The People Chagrined.

Hundreds of voters came to Salem Friday to hear Senator Tillman as at first advertised and were deeply chagrined to learn that his dates had been changed one day and he had left for Eugene. Many came from ten to twenty miles on horseback to pay their respects to the Southern commoner only to find he had gone from town.

The same was true at Eugene where great preparations for a procession of horsemen had been made, and the largest demonstration in Lane county was confidently expected. But in spite of chagrin caused by these changes and the disappointment and disheartening of the local committees Tillman had large and enthusiastic crowds.

State central committee were forced to change dates by some unforeseen order of the national committee, cutting him off one week's time in Oregon, and the Oregon appointments had to be changed, giving Tillman two meetings a day and disappointing many localities. The committee is to be blamed for some things but not for what is beyond its control.

Nevertheless, thousands were disappointed. The great Bryan rally at Salem drew out a magnificent crowd, but the Tillman rally would have been quite as large if not interfered with. We desire to express regret that the thousands of farmers who came to Salem Friday to hear Tillman were disappointed.

GREAT CROWD IN TOWN.

Immense Silver Meeting at Marion Square.

Hundreds and hundreds of farmers came to town today to hear the great South Carolina senator speak at Marion Square, but owing to a change of date made by the state executive committee that eminent gentleman had gone to Eugene. However the crowd gathered about the square and other speakers were provided. Hons. W. S. U'Ren, H. L. Barkley and Ben Hayden and others spoke to the great delight of all.

The crowd is the largest in Salem since the big Bryan ratification and intense enthusiasm prevails. Country people like to come to Salem to attend meetings, and the disappointment occasioned today by the absence of Senator Tillman is regretted by all, especially the Salem committee which was not responsible for the matter. A good time was had by all present.

A NEW CONDUCTOR.—Sam Veatch, who has for several months been conductor for the Salem local, has been transferred to the "south end run" of the California overland, between Roseburg and Ashland, to take the place of Conductor Wall, who was discharged as a result of the serious Roseburg collision, two weeks since. Commencing last evening Ed. Elder, the well-known railroad man, will act as conductor on the Salem cannonball.

SMALL FIRE.—The residence of Mr. C. W. Hawks formerly of Hawks & Levar, painters and paper-hangers, in Morningglade, next to car barn, burned at 4 a. m. The family and a few of the household effects were saved from the flames. The loss is a severe one, in all about \$500. The fire was so early that few people were out to see it.

DIED.

WADE.—At her home, 558 Liberty street, at 4:30 a. m. Friday, October 16, 1896, Mrs. Sarah G. Wade, aged 93 years, 1 month and 9 days.

Deceased was born in Hingham, Mass., Sept. 7, 1803 where she resided until 1812 when with her parents she removed to Islesboro, Maine. She remembered very distinctly the operation of the British in the war of 1812—the second war for Independence. At Islesboro in 1824 she was married to Alfred Wade, with whom she lived nearly 50 years when death separated the happy couple. In 1858 Mr. and Mrs. Wade removed to Oregon, settling in Salem where they have since resided.

Deceased leaves three children to mourn the loss of an affectionate mother, viz: Mrs. D. G. Miner, of Salem, M. A. Wade, of Gervais, and W. L. Wade, of Salem. Mrs. Wade was always distinguished for her benevolence and generosity to the sick and the poor and was a most estimable woman whose death will be universally mourned. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed but will be announced tomorrow. The remains will be given burial in the Odd Fellows' cemetery.
