SOME RELIABLE FIGURES.

Congressman-Elect W. S. Vandenberg
Writes a Letter.

MARSHFIELD, Oct. 23, 1896.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—Thus H. Tongue stated in his speech delivered here last Tuesday, that the sheep industry of the United States furnished employment to 3,000,000 men and that the total income from the industry was \$110,000,000. It will be seen by dividing 110,000,000 by 3,000,000 that those men received \$36 2-3 per year, 10 cents a day and boarded themselves.

We did according to the figures of Statistician Bronson C. Keeler, that there were in the United States in the year 1894, when the McKinley act was at its zenith, 15,048,017 sheep valued at \$89,197,000, hence according to Mr. Tongue, it requires the time of one man to attend to 15 sheep and a very small flock or a little lamb, and that the annual profit on each sheep is one and a fourth times as much as its value. And now let us look at this statement in relation to the Oregon sheep industry. He said the loss of this state from the effect of the Wilson act was \$10,000,000 per annum, while the fact is, the total value of all the sheep in the state in 1894, was \$4,433,403, hence, according to Mr. Tongue the loss was nearly two and one-half times as much per annum as their total value. The number of sheep in the state in 1894 was 2,529,759, hence the loss according to Tongue was almost \$4 per head, which is as absurd as his statement that silver was never demonetized, that the bill referred to as having demonetized it, was discussed more or less for three years, and that we always had splendid times under a Republican tariff. Who is so utterly devoid of intelligence as to swallow such infamous, deceptive, false, nonsense as the above? Who cannot remember the depression, the strikes, the lock-outs, the bankruptcies, amounting to over 15,000 that occurred in '93, during the reign of the McKinley tariff act, and the howl that went up from John Sherman, Cleveland and the combined bankers and other goldbugs, "repeal the Sherman Act and prosperity will return at once." Who does not know that the greatest panic, and the one that endured the longest was from 1873 to 1879, during an uninterrupted reign of the Republican party, and that the cause of said panic was, according to a committee appointed during the time by congress, which made its report in March, 1877, stated that it was due to contraction of the money volume and to that alone. That contraction of the volume of money and falling prices always have had and always must have the effect to concentrate wealth to enrich the few and to impoverish and degrade the many.

Swick, an old life-long Republican, who tells a Bryan campaigner occasionally: "You are right; go ahead."

AT DAYTON

We had a very interesting joint debate with one of the McKinley champions of Woodburn, Mr. Tooez. He repeated Mr. Ford's argument that the debts per capita of the nation were \$400 and the wealth of the nation \$1,100. Therefore the more children a man had the richer, etc. The way these fellows distribute wealth is not alarming poor people so much as it is the rich.

Some of the Bryan and Free Silver workers of this town are Committee-men R. N. Snell, I. E. Fenton, H. A. Bertram, Robt. Earle, Wm. Hibbard, F. M. Crabtree, E. B. Collard, J. W. Fishburn, J. E. Penler, S. J. Dunn, H. Oliver, Mr. Tucker, J. Wirt, B. F. Lewis. These men are in earnest and will get out the full vote of the precinct and see that the vote is honestly counted.

There was a large crowd at the grove, the band played well and the gold men cheered part of the time. The ladies present conducted themselves as usual, with greater modesty and propriety than the speakers or the respective partisans. The ladies always do. Dayton is a Republican stronghold and some of these may vote for McKinley as a personal matter, not because they have any notion of endorsing the gold standard or voting down silver as money.

AT NEWBERG.

A nine-mile drive to this live town brought us to Hotel Newberg, now kept since three weeks by Wm. Hendershot, formerly of Butteville, and late Democratic county chairman of Marion county. With Mrs. Hendershot, his son Harry, who is a student at the college, and daughters Anna and Lola, they make everybody feel at home regardless of politics. HARD COMPETITION.

