MORE OF CUSICK.

He Don't Deny What The Journal Charged Him With.
Dr. W. A. Cusick has another letter in the Oregonian today, in which he does not deny the specific jobs which THE JOURNAL charged him with. ABOUT MAYOR GATCH.

IMPROVEMENT ITEMS.

Residences Being Constructed—Our City Hall.

Governor W. P. Lord has recently constructed a substantial sidewalk about his residence property in South Salem besides otherwise preparing for the rainy season so near at hand.

The work of building on an addition to the Cook hotel is progressing nicely. The framework has been completed and plastering done but the work of painting and the application of other finishing touches, remains yet to be done. Mr. Myers, the owner of the property, will expend about \$1800 in these improvements which when completed will permit this hotel to compare favorably with any other hotel of its class on the coast. Its accommodations will be doubled.

E. Breyman is making some substantial and much needed improvements to his residence property on Church and Court streets. The beautiful lawn that has heretofore annually been converted into a pond, during the rainy season owing to insufficient drainage, has been filled in, while a cement walk is being laid along the south side of his residence. John Heidecker, the well-known contractor, is constructing the walk which will be another evidence of that gentleman's superior work in that line.

C. Van Patten, until recently carpenter at the Chemawa Indian training school, has built a handsome residence in East Salem the past summer, which compares favorably with other residences in that portion of the capital city.

The labor exchange is constructing a one-story brick building at the rear of the Harritt & Lawrence grocery store. The building is being constructed for the Geo. H. Turner estate and will be used for a butcher shop. About 40,000 of brick made by the exchange is being used in the construction of the building. The brick work will be completed by the 27th inst.

The members of Central Chapel have recently solicited subscriptions, purchased a lot and are now erecting a cozy little house of worship at the corner of Nineteenth streets, which when completed will be a great credit to the city.

Laborers are furnishing the construction of the large wharf at the Labor Exchange warehouse. The exchange is now prepared to receive all kinds of produce to be shipped to Portland on commission.

The elegant residence of B. F. Foster, on North Commercial street is rapidly nearing completion. The building will involve an expenditure of \$2,800. The carpenter work was done by Wickstrom & Cheney, while Churchill & Burrows, the well known plumbers, are looking after that part of the work. It will be one of the handsomest residences in the city when completed.

Woodburn.
