What became of the great political debate at the state fair? The goldbug managers evidently didn't want anyone, any more than they wanted the people to hear Bryan one year ago.

Tillman needs no brass bands to draw a crowd. The political rottenness of the age that wallows in public plunder and flourishes in filth and corruption affects, for good reasons, to turn up its nose at Tillman.

Rigdon and Minton had a larger meeting at Dallas Wednesday night than the McKinleyites, who dared not have a joint debate with them. Is a cause that is so weak as not to bear discussion worthy of disinterested patriotic support?

The Republicans at Dallas Wednesday night, after talking joint debate to draw a crowd for Walter Tooez, of Woodburn, absolutely refused to allow a joint debate. The only safety of the gold standard is not to allow it to be discussed.

Lo, has it come to this that Governor Wm. Larrabee, of Iowa, should appear on the same platform with a free trade Cleveland Democrat in advocacy of the gold standard? Alas, wealth knows no political distinctions.

Rev. J. F. Nugent, of Des Moines Ia., will reply at that city to Bourke Cochran, the free trade Democrat who upholds the gold standard. The Republican Register, that has always been a great admirer of Nugent when it thought it could use him, continues to denounce him as an anarchist, etc. Nugent is like Elder Backley, a natural orator.

BISHOP WM. DILLON.

Writes That Ohio Will Go for Free Silver.

DAYTON, O., Oct. 9.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—I have arrived safely in Dayton, O., my old home. I came over the Northern Pacific, Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroads. These are the best lines known to me by which to reach Chicago from Portland. The time is speedy, the equipment complete and the management and officials most gentlemanly. A. C. Sheldon, of Portland, is the general agent for the West, of the C. B. & A., and A. D. Charlton, of the Northern Pacific.

The political situation here is encouraging. I spoke to the Silver club last night, in Dayton, O. There are several Silver clubs in the city. The one I addressed last night, has six hundred members, forty of which were formerly Republicans. It is believed that this Montgomery county, will go for Bryan and free silver, by about twelve hundred majority, and Darke, an adjoining county, by about 1500 majority. While Ohio is a battleground that will be strongly contested, it is believed by many careful calculators, that Bryan will carry it by a small majority. Indiana is certain for Bryan by a large majority. I learn that some of the manufacturers of Dayton are waking up to the needs of the country. One of them, Brownell of this city, is the president of a free silver club. Another manufacturer here said recently, "why should I make agricultural machinery and pile it up here, for unless the farmers get free silver they will be unable to buy it and it will remain on my hands."

The people are waking up to the fact that representative money, measures nothing in determining values, that only primary money measured values, and that to remonetize silver will add one-half to the primary money, increase the price of land, produce and wages, give us rising prices, sufficient money, and consequent prosperity. The people of Ohio are learning to distrust John Sherman, who recently said at Columbus, "that is the best dollar that will buy the most." Laborers cannot conclude that the dollars that will buy the most labor is the best, nor the farmer, that the dollar that will buy the most wheat is the best. The dollar that will buy five days toil, or three bushels of wheat is dishonest, because too great in its purchasing power. The principles governing money are fixed and settled. John Stewart Mills said: "That an increase of the quantity of money raises prices and a diminutive lowers them is the most elementary proposition in the theory of money."

Prof. Walker says, "That prices will rise or fall as the volume of money be increased or diminished, is a law as unalterable as any law of nature." After surveying the country from ocean to ocean, I predict the election of William Jennings Bryan on the third of November, and that this event will bring back prosperity to the country, and will prove an immense blessing to Oregon and the Pacific coast.

BISHOP WM. DILLON, D. D.

The letter of ex-Senator Manderson, of Nebraska, warning the Republicans that they must not count on a single electoral vote for McKinley west of the Missouri river, is significant. This would yield to Bryan the states of Nebraska, Kansas, North Dakota, South Dakota, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Nevada, Utah, California, Oregon and Washington. Add to this the solid south and one state from the great middle west, and there you are, Mr. Bryan.

Higher prices for grain, wool, hops and all products; gold coming back to our country; railroad traffic doubling up; shipments abroad increasing; business in the east better than for three years; wages increasing; Bryan, the "boy orator" and the "matfoid," still talking; the silver craze not dying out; who are the false prophets?