The first football game of the season was billed for the same hour as the Bryan meeting—Saturday at 2 p. m. The town is a strong Republican and Prohibition precinct. There have been many meetings of late held by able speakers. With band and in full parade and with ribbons flying the Newberg and McMinnville college teams marched out to the gridiron and left us with about 100 people and a little blackboard, a blazing sun overhead, and the problems of finance and a piece of chalk to entertain them. The football game came out at the ratio of 54 to nothing in favor of Newbergs. This is not the usual ratio of the Baptists to the Friends however as to members or theology. My ratio of 16 to 1 seemed to satisfy all the people except two. A Prohibitionist declared he would vote for the gold standard because it makes money so scarce nobody would have any to buy whiskey with. The other man asked a great many questions. He said he was open to conviction and I invited him to the meeting. He showed that he was a gold standard man against all comers, and some said he was an unnaturalized Englishman, who only last winter, when he

was in trouble with a lot of sawlogs called for the protection of Her British Majesty's counsel at Portland. That explained his political bias if he had any.

AN OREGON ENTERPRISE.

worth noting is the Newberg Pressed Brick and Terra Cotta Works—the largest of the kind in the state. It is conducted by Jesse Edwards and his son O. J. Edwards who married Miss Abbie Miles of Salem. The factory is equipped with a 120 horsepower engine, a Boyd dry press, thirty-five and one hundred fifty thousand kilns, all down-draft, and a steam tunnel in which the green pressed brick are dried as they pass through on cars. Dark red, white and gray colored brick which are sold at Portland, Salem and other cities. The terra cotta clay is brought by water from Buena Vista and from the Willamette by rail.

COULD TALK SILVER.

Friday evening we were at a little schoolhouse in the country among the blazing forest fires and timber clearings. A farmer presided who at the end told of a "dream, or revelation" he had the other night. He dreamed he had robbed a bank and got away with the money, when he met a poor woman on the road and she charged him with the crime and he confessed it. The woman had all the money she had in the world in the bank and demanded that he give it up. He went to do so and lo, behold, when he counted the money he found only one-quarter of the widow's money there. The banker had already stolen the other three-quarters. The crowd enjoyed the joke on the banker not a little. A farm boy, named Lee Jones, entertained us with an hour's talk on the money question, and for a man without any education but a few years at a country school, he showed himself well informed. He correctly quoted the law and the facts of coinage, and the various kinds of money in existence. The favorite arguments of the goldites were taken up and refuted by statistics and statements of other gold standard authorities, all arranged with such marvelous clearness, logic and conciseness, that I doubt if there is a college professor in Oregon who could go over the ground in so thorough a manner, or who could answer his argument.

Those who imagine the agitation against the gold standard is going to die out reckon without their host. There may not be many country boys who possess the talent of Lee Jones, but the bankers and gold politicians will find the silver question to be what Abe Lincoln called the anti-slavery agitation—one of the enduring problems of the age.

A large and enthusiastic attendance greeted the Bryan Bimetallism club's regular meeting Saturday night. DAYTON, O., Oct. 19, 1896.

DEAR BROTHER:—Your letter of the 13th inst. is at hand. I am very glad to hear from you. We had the largest meeting in Dayton today that ever was known here. It was estimated at from 20,000 to 40,000. W. J. Bryan spoke. It would have done you good, soul and body, to have heard him.

Indiana will go for Bryan by from 30,000 to 50,000; Illinois will carry a large majority for Bryan. Governor Altgeld has rented sixty halls in Chicago for constant meetings for the last fifteen days before the election. Many Republicans here are for Bryan. We have several clubs in Dayton. There are forty Republicans in the club that meets near where I live. There will be a hard fight in Ohio, but it is now generally believed here by free silver men that Bryan will carry Ohio. The Republicans are in fear I think that we will carry Michigan, and just lately it looks like we would carry New York.

My neighbor who knows more about the betting department than I do, tells me that there were several large offers to bet on Ohio going for McKinley and that a wealthy Democrat took them all at one sweep that Ohio would go for Bryan.
