How Silver Literature is Boycotted in the Mails. J. I. Casey, a DAILY JOURNAL subscriber at Portland sends us the heading of a JOURNAL of Friday, October 9, 1896, that bears the postmaster's stamp of delivery at Portland, Sunday, October 11, 1896, at 9:20 a. m. THE JOURNAL would not kick if it was the first, but Mr. Casey had not been receiving his paper on time one day since he began taking it. We are informed that the chief clerk of the railway mail service was fired a couple of weeks ago. He was a Democrat. We presume he was fired for delivering free silver literature on time. He was replaced by Mr. Vail, a Republican hold over, also a gold standard man. Probably this accounts for delays.

DIED.

BUDLONG.—At the family home, No. 100, on Seventeenth street, between Mill and Bellevue, Salem, Saturday, October 10, 1896, of tuberculosis, Rollin H. Budlong, aged 14 years.

Deceased will be remembered as the lad who was wheeled about the streets in an invalid chair. A few days ago he underwent a surgical operation, by which one of his feet was amputated, but his constitution was not sufficiently strong to withstand the shock. The remains were taken to Mill City via Roseburg mail this morning where they will be given interment.

TURNER.—At the family home in Turner, at 4:30 p. m. Sunday, October 11, 1896, George H. Turner, aged 64 years.

Mr. Turner has been bed-ridden for about seven years, not being able to feed himself and it must have been a great relief to him when death came Sunday afternoon. Deceased was a member of the venerable pioneer family of Turners which has done much towards the development of the Willamette valley. Deceased assisted by other members of the family erected the Turner Memorial Tabernacle in memory of their parents. Mr. Turner also possessed considerable property in Salem at the time of his death, the P. O. grocery being one of the principal buildings. Funeral services will be conducted in the Turner Memorial Tabernacle at 11:30 a. m. Tuesday, conducted by Rev. E. C. Sanderson, of Eugene.
