THE LIE IN THE WINDOW.

There's a Lie in the Window, for
Thee, Brother.

Yes, several of them.

Is, there are ten silver dollars, with this in big letters—"worth \$10 because it is redeemable in gold." I quote from memory. There is no law for the redemption of silver dollars in gold. The assertion is false. They are worth \$10, because the law makes them legal money for \$10. 2d. If melted the metal is worth only \$5.30, why? Because their legal tender—money value—is destroyed. They have then only bullion value. 3d. A \$10-gold piece worth \$10. "If melted worth \$10 in any market in the world." Another falsehood.

A few weeks ago the writer with others was in front of the window discussing the statements. I said: "I admit that if the United States mint stood on the opposite corner, that the owner of the melted gold could get \$10 for it there, and for that reason he would not take less than he could get by walking across the street. Also, if we had free coinage of silver, and he could get the stamp replaced on his melted silver free, the owner of the melted silver would not take less than \$10 either, and for the very same reason, that the owner of the melted gold would not. But the mint is 600 miles away, and as a matter of fact, the melted gold is not worth \$10, even in Salem. The owner of the window asserted that it was. Will you give \$10 for it? Yes!

Where then does your profits come in, paying \$10 here, expressage to and from the mint, risks and interest, until your money returns? Here is the answer: "I will charge 5 per cent for my trouble!" That is 50 cents off. The melted gold then is worth to its owner, just \$9.50.

To this absurdity was this stalwart teacher of kindergarten finance forced and yet he contended that the melted gold was still worth \$10. But suppose it was in Alaska, where the charge for expressage, insurance, interest and brokers profits was 10 or 20 per cent. Is there a schoolboy in Salem so dull that he would not know that it would then be worth but \$8 or \$9? The statement whether made in a show window, or by eminent Republican orators, that gold, whether coined or uncoined is worth the same in any market of the world is therefore simply false. And every voter ought to know it.

There is also hanging in the window a tabulated statement of the amount of silver dollars coined at our mints since its organization. When a witness is sworn in court, he is sworn not only to "tell the truth," but "the whole truth." Half truth may be as deceptive as a falsehood. And here we have a striking example. This table gives our total coinage of silver dollars, from 1792 to 1873, at a little over eight millions. This is true of the one particular silver dollar coin. But it does not state the balance of the truth, that we coined about \$135,000,000 in half dollars, quarters, dimes and five cent pieces. Up to 1853 these contained, to the dollar, the same amount of metal as the standard dollar. And were equally with the standard dol-

lars, "a lawful tender in all payments whatever." (I quote the words of the law of 1792.) The law of 1837, which did not change the weight of the pure metal in the silver dollar, nor fractions, provided: "that dollars, half dollars and quarter dollars, dimes, and half dimes, shall be legal tenders of payments, according to their nominal value for any sums whatever." So, when the proprietor comes out and, as he did today, assert that all this other coinage was only "token money," he is simply—mistaken.

We are told by prominent Republican speakers, that the law of 1792 overvalued silver, and that it drove out all the gold. Up to 1834, we had coined of these dollar coins less than one and a half millions. Our population that year was about 14,000,000. If these assertions are true, all the gold driven out, and the fractional silver coins only "taken" money, we had only about 11 cents per capita of our own legal tender money. And this is to be a campaign of education! Clearly.

There is nothing more brainless than McKinley worship. It is not founded on faith or reason. He was accidentally chairman of a committee that reported the tariff bill named after him. He is not a great leader or statesman in any sense of the word. McKinley is an ordinary man, a political trimmer, not a man of the people who, if elected president will be a mere tool of the corporations and money power, and as helpless as the infant Moses in the bulrushes.

Bryan represents the best impulses of the common people. He is a clean Christian statesman, who grew up on the prairies of Illinois. He is a man of big brain, broad shoulders, large heart, and who has the courage of his convictions. No one will run his administration for him. It will be run for the people.

POLK AND YAMHILL.

From thirty to forty silver meetings were in progress in these two Republican counties Thursday night. The silver camp fires will blaze brightly every night until election.

