THE SACREDNESS OF COURTS.

What Abraham Lincoln Had to Say About Them.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—As Mr. Binger Hermann and his so-called Republican brethren are very wrought up over the "Anarchistic utterances" of the peoples candidate for president regarding the income tax decision of the supreme court as well as that "Anarchistic plank in the Chicago platform" which refers to the use of United States troops at Chicago during the late railroad strike at that point.

Now, Mr. Editor, I wish every one of the so-called Republicans would read that speech in full, but for fear they may not do so I will ask you to insert the following extract which is a copy of the speech delivered by Abraham Lincoln in Chicago on the evening of July 10th, 1858, which may be found in the Life and Speeches of President Lincoln, by Joseph R. Barrett, published in 1864, which was a long time before "The Populists" polluted the world with anarchy."

"A little now on the other point of Dred Scott decision, and another of the issues he says that is to be made with me, is upon his devotion to the Dred Scott decision, and my opposition to it. I have expressed heretofore, and I now repeat my opposition to the Dred Scott decision, but I should be allowed to state the nature of that opposition, and ask indulgence while I do so. What is fairly implied by the term Judge Douglas has used "resistance to the decision" I do not resist. If I wanted to take Dred Scott from his master, I would be interfering with property, and that terrible difficulty that Judge Douglas speaks of, of interfering with property would arise, but I am doing no such thing as that, but all I am doing is refusing to obey it as a political rule.

"Resolved, That the maintenance inviolate of the rights of the states, and especially of the right of each state to order and control its own domestic institutions according to its own judgment exclusively, is essential to that balance of powers on which the perfection and endurance of our political fabric depends; and we denounce the lawless invasion by armed force of the soil of any state or territory, no matter under what pretext as amongst the gravest crimes."

I now reiterate these sentiments, and in doing so I only press upon the public attention the most conclusive evidence of which the case is susceptible, that the property, peace and security of no section are to be in any wise endangered by the now incoming administration I add, too, that all the protection which, consistently with the constitution and the laws, can be given, will be cheerfully given to all the states when lawfully demanded, for whatever cause, as cheerfully to one section, as to another."

Mr. Hermann and his so-called Republican friends would do well to read the life and speeches of that great man whom they all acknowledged as the father of the real Republican party, and then they might have respect enough for the grand principles he advocated to at least not cry "anarchy" at them, but then perhaps the so-called Republicans really think Abraham Lincoln was the chief of all anarchists, at least the talk one hears, upon the streets, and the speeches of the Hon. Binger Hermann and his so-called Republican friends would lead one to think so.

Mr. Hermann has awoke to the fact that it would be impossible to get silver into circulation if we had free coinage. I wonder if he can tell how gold gets into circulation at present with the free coinage of gold?

Mr. Hermann told us old hay-seeds at this place in a speech, that he voted for the income tax. We would like to know if he voted for the Wilson bill as a whole? If not, we should like for him to explain how he voted

can quote a more stinging criticism of the great and good supreme court that has ever been uttered by the People's candidate for president or placed in the platform of the Democratic party.

Now if our so-called Republican friends will refer to the speech delivered by President Lincoln, in Indianapolis, on the evening of February 11, 1861, they will then find what he considered to be coercion and invasion of state. I quote the following: "What then is coercion? What is invasion? Would the marching of an army into South Carolina, without the consent of her people, and with hostile intent toward them, be invasion? I certainly think it would and it would be coercion also if the South Carolinians were forced to submit. But if the United States should merely hold and retake its own forts and other property, and collect the duties on foreign importations or even withhold the mails from places where they were habitually violated, would any or all of these things be invasion or coercion?"

Now let us turn to Mr. Lincoln's Inaugural address and see what is there, here a sample of it, "I do not consider it necessary, at present, for me to discuss those matters of administration about which there is no special anxiety or excitement. Apprehension seems to exist among the people of the Southern states, that, by the accession of a Republican administration, their property and their peace and personal security are to be endangered. There has never been any reasonable cause for such apprehension. Indeed the most ample evidence to the contrary has all the while existed, and been open to their inspection, it is a friend in nearly all the published speeches of him who now addresses you. I do but quote from one of those speeches, when I declare that I have no purpose, directly or indirectly, to interfere with the institution of slavery in the states where it exists. I believe I have no lawful right to do so; and I have no inclination to do so. Those who nominated and elected me, did so with the full knowledge that I had made this, and many similar declarations, and had never recanted them. And, more than this, they placed in the platform for my acceptance, and as a law to themselves and to me, the clear and emphatic resolutions, which I now read.
