The Salem Statesman dare not print Bryan's financial platform.

By October 15 it will be generally admitted that Bryan's election is assured.

Wheat, wool and hops are going up! Gold coming to our country! And we're only talking about silver.

Friday Bryan travelled 525 miles and talked to 200,000 voters. But he is only a "boy orator," and "crazy."

Those little Mott boys can knock out the biggest McKinley orator they can send out before any audience in Oregon.

Bishop Bowman of the Evangelical Association tells the public that 99 percent of his denomination are for McKinley.

Evolution in Oregon politics seems to be from the silverbug into the goldbug, and from the goldbug into the doodlebug and the doodlebug don't exist.

It is a noticeable fact that the Statesman does not give the Bryan people the news about Bryan. But then that paper is not taken by Bryan people.

If the people of this state do not stand together and vote for their rights and against the combined force of the tax-eaters they will be eaten. It is a battle of self-defense.

Harrison Kincaid didn't wait for a few goldbug corporation lawyers to slap an injunction on him. He is one man that crowd can't handle or catch asleep.

Tilmon Ford of Salem, who claims to be a free silver man, is reported by telegraph as having made a speech at Independence for "a gold standard." Mr. Ford will not deny this.

In no state but Oregon is there printed a newspaper that keeps standing from day to day as "Bryan's Platform" what is not Bryan's platform. The Salem Statesman does that.

There was a Salem gold standard man seen standing on Commercial street, giving a Chinaman a dose of sound money doctrine Saturday, but the Chinaman said: "Me heep sabbee; 'Melican man no likee silver, 'Melican man damn foolsee."

The Salem Statesman still prints as "Bryan's platform" what is not Bryan's platform. It prints the McKinley platform correctly right alongside. Of course, it is afraid to allow the "silver craze" to appear on its merits.

Salem has a Bryan club of nearly 1,000 members. Out of respect for these citizens the Salem Statesman ought not print each day as "Bryan's platform" what is not Bryan's platform at all.

In its issue of October 10, "The Newsboy's Calamity Howler" of Portland brings out THE JOURNAL editor as the newsboy's candidate for president. We fear it is almost too late to make the canvass, boys. Otherwise, we would accept.

They don't allow public men to get on opposite sides of a paramount issue down south, as freely as they do in this state. In Lee county, Virginia, the voters made a goldbug congressional candidate admit at the muzzles of pistols that he had made a free silver speech two years ago.

A CAMPAIGN OF FRAUD.

C. B. Moores, ex-speaker of the legislature says in the Sunday Statesman: "We have over \$600,000,000 silver and issue paper for it and virtually redeem it with gold and so keep it going." Tilmon Ford in Coos county said he would give \$20 to any man who will show that the government has ever redeemed silver certificates in gold. When the two is mistaken on this question? The simple fact is, our silver money is neither in law or practice redeemable in gold, as has been repeatedly shown by utterances direct from the treasury department. If all the gold in our country were shipped across the ocean or sunk into the seas the silver currency and silver certificates would still circulate at par and perform their full function as money without gold redemption.

Mr. Moores and Mr. Geer are both single gold standard advocates, who do not believe in silver money at all as standard money. They are about the only real goldites at large in this campaign. Their views are the extreme goldbug views of Harvey Scott and J. N. Dolph and are the only ones of that stripe who are allowed to make speeches by Mark Hanna's chairman in Oregon—Sol Hirsch.

The rest of the speakers—men like Mitchell, Hermann, Fulton, Tongue, Ellis, Ford, and others, are all claiming to be silver men and that McKinley is a silver man and his platform a silver platform. While Bryan is making an uncompromising fight against the gold standard and tells gold standard advocates to not for him, the McKinley orators are all begging for silver votes. McKinley wants both gold votes and silver votes and his campaign in Oregon is conducted on duplicity, dishonesty and deception on this issue.

KINCAID WAS NOT SLEEPING.

In the second round of the gold standard crew to keep the Bryan electors off the Australian ballot Kincaid wins again.

No answer was filed Saturday on the trial had before Judge Hewitt at Salem. So the injunction was dropped. Injunction proceedings will now probably be begun by the McKinley aid society in each county.