Polk and Yamhill will roll up good majorities for Bryan and bimetallism. It is a union campaign, as in the days of 1860, when all the loyal elements of the North united to elect Abraham Lincoln and liberate 4,000,000 slaves. In this campaign the free men of all parties will unite for Bryan and bimetallism to resist organized wealth and the great gold trust that is just as surely enslaving the debtor classes and poorer people of our country.

Hon. Plinn Cooper, of Roseburg, and a Republican member of the legislature four years ago, has declared himself in a public letter for Bryan. Gone to join such honorable gentlemen as Hons. C. H. Baker, D. C. Baughman and M. J. Hillegas, of Lane county, says the Eugene Guard.

Hon. J. B. Montgomery, Judge E. B. Watson, Ex-Supreme Judge of Oregon, and Hon. J. A. Wright, of Union county, are the latest prominent Republicans of Oregon to declare for Bryan.

As prospects are a little chilly for Major McKinley and a cold winter approaching would it not be well for the wool growers of Salem, Hon. C. B. Moores and others, to send him another blanket.

By the way, have any of the goldbugs replied to Hon. J. B. Montgomery's article, in THE JOURNAL Tuesday? Of course, they are short of time and facts.

Hon. Wm. P. Lord, governor of Oregon, shows sense in not making any speeches.

Senator Mitchell would show more sense if he talked less.

pend rationed out to us. If we are not, then we should not have it. If we are, then how long are we to be held under obligations to a body of men for giving us a pittance of what is justly ours while they take a lion's share?

I was deeply impressed with the solicitude of the Republican party for the rank and file of comrades while I was at the encampment in St. Paul last week. I found there thousands of battle-scarred old boys who had, through the grace of corporations, rode on tickets at reduced rates. I found hundreds of other who did not have to pay so much as reduced rates. They were given free transportation. They were fitted up with elaborate head quarters. They were supplied with unlimited money with which to make themselves comfortable and to enable them to manifest their quadrennial love for the veteran. They were furnished, presumably by the national Republican committee, with floods of circulars and pamphlets to distribute among comrades talking of the honor of the country and the terrible things which threaten the country, and appealing to us to save them and thus save the country. These men were not private. They were late major-generals, generals, colonels, and other "lates" who have been retired on big salaries, and those who revel in positions and who alone have the ear of the National Republican committee. Among the headquarters I visited was where Gen. Sickles held out. How magnificent! And there I found stacks of Republican literature, telling us of our duty to the country, with a vein of inference that the Republican party was the country. These circulars tell us of the beauties of a gold standard that enables a dollar to command so much of the products of labor, etc. While contemplating the lavish expenditure of money for this Eastern literature, printed in the East, given to these "lates" to hold us in line, I could not help wondering how many Western Veterans and other Union soldier papers in the West that have stood so unselfishly and without price for the old soldier were paid for to distribute among comrades. I do not know, but take it for granted that the national committee will count these soldier papers as it does the rank and file as solid, any way.

But the woods are full of old comrades, especially in Kansas, who work in shops, on the farm and in various other vocations who are not interested in a scarce dollar that will enable "lates" and other people who do not have to toil to buy more of the products of our hands. The national committee will find that many of us can not be taught the sum and substance of patriotism through Eastern hand-bills sent out in the interest of English dollars. We think we know what patriotism is, with a definite individuality. In November it will be found that thousands of us cannot be longer held in line by a name backed only by platitudes, assumption and stereotyped promises. The old soldier is a patriot; but not on the English money plan. He is now investigating, and for once proposes to exercise his tired feeling.

While the old boys are loath to go back on Comrade McKinley, they are beginning to feel that the party has gone back on them, especially on the great mass of private who are expected to be banded like chattels by those who stand in at the money centers. Any one who has doubts of the unrest among the rank and file of veterans in Kansas is cited to the recent Bryan meeting in this city, when Judge Foster held forth. At that meeting among those on the platform were 70 old soldiers, to say nothing of the many in the audience. The fact that we can no longer be counted like chickens in the shell is also illustrated in the free silver clubs being organized all over the state, composed exclusively of old veterans.

WHAT IS POETRY?
