AT MARION'S CAPITAL.

John Minto has petitioned the con-
ty court for the appointment of Mrs.
Ella Minto as guardian of the person
and estate of W. J. Minto, now an in-
mate of the insane asylum.

Notice of an appeal to the supreme
court, in the foreclosure suit of David
W. Edgar vs. T. Golden, has been filed
with the county clerk. In depart-
ment No. 2, of the Marion county cir-
cuit court, on May 2d last, a decree
was rendered in favor of Mr. Edgar
for the sale of 310 acres of land in the
Edgar donation land claim to be ap-
plied in the payment of a judgment in
the sum of \$2,443.90 and accruing
interest at 8 per cent, and for the
further sum of \$200.

The work of distributing election
supplies to the different precincts of
this county was commenced this
morning. This work will require the
remainder of the week to complete it.

County Treasurer G. L. Brown
spent Sunday with friends at Stayton.
Mr. Brown says that precinct, which
has heretofore gone Republican by

FOOT BALL GAMES.

Schedule of Games as Arranged by
State Association.

Delegates from the State Univer-
sity at Eugene, from the State Agri-
cultural College at Corvallis, and from
Willamette University of this city
held a meeting in this city Saturday
afternoon when a schedule of games for
the season was arranged. The win-
ning team will be awarded the pen-
nant now held by the Eugene team
by whom it was captured last year
after a hard struggle. Since no dele-
gates were present at Saturday's
meeting from the Portland Univer-
sity, Pacific College, at Newberg, or
the Pacific University, of Forest
Grove, these teams will not partici-
pate in the football tournament this
year.

M. L. Travis, of the State Univer-
sity at Eugene, president of the Asso-
ciation, called the meeting to order.
I. H. Van Winkle, of Willamette Univer-
sity, and C. E. Small, of the Ore-
gon Agricultural college at Corvallis
were elected secretary and treasurer
respectively for the ensuing year.

The following schedule of games for
this season was arranged: Willamette
vs. U. of O. at Eugene, Nov. 14th. The
winning team in this game will meet
the O. A. C. team at Corvallis on the
Saturday following, Nov. 21. The
Willamette University and O. A. C.
teams will play a game at Salem on
Thanksgiving day that will no doubt
be largely attended. The games will
be governed by the rules as contained
in Spaulding's foot-ball guide, and the
piskin to be used will be the regula-
tion intercollegiate Spaulding "J" ball.

The Salem team unlike those of the
Eugene and Corvallis colleges, will not
have the services of a coach in prepar-
ing for the tournament, nevertheless
they expect to make it quite interest-
ing for the opposition.

At a recent meeting of the Willamette
University athletic association, Harry
A. Olinier was elected captain of
the team. Active training will be-
gin immediately. If a satisfactory
excursion rate can be secured over the
railroad to Eugene, it is likely a great
many Salemites will go up the valley
and witness the game which they hope
may be played on a more respectable
field than that on which the game of
last year was played at that city.

The Student's Political Meeting.

The meeting to be held in the
Armory hall on Wednesday evening,
of this week, under the auspices of
the "Student's Bryan Free Silver
Club," promises to be of peculiar in-
terest since the students by this ac-
tion show themselves not to be in the
least unmindful of the welfare of this
grand Republic.

The speaker of the evening will be
Col. F. V. Drake, of Portland, one
of the finest orators in the state.
The program will consist of at least
two vocal selections, a recitation, and
a short speech preceding the address
by Col. Drake, who will be introduced
by C. K. Brandenburg, president of
the club. All the numbers on the
program, with the exception of Col.
Drake's address, will be furnished by
members of the club, who are students
of Willamette University.

Since the seating capacity of the
Armory has been so largely increased
a large audience can be accommo-
dated. We hope to see the hall well
filled as a recognition on the part of
the public of its appreciation of the
efforts of the club, which is sparing
no pains to make this, their first
meeting, a decided success. We hope
