### ENGLISH MONEYED INTERESTS.

Mr. Thomas Lloyd, editor of the "London Statist," the great English financial authority, told the Oregonian Monday "the moneyed class of England and of Europe generally is feeling very much alarmed, because Mr. Bryan might be elected," and they have nothing whatever to fear from Major McKinley, he says.

That states the situation exactly Mr. McKinley stands on a platform that is American on the tariff question but British on the money question and the latter is the question of vital interest.

The American people want an American finance system as well as an American tariff system. They do not want to encourage a system that encourages mortgaging every industry and all the properties of this country to the moneyed interests of Europe. Therefore the true American will not vote for the drone of the Moneyed Interests.

The Oregonian and the Statesman pose as the "friends of labor." These same papers have discharged their printers and in their stead use type-setting machines. These machines they buy on credit and instead of paying wages to printers they "promise to pay" interest to their corporation creditors. THE JOURNAL employs printers, pays them fair wages and they get the coin.

### POINTS FOR LABORERS.

How the Free Coinage of Silver Will Benefit the Workingman.

HELENA, Oct. 20, 1896.

EDITOR POST DISPATCH.—Replying to yours of October 7, 1896, in regard to the number of miners who would be employed in the west in case of free coinage of silver, conservative estimates by those familiar with mining resources and possibilities in Montana and other mining states place the number at 15,000 in Montana alone, with an additional 50,000 skilled and unskilled laborers in other occupations in this state, whose labor would be demanded by increased general business of all kinds on account of increased mining, not only of silver, but of lead, zinc, copper, coal, iron and gold, all of which, except coal, are found in our silver-bearing ores.

For the eleven mining states of the west we estimate—on a conservative calculation—500,000 additional miners and other laborers. But it would be a mistake to suppose that any of the miners would be producing silver alone. In the list of dividend and non-dividend paying mines published regularly in the Engineering Mining Journal of New York, you will find scarcely a mine that produces silver alone. Many mines that begin with are at the surface develop gold lower down—as the great Comstock mine, for example.

Any one can see, then, that free coinage, which means a fixed mint price of 1.29 an ounce for silver, means an enormous increase in our gold production, since it will then pay to work ores containing both gold and silver which cannot now be worked except at a loss. For example: Near Helena is a group of refractory ores, showing at least 1,000,000 tons, showing an average of \$13 in gold and sixteen ounces of silver per ton, making the ore worth at present about \$23 a ton. Smelting and freight charges on such ore amount to \$20 a ton, to say nothing of mining; so that ore can't be worked except at a loss. But with free coinage, and \$1.29 an ounce for silver, we would get \$12,000,000 in gold alone, which cannot be got with silver at its present price. This is but one of hundreds of such ore deposits.

The same is true of immense deposits of silver-lead, silver-copper and other mixed ores. Now consider that a large part of that \$13,000,000 of gold lying near this city would, if mined, be spent for farm and factory products of the eastern and middle states, to say nothing of the silver and other metals so used!

Free coinage of silver will therefore enable our people to dig their own gold out of American mountains, instead of borrowing it from England and paying interest for its use, besides increasing our production of other metals.

As to employing the surplus and now unemployed labor of eastern and middle states, free coinage of silver would not only from those states at least 500,000 laborers of all kinds to the eleven great mining states, but their personal wants and the needs of their occupations would create an enormous market for manufactured products of eastern and middle state factories and mills, embracing everything in the way of machinery, food, clothing and implements of all classes of artisans.

In the matter of canned foods alone the demand would be enormous.

The local demands for skilled labor would be enormous.

Therefore, when the laboring man of the east of the Mississippi valley asks: "Will free coinage of silver put me in the way of getting a job?" the answer is: "Yes; either here at home, or in one of the mining states."

The man who now has a job should remember what effect this will have on the unemployed man who is now trying to get his job at lower wages.
