Of course, Mark Hanna and McKinley are not ignorant of what has been done.

It is no wonder independent and intelligent clergymen of all denominations, who have observed the unprincipled demagoguery of the McKinley managers are coming out as has Father Nugent, of Des Moines, and taken the side of an open, honorable and American candidate as Bryan has shown himself to be.

The McKinley managers are today trying to catch the gold voter and the silver voter. They are after the Methodist and the Catholic, the Evangelical, the Hebrew.

The time is past when any candidate can win votes by base and demagogical appeals to religious sentiments of any denomination. **A CONVERT TO SILVER.**

(Continued from first page.)

He then gave a review of his studies of the question and his reasons for being a silver man, 16 to 1. In his studies he picked out three high peaks, knowing if he could establish them, the rest would be easy. These were:

Is the present period of hard times due to the demonetization of silver?

Will the free coinage of silver relieve that distress?

What is the history and biography of an honest dollar?

Money is the blood of the business body; it can become congested and impure. All the money is now congested in London and New York. He said he once thought there was enough money in the world if it was in circulation, but he now thought it would give only temporary relief, like opium for a man in pain. He referred to the alleged intimidation of employees and urged the voters to cast their votes as they saw fit, even if they did wear the other party's badge. He went into the question at length and closed with an eloquent plea for silver.

**REGISTER HEADLINES**

over a column report of Father Nugent's speech are as follows:

"Attacked the supreme court. Father Nugent in his maiden free silver speech Tuesday made the usual anarchistic howl. Said he was a gold man until he went west, saw the wealthy silver mine owners—now talks silver. Two long hours of nothing—Nearly lost his voice talking about the crime of 1873—A crank's speech."

**REGISTER COMMENT.**

"Whatever is the seating and standing capacity of Calvary Tabernacle, whether it be 3,000 or 3,500, that capacity is the size of the audience which Rev. Father Nugent, the pastor of the Catholic Church of the Visitation, of the east city, addressed Tuesday evening on free and unlimited coinage of silver. It was a characteristic free silver speech. Father Nugent attacked the supreme court, belittled till he was nearly black in the face about the 'crime of 1873,' and for two long hours made a talk which contained absolutely nothing. He is an excellent speaker and he held the attention of his audience well. He talked as though he didn't believe what he was saying himself."

**NOT A PARTY QUESTION.**

The speaker stated that until quite recently he had leaned decidedly toward favoring the gold standard. After he had studied Carlisle he concluded he would not vote for gold.

"Then I went westward, and following an extended tour of pleasure and observation of the mighty empire beyond the Missouri, I came back and declared myself unqualifiedly for the free and unlimited coinage of silver. I studied the question just as I would have studied algebra. It is an economic problem and should be studied wholly as such. It is not a party question at all, and in coming here to-night I do not come to tell you how to vote, but to express to you my convictions upon this the most far-reaching and momentous question that has been presented to the Americans voter for settlement during this generation."

He said in closing that never before in the history of this country had such powerful influences been brought to bear by the great corporations and other large employers of labor as has been observed in this campaign. The pressure brought to bear in this direction upon the toilers, he claimed, created a wide-spread apprehension among the workmen that to indicate their political preferences openly, if they did not accord with those of their employer, was to invite discharge and to be deprived of the privilege of earning bread for their families. For these reasons, he said, thousands, yes, millions, of men, who intend voting for Bryan are wearing McKinley buttons. His advice to laboring men, under these conditions, was to wear any kind of a button given them by their employers, and on election day to vote as they pleased under the protection afforded by the Australian ballot system of casting the ballot.