The simple fact is the Portland goldbug corporation politicians were outwitted by Kincaid. He had his clerical force up all night on the last day for sending out the tickets to the county clerks and was four hours too quick for the enjoinders.

For the first time in the history of the city government of Portland the police and fire departments and other city officials have been able to get their pay checks cashed at sight. And all this under a Popocratic city government. Verily, this is a queer world. But they won't help stuff the ballot boxes for the old McKinley crowd.

To read the Oregonian, one would get the impression that only McKinley meetings were being held in Oregon. But this is not true. The State Union Bryan campaign committee under the chairmanship of John C. Young is doing effective work and hundreds of meetings are held each day and night. The Oregonian boycotts every genuine silver man in the state and boosts all the doodlebug politicians to the skies.

WHAT AILS THE STATE FAIR?

Small attendance, few exhibits, lack of interest; what ails the fair? Well, the Oregon State Fair is again given a black eye by the politicians and the Southern Pacific.

A few played-out, superannuated Salem ring politicians are looting and gutting the appropriations, employing their pets in petty places, and allowing a noble state institution to go to the dogs for want of decent business attention.

The Southern Pacific has big posters at each station for the Portland exposition but not a word for the state fair at Salem. Free tickets are given to each passenger for Portland and reduced rates, but not an inducement for Salem. A ticket from Medford to the Portland exposition costs \$8 for the round trip with three tickets to the show. A ticket from Medford to the state fair costs \$15 and no free tickets. Though it is 104 miles less distance it costs \$7 more to come to Salem and it is the same thing all over the state.

This is indecent, unAmerican discrimination against the state fair, but it is not the railroad that is entirely to blame. It is the want of spirit, enterprise, business and horse sense on the part of a few petty Salem politicians, who are willing to wreck the state fair to serve their personal interests. The people of Oregon have the usual amount of state pride, but they are cursed with too many brainless parasites, who have neither pride nor intelligence. So the fair suffers and Salem gets a black eye.

THE JOURNAL has never asked any favors of the fair management. It has never asked to have any of its people employed on its pay rolls or clerkships. It has for years helped the fair in special exhibits as the fruit palace, corn palace, dairy show, and poultry show will prove. But the truth must be told and THE JOURNAL will tell it.

A HOROLOGICAL WONDER.

The Complicated Time Keeping Oddity Invented by a Russian Pole.

The prize wonder in the shape of a clock is the invention of a Russian Pole named Goldfaden. The inventor is a clockmaker of Warsaw and boasts that he worked over 2,000 days on this time keeping oddity. The clock represents a railway station, with waiting rooms for travelers, telegraph and ticket offices and a very pretty and natural platform, well lighted and having in its center a flower garden and a sparkling fountain. There are also signal boxes, lights, switches, water tanks—in fact, everything used in conjunction with a well regulated railway station. There is a dial in the center tower, which shows time at New York, Peking, Warsaw and London. Every quarter of an hour the station begins to show signs of life. First all of the little figures of telegraph operators begin to work their machines, the head automaton going through the form of sending a dispatch to the effect that "the line is clear." Then the door opens, and upon the platform appear the station master and his assistants. Next a long line of little figures file up to the miniature ticket office.

After this the porters appear, carrying luggage, the bell rings, and instantly a miniature train dashes out of a tunnel and halts before the platform of the station house. While the train is waiting a miniature figure tests the wheels and axles with a tiny hammer, another pumps water into the tank of the engine, while a third busies himself stowing away small lumps of coal in the silver plated tender. There is one signal of the bell, whereupon the door of the single coach opens, and the little figures slide in on an almost invisible wire, the opening closing after them. A second tap of the bell is the signal for the wheel tester, waterman and fuel carrier to retire into the station house.

After the third signal the whistle gives two toots, and the train quickly disappears in a tunnel opposite to the one from which it emerged five minutes before. When the train is out of sight, the station master and his assistants leave the platform, the doors close behind them, and they all retire to the other side of the station house, where, at the expiration of 15 minutes, the train again appears, and the passengers file out and seat themselves in the building preparatory to taking another trip around the station house.—St. Louis Republic.
