WORLD'S GOLD AND SILVER.

The Oregonian Tuesday prints the following as 'the stock of gold and silver money of the six leading commercial nations.

The Republican text book of 1886 issued by the national and congressional committees, gives the latest and undoubtedly reliable statistics on the stocks of coined money in the principal countries of the world as follows:

This shows that there is in the six leading nations of the world two dollars of gold to one of silver.

The Oregonian's figures give \$178,000,000 too little gold and \$321,000,000 too much silver, a lie of about \$499,000,000 by the Republican campaign text book.

The Republican campaign text book for 1896 gives the total stock of gold and silver coins in all the principal countries of the world—thirty-two in all—as follows:

TWELVE POSERS.

We submit the following twelve questions by Mr. A. D. Warren on the international agreement advocated by Mr. McKinley and his platform, and ask their supporters to give them fair and honest consideration.

One—Why do the opponents of free silver want an international agreement if the gold standard is a good thing?

Two—If demonetization of silver did no harm, as the gold men contend, why have an international agreement?

Three—If the restoration of silver will do us no good, why do they want an international agreement about it?

Four—If there never was bimetallism in the United States, as you contend, and we have grown to our immense proportions on a single gold standard, why have bimetallism by international agreement?

Five—If the demand for free coinage of silver be simply and only a dishonest attempt on the part of the silver mine owners to palm off a 53-cent dollar on the farmer and laborer, why should their wicked and unholy purpose be gratified by an international agreement?

Six—If the half-civilized condition of China and India is due to the free coinage of silver, why enlarge the use of silver in the United States by an international agreement and destroy our civilization?

Seven—If England's greatness is due and owing to the single gold standard, why should silver be restored by international agreement and the wheels of progress and industry be turned backwards?

Eight—If silver has depreciated because the cost of production has been lessened, how can an international agreement restore any of its lost value?

Nine—If we have 'sound money'

now and 'honest money' now, why make it 'unsound' and 'dishonest' by an international agreement?

Ten—How can the bimetallic dollar and the gold dollar both be sound and honest if gold is a better dollar, an intrinsic dollar, and the silver dollar a fluctuating dollar, an unstable dollar, and of no intrinsic value?

Eleven—If the value of gold is fixed, stable, unchangeable, intrinsic and independent of all law, how can an international agreement affect its relation to silver?

Twelve—How can you say in one breath that gold is fixed, stable, unchangeable, intrinsic, sound, standard and independent of all law, and in the next breath say you want to go to a bimetallic basis as soon as England will join you?

On this subject the McKinley platform says: 'We are unalterably opposed to every measure calculated to debase our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are, therefore, opposed to the free coinage of silver, except by international agreement with the leading commercial nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained the existing gold standard must be preserved.'

In Lane County.

Last Valley, the bulwark of Bryanism in Lane county, had a genuine lovefeast Tuesday evening, in the joint discussion between Hon. J. D. Matlock, of Eugene, representing the people, and Judge Majors, of McMinnville. Mr. Matlock led the discussion in a 45-minute talk, which was to the point on the money question. Majors followed in a scattering tirade of one hour's length, which caused a few desultory cheers from the queen's subjects, and derisive laughter from the Bryan men.

They were terribly beaten. Last Valley polls about 80 votes, of which 70 are for Bryan and 10 or 12 for Mark Hanna.

HOFER AND LABOR.

Another Oregonian Lie Is Nailed.

IS NOT AN ENEMY OF LABOR.

His Record Proves Him a Friend of the Laborer.

PORTLAND, Oct. 28. (Editor Tribune)—The Oregonian has seen fit to stigmatize me as an enemy of organized labor, in the hope of inducing laboring men to vote against me as a candidate for elector on the Bryan ticket. If its charge were true I would deserve to receive the vote of no laboring man, and I would never take a public office as against the protest of organized and intelligent laboring men. But its charges are false in every particular.

Chinese skilled labor is more and more displacing American labor in the public corporations: there is no justice or necessity in this. A transportation corporation that has a franchise from our legislature or congress, that carries American mails, and is supported by the patronage of the American people, ought to employ American citizens, and keeps no aliens, who never intend to become citizens on its payrolls.

I introduced a bill to that effect in the last Oregon legislature. It got 41 votes in its passage, and before the vote was announced Hon. John McCracken, of Portland, arose and stated if this bill passed it would seriously cripple the river steamboat companies who employ Chinese cooks and could not supply their places. Eleven so-called Americans then changed their votes to defeat the bill and accommodate the corporations.

WHAT ARE THE FACTS? I have been traveling on the Columbia river boats some lately and made inquiries as to how many employ Chinese cooks. I find not over half the boats employ Chinese cooks. The T. J. Potter, R. R. Thompson, the Geo. W. Shaver and Kellogg Transportation boats employ American cooks, and are quite as well served as any. In the city of Portland are plenty of Americans, white and colored cooks, men unemployed and who would be perfectly competent to fill their places.

How many American citizens could secure permanent employment in a foreign country on a public corporation, if these places could be as well filled by a native of that country? Not many. Yet in our generosity we allow our public corporations to give the preference to aliens who never intend to become citizens, who do not support homes or families, who do not sustain church, school or state, who are not even consumers, and who send their earnings to China.

It is a fixed principle of law that a corporation created by law owes its first allegiance to its creator, and in this instance these corporations are the creature of the American citizen. While a private citizen might do as he pleased about employing American or alien labor, a public corporation like the Southern Pacific or a river transportation company has no legal right to employ others than American citizens. I believe that principle should be enacted into law in Oregon and every state in the union. E. HOFER.

CONCEDES MCKINLEY'S GREAT

Harvey Scott Gives No Chance of His Election. PORTLAND, Or., Oct. 29.—Harvey W. Scott, editor of the Morning Oregonian, has conceded the election of Bryan. On Sunday, as was reported in Tuesday's Tribune, Mr. Scott, in conversation with a gentleman, said that in his opinion McKinley would be defeated.

This morning, the editor had a discussion with Charles Hirstel, president of the Eighth ward Bryan club, on the corner of Third and Morrison streets. Mr. Scott, after he had heard Mr. Hirstel talk, said: 'Charles, Sunday I thought that Bryan would be elected. Now, there is no doubt but that McKinley will be defeated. I am sorry for it, I will stand by McKinley to the last, but it will do no good.'

Mr. Scott then inveighed against the silver doctrine. Nothing would hurt the 'people' so much as the election of Bryan, he said. He did not say anything that would permit the workingmen to believe that the 'people' were not the bondholders and monopolists of the country. He did not say anything that would distinguish the 'people' from the Equitable Life Insurance company, of New York, which, it is alleged, has a mortgage of \$250,000 on the Oregonian building. He did not say anything about the \$3000 taxes, which he has not yet paid to Multnomah's county sheriff—but he acknowledged McKinley's defeat.
