THE SENATORSHIP.

A prominent Portland lawyer in town yesterday, a Republican and Mitchell man, declared that he did not believe Mitchell could be elected, that he was short now six or seven votes among the gold crowd. "No silver man will be found voting to elect Mitchell, unless it is Jonathan Bourne, of Multnomah, who was Mitchell's manager, and is now handling the Bryan forces of Multnomah county. The reliance of Senator Mitchell will be entirely on the gold standard Republicans and a caucus of those forces will give him the nomination. Senator Daly, of Klamath and Lake, will be asked by some of the gold Democrats to vote for Mitchell in case of a close shave. On a sharp fight with the lines drawn on silver and gold there are 45 gold votes, 44 silver votes, and a vacancy in Coos county to be filled at the coming election. If Oregon goes for Bryan, I do not see how members of the legislature can regard it as anything but an instruction to elect a senator who will stand up for independent American bimetallism, and if Mitchell again declares for that after the McKinley campaign, I don't see why he can't be elected."

REV. HINES TALKS.

Eloquent Words Delivered in Michigan.

Rev. Thomas Hines, rector of Holy Trinity church, Manistee, Mich., closed a sermon with these words:

"Christ was crucified between two thieves, as though he was the greatest rascal of the three; uplifted between heaven and earth as though he was not fit for either world. So the workman has been crucified for years between two robbers of the people—The tariff and the single gold standard.

"When Christ was crucified, his murderers gambled for his clothing and divided it between them. So while labor is being crucified, its murderers divide its clothing, as they gamble in the necessities of life, rob the workman and his family of decent clothing and leave them in rags and tatters.

"W. J. Bryan, the Christian gentleman, the honest man, the American patriot, the redeemer of labor, the people's candidate for the presidency of these United States, will be elected by the people; will overthrow the combined forces of the gold power, and restore to the people their long-lost rights. May heaven bless and defend him, overthrow his enemies and help us all to do our duty. We want no crown of thorns nor cross of gold."

There is more than 16 to 1 in the election. The question whether a laboring man has the right to vote as he chooses and believes to be right is at stake. If the election is lost to the common people all is lost. If McKinley shall be elected imperialism of the worst form will be in the saddle, and the right of a laboring man to earn an honest living will sleep with the things that were.

The silver people are the ones who use the most thread, and have enriched the great robber trust that is now trying to force the "gold standard" down their throats.

THE FRIEND OF THE TAX-PAYER AND LABORER

By order of the Jim Loton-Portland Contingent of gold standard patriots M. L. Pipes, (Judge) by appointment, is now out as a missionary to the farmers, to vaccinate them with the Portland "sound money" virus. Truth compels us to say that it is a chilly source for nourishment. To this missionary of light belongs the sole distinction of being the only man in Oregon who ever decided that a soulless corporation (O. P. R. Co.) should be exempted from taxation state, county school and municipal. From his outrageous misconstruction of the plain letter of the state constitution, in favor of Hogg and against the people. Benton and Marion county appealed to the supreme court of Oregon, which court reversed the infamous decree of corporate exemption from taxation unanimously. Whereby the state, Benton, Linn, Lincoln and Marion counties received \$55,746.62. Judge Pipes, is of course, a consistent minion of corporate power without being especially Hainnized. He has demonstrated this in two decisions against the people and state, in favor of Hogg's O. P. R., which was a find of \$55,746.62 to that corporation. The reversal thereof by Justice Bean meant a neat sum to the people. On October 28th, 1896, the self same Pipes, placed the same, (Hogg) as his trusted receiver of the O. P. R. Co. The right arm of the Court, its creation, whereby Pipes & Hogg, in the "operating process" of the railroad from October 1890, to July 1892, piled up a debt, so called, of over \$1,000,000 by which its own laborers got 5 cents of the dollar.

Penoyer appointed him to the shoes of Judge Bean, in 1890. The Governor, in speaking of that act, in the bitterness of his soul, in view of those decisions and outrages on the laborer, said: "The appointment of Pipes is the only act of my whole executive career, that I am absolutely ashamed of. It was a simple outrage on the people."

In Benton county his home, in 1892, while the ticket which carried his name, received a majority of over 150, he was snowed under by 377, and fed his county within a month after his people passed on him. Harvey Scott has sand-papered Pipes and venerated Wallis Nash and they have feath emerged as "sound money" men to evangelize the common people. The people of the valley are onto the missionaries of the Loton combine. Why not give Sid Beck a dose of sheep dip and send out the reformers in crowds of threes. Pipes out teaching "Sound money" is a poser and still he is to teach honest men how to vote.

He is to treat scientific subjects "On the Edge of the Future," as McClure's calls that vast field of enticing character under which it treats up-to-date and ahead-of-the-times matters.
