Congress alone has the power to Jackson declared that this power could not be delegated to corporations or individuals. INCOME TAX.

Until the money question is settled we are opposed to any agitation for further changes in our tariff laws, except such as are necessary to meet the deficit in revenue caused by the ad-verse decision of the supreme court on the income tax. But for this decision by the supreme court there would be no deficit in the revenue under the law passed by a Democratic congress in strict pursuance of the uniform decisions of that court for 100 years, that court having in that decision sustained constitutional objections to its enactment which had preciously been overruled by the ablest judges who have ever sat on the bench. 
