TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

[JOURNAL OFFICE, MONDAY, 4 P. M.]

This is the close of a remarkable campaign. There has been a great breaking up of party lines. The money question has been the issue and there has been an unusually strained situation between the capitalistic and non-capitalistic classes. Men have been called honest and dishonest without regard to those virtues as ordinarily reckoned. The worst skinners and sharpers have paraded as honest money men, and men with no thought but to help a fellow man have been set down as belonging to the party of dishonesty and repudiation.

This has also been a campaign of the politicians against the people. Mr. McKinley has talked to please the former, while Mr. Bryan has talked to the latter. Which shall win? In the nature of circumstances, the result cannot be satisfactory, but the hard strain of the situation must wear itself out and gradually be reduced by the logic of events. No intelligent man imagines that the heat of controversy, the severe charge of dishonor, the charge of selfishness, will be smoothed out by the verdict of the ballot box. It is doubtful if either side will accept the result, graciously unless the verdict shall be overwhelming in its magnitude. The contest will be too close to settle the money question at the ballot box. The courts will be called upon to intervene. Will the people accept the arbitration of the judiciary if they refuse to accept the verdict of the ballot?

THE JOURNAL has waged a vigorous campaign for Mr. Bryan and bimetallism. It espoused this cause the very moment Mr. Bryan was nominated. It did not wait to be seen by campaign managers. It has made its own campaign because it believed the cause was right and just and in the true interests of humanity. It asks no reward. It knew it would draw by its active support and championship, the fire of opposition from the organized forces of party prejudice, political corruption and the vile creeping things of public life, cowardly and truckling ringsters, who used these columns for advertising the county campaign in June repudiated their obligations, but the people have not let this paper die, and it closes the campaign with the largest circulation it ever enjoyed and stronger in the affections of the people of all parties, because it has stood by its convictions when mere politicians have eaten their vomit for revenue.

In spite of all this THE JOURNAL closes the campaign with no bitterness toward any individual. The man who strikes another personally because he champions an opposing principle, hurts himself and the principle, because he confesses its impregnability and admits his own weakness. If we have struck a good man in advocacy of the principle we represent we sincerely regret it, as such was not our intention. It is now the duty of intelligent and conservative men to stand up for the peaceful solution of the problem that has been raised in this campaign. The solution is yet before us. In this solution THE JOURNAL will act independently and fearlessly along the line of principle. Whether Mr. McKinley or Mr. Bryan be elected, and we are perfectly conditioned to the result in either case, but believe the chances are strongly in favor of the latter, the victor will need the support of all calm and patriotic citizens.

The voters who have fought together for the election of Mr. Bryan

and the establishment of Independent American Bimetallism will not lay down their arms nor abandon their organization. The consolidation forces was necessary to make a stand for principle. The Democrat, the Populist and the Silver Republican who march together under a common flag on November 3, will not be less patriotic or entitled to respect for having laid aside partisan interests and upheld the cause of country. Their efforts will not have been in vain. They will have taught the money power and the corporations that they cannot reckon on the people remaining divided off into minorities when their common interests are assailed. By the money power we do not mean the legitimate banking business. We mean the dictatorship of wealth that is founded on special legislative privileges and seeks improperly to warp and force the political organizations, the departments of government, the people themselves to do its bidding and increase its usurped prerogatives. That power has ridden upon the necks of the people too long now. It will receive a telling blow on Tuesday, November 3. But it will still be strong. It will still resist the people. It will seek to defeat their purpose to get rid of its pernicious influences and its unlawful exactions. That battle must be fought to the end in the state and nation or the American people will lose their liberties as they have lost their prosperity.

The battle against trusts and syndicates organized to rob the mass for the benefit of the few, the manipulation of public moneys and public corporations to benefit those already wealthy and tax the multitude unjustly, the wrecking of private corporations through the courts, the corruption of our state and national politics for private gain, all these and other evils and abuses of government require that the people who are not interested in anything but good government stand unselfishly together and be prepared to defend their lives and their property and the rights of their offspring against the insidious poison of a mercenary plutocracy that is rapidly being instilled into the body politic.

THEY NEED THE MONEY.

The railroad and steamboat corporations have spent so much money in this campaign that they have advanced freight rates by rail and river to all points in the Willamette valley. Rates to Salem from Portland have been advanced from 5 cents to 21 and 27 cents per hundred. This hits Salem hard. Supt. Fields of the Southern Pacific tramped miles in the mud of Portland streets Saturday night blowing an immense horn for McKinley and the gold standard. Train loads were hauled from all directions at half price and thousands on free passes. All this must be paid in higher freights. The merchant must pay it first and cannot collect it out of the consumer unless he advances retail prices. This is a "business man's" campaign.

WASHINGTON.

THE JOURNAL has personal information that Washington will give the Bryan electors a large majority and elect the silver state ticket and congressmen.

B. W. Brintnall of Olympia, a silver Republican, writes that Washington will give 15,000 to 20,000 majority for Bryan. Nevada, Idaho and California will stand with Oregon and Washington for Bryan.

Will some of our nobility please inform their humble servants how it is that our 50, 25 and 10 cent silver pieces are legal tender in sums of \$5, when there is less silver in two halves, four quarters or ten dimes than there is in a silver dollar? Do you call this subsidiary coin sound money too?

One of our common people claims to have had a revelation and says, Mark Hanna & Co., are gathering up our gold to make a crown, which is to be placed on the dome of our capitol at Washington immediately after the inauguration of Major McKinley, and on that massive crown is to be inscribed, "Our William the 1st."

In 1895 our exports were... \$807,500,000

In 1853 our production of silver was insignificant. Gold \$65,000,000. This was \$2.60 per capita.

In 1873—gold... \$36,000,000
Silver... 35,750,000
Total—both metals... \$71,750,000
Only \$1.72 per capita of both metals—88 cents less than the gold product alone in 1853. Silver was then denied free coinage. This left us but 86 cents per capita of free coinage metal—\$1.74 less than we produced in 1853.

1894—This year the combined product of both gold and silver, was only \$1.67 per capita—73 cents less than the production of gold alone in 1853. As gold is our only money metal now admitted to free coinage and clothed by law with full legal tender power, our entire product of free coinage metal is only 53 cents per capita. This is \$2.07 less than in 1853, and 33 cents in 1873. Of free coinage metal, we produce, per capita, only one dollar now, where we produced five in 1853.

REPUBLICAN ATTENTION.

The Free trade—Gold Standard—Democratic New York Times is for the election of McKinley, the Protectionist! The Times knows that the money question is the all important question now at issue, in comparison with which questions about the amount of foreign goods imported into this country are the merest shadows. To be so wise as the Times, every Republican, who disclaims the gold standard, should be for Bryan.

There is an Arabian saying that a fool is known by his always mistaking his enemies for his friends. The gold standard is the enemy of the great mass of mankind. And the foolish Republican, tomorrow, will be he, who, desiring the remonetization of silver, yet votes for McKinley and the gold standard, in fear of the scare-crow of free trade, and thus falls into a trap set for him by his enemies!

THE BATTLE IN MARION.

Next to Portland, the battle for political control in Oregon centers on Salem and Marion county. Messrs. Ike Patterson, Banker McCormack, "Doc" Smith, "Doc" Keene, et al would rather lose the United States to McKinley than lose their grip on Marion county.