Friends of Bryan and Free Coinage who can contribute to the campaign fund, even so small a sum as 25 cents, should do so, as funds are badly needed in the closing days of the campaign.

The free silver standard is on every wrapper.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

A Complete Resume of the Convention's Proceedings.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The afternoon session was opened with devotional exercises, led by Link Chambers.

The regular program was again resumed, and the first subject was taken up: "How can we best develop the Missionary Spirit in our Sunday School Work?" The essayist not being present, the subject was formerly discussed. A conference of Sunday school workers, was also held.

Next on the program, was a black-board exercise, on "Bible Geography," by Rev. N. Shupp.

The next subject, was "The Historical Development of the Sunday School." The essayist not being present, a historical outline was given by Rev. T. T. Vincent.

The last essay for the afternoon session, was read by the secretary, in the absence of the author, Miss Lena Skeels. The subject was, "Revival Work in Sunday Schools, in the discussion of which many excellent thoughts were brought out.

RESOLUTIONS.

The committee on resolutions submitted the following report:

Resolved, 1. That we will try every possible means we know of to increase the attendance at our Sunday school.

Especially do we recommend house visitation of our Sunday school workers.

2. We will whenever possible organize teacher's meetings, and study lessons with diligence and prayer.

3. We will encourage the reorganization of our Sunday school on the graded plan as soon as possible.

4. We recommend that a collection be taken once a quarter in all our Sunday schools, for the cause of missions.

5. Whereas, the home department of the Sunday schools is receiving considerable attention, by the leading Sunday school workers,

"Whereas, it is endorsed by all denominations and is practically without enemies,

"Whereas, Excellent results have followed the organization of home classes,

"Resolved, Therefore, that we endorse the movement and encourage the moral in our church.

The minutes of the day were read and the meeting adjourned. This was a very profitable convention. The papers read deserve recognition and the discussions were of an amiable nature.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The church was filled with an attentive audience. A half-hour was spent in devotional service lead by Rev. I. E. Fisher, of Portland, after which Rev. G. A. Manshardt, of Albany, preached an able sermon from 1st Corinthians, 3rd chapter, and a part of the 9th verse, "For We Are Laborers With God."

The big goldbug rally of the McKinleyites is postponed again, now for the fourth time. It was set for Saturday, the 17th, and was the last effort to offset the Bryan ratification at Salem which was the biggest political event of the season. Now it has failed again, and the date now set for the "monster" effort when all the McKinley clubs in the county are to be here is Friday, October 23, when congressman Boutelle of Maine is to talk.

There are no points in the public career of William McKinley more conspicuous than these: On the fifth day of November, 1877, he voted in congress for the Bland bill providing for the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of sixteen to one. A little later he voted to pass over the veto of the president the Bland-Allison act, which provided for the purchase of silver to the amount of \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000 a month. He did this against the judgment of a Republican president and a Republican secretary of the treasury, both from Ohio. On the 28th of January, 1878, he voted for the Matthews concurrent resolution declaring the bonds payable in silver, at the option of the government, and now he is on parade as the champion of the gold and bond speculators!

The Official Bailot.

The Four Sets of Presidential Electors in Oregon.

The official Australian ballot for Oregon, to be voted on Tuesday, Nov. 3, is printed below.

The law requires the voter to mark with a cross four names of electors, on the official ballot, which he will receive at the polling booth from the election officials. The four electors who represent William Jennings Bryan of Nebraska for president and Independent American Bimetallism as our financial policy are marked with a cross on the ticket below for guidance only.

The McKinley and Hobart electors also claim to be Bimetallists, to be brought about by international agreement with European nations.

The gold standard (National) Democratic electors also claim to be Democratic.

The O. R. & N. Co. now has a daily boat to Portland. Steamers Gypsy and Ruth leave Salem and Portland, respectively at 6 a. m. daily except Sunday, connect at the mouth of the Yamhill where the respective cargoes are transferred and the boats make the return trip. Considerable freight is being moved at present, while the number of passengers compares favorably with that of last winter.
