, and then Fell beat a retreat. The crowd held the fort, and Fell and the other local Republican leaders sneaked out of the hall.

CONGRESS OF NATIONS

Assemble to Honor Major McKinley.

BOHEMIA, HUNGARY AND ITALY

And Many Other Nationalities, Including Americans.

CANTON, Oct. 3.—Major McKinley received delegations of all the foreign elements of Cleveland and it was a veritable congress of nations. The chairman said:

"In bringing here to this city the representatives of the various nationalities of Cleveland, we do not come as any particular class but we do come as the representatives of true and honest and loyal and faithful supporters of a great cause for a great country. And in these nationalities we have the colored people who by their patriotism and loyalty have always recognized the Republican party. We have a Polish people who by their valor and their liberty loving principles tried to be enforced in former years, have come to this country and have adopted the principles that are proper for American citizens. Then we have the Hungarians, those who fought for the old flag in the old country, and who are capable, law-abiding, industrious citizens also. Then we have with us the Bohemians, who, by their thrift, economy, and good citizenship have become known throughout this country. Then also we have the Germans—the Germans who by their intelligence and industry and independence make one of the best class of citizens. Then we also have the Italian Americans, who is here with us today, his patriotism is always manifested by his presence and his loyalty by his deeds. It is my high pleasure and privilege to introduce to Major McKinley all of these patriotic citizens of Cleveland who have come to pay you homage and respect you as the standard bearer of the Republican party. [Applause.]

W. H. Swartz spoke in response for the "Knights Hungarians."

Joseph Carabelli said for the Italians:

"The Italians for whom I speak today come to this country because their labor is better appreciated and better paid for than in Italy, and they become citizens of this great commonwealth because they believe this will be permanently true. They believe that there is no better country in the world for the laboring man to come to. You cannot make a Democrat out of an Italian this year, because they have decided opinions about free silver and free trade."

Charles Richter spoke for the Bohemians as follows:

"In behalf of 35,000 Bohemian residents of the city of Cleveland, I am here to pay respect, and to assure you of our loyalty to you as the most prominent and worthy representative of protection and sound money. Let me assure you that a majority of my countrymen can not and will not support a party which simply makes vain promises without expecting or intending to fulfill them, and which, therefore, is unworthy of our confidence."

State Senator John P. Green spoke on behalf of the Afro-Americans. He said it afforded him much pleasure to present, as the representative of his race, and to assure Major McKinley that in the present campaign as in the past the colored voters would be found with the Republican party. He spoke briefly of the race and said that at present they had no interest, no demand that was separable from that of all good citizens, no matter what their race or nationality. They feel the need of a leader tried and true, and such they have found in Major McKinley, as shown by his public and private career.

CAPTAIN E. H. BOHEM

spoke on behalf of the German-Americans. He said he had previously had the pleasures of congratulating Major McKinley on behalf of Germans, and he could only repeat what he had said

then, that the German-Americans are with Major McKinley and for him and will not cease their work till he is in the presidential chair.

BARRY G. MASON

spoke on behalf of the native born Americans. He said in substance: We come from Ohio, from Cuyahoga county, from Cleveland to assure you that we are with you, and will work to the end that you achieve a splendid victory. We have heard from the Hungarians, from the Italians, from the Bohemians, from the colored people, from the Germans. They are with us. What further assurances do we need.

MAJOR MCKINLEY'S REPLY.

Mayor McKisson and ladies and gentlemen: This is the fifteenth delegation that I have received at my home today [Cries of "good, good," and a voice, "they have not all come yet, Major."] and I want to assure you that alone have been more welcome or have given me greater encouragement than the delegation which stands before and around me now. [Applause.] It is a remarkable spectacle when the representatives of all races and nationalities, accompanied by the mayor of their city, come to testify their devotion to the country and loyalty to its honor. [Great cheering.] It is a remarkable, if not an inspiring scene to listen to their tongues than our own to praise of our land, and expressions of love for the flag of the free and home of the brave. [Great applause.] I can imagine no audience that better protests against the false and un-American doctrine of classes against the masses than this splendid audience. I welcome the first voters, the Germans, the Bohemians, the Hungarians, the Italians, the American born and naturalized citizens, every one equal in privilege and opportunity beneath the American flag. [Vociferous cheering.]
