The number of tubs of butter held in cold storage in the principal states of the East is reported by the Dairy Trade Bulletin of Chicago at 772,940 against 627,700 at this time last year.

The De Laval Separator Company, of Sweden, celebrated the manufacture of its 100,000th separator by giving the sum of \$20,000 to two experiment stations as a fund to provide for the testing of agricultural machines.

A Knight's Valley (Somoma county) man claims to have found a dead snake thing for the destruction of squirrels. At a test on Saturday last a two-horse wagon load of dead bunnies—estimated at 6000—was cleaned up.

Elmer Alexson, of Samish, Skagit county, Washington, is reported to have obtained this year 5,312 bushels of oats from 39 acres of land by actual measurement. This is a yield of 140 bushels per acre. The tide flaps about Samish are noted for great crops of oats.

From all over the state comes good tidings as to the condition of fruit trees. The healthy and sound growth will materially aid, with prospects, in an immense crop for next year. This added to a complete clean-up of all old fruit, makes a flattering prospect for the fruit grower.

Why don't the farmers of this western country raise rape seed. It is one of the things that can be safely grown here. The fact that all our rape seed is imported should be at least an inducement, when we have the only climate where rape seed can be fully matured in America.

What is variously called "lung disease" and "hog cholera" is killing swine by the thousands in Yankton and Hughes Counties, S. D. A telegram from Pierre, Oct. 18, says it is estimated by stock-handlers in the southeastern portion of the State that cholera has, up to the present time, killed at least 30 per cent. of the hogs.

A dispatch from Dubuque, Iowa, says that the commercial agent of the Illinois Central Railway Company, has sent in his report as to the ravages of hog cholera along the Central's lines in Iowa. He reports a loss of 40 per cent of hogs from Jessup to Fort Dodge. The disease prevails at Alden, Iowa Falls, Williams, Blairburg and other points. The loss is fully 50 per cent. Farmers are alarmed and are shipping unfattened hogs to market.

There were so many exhibits of butter entered in competition at the Minnesota State Fair this year that the awarding committee, composed of two of the most expert butter judges of the far East, used up two days in separating the best twenty exhibits from those of poorer quality. The third day was devoted to determining which of the twenty were entitled to the first, second, and third premiums.

There are many things that will cause a shrinkage in the milk which cannot be recovered afterward. Among them are dry and scanty pasture, without a suitable supplementary ration; the chasing dogs, keeping them from water until they will race to get it, and then they will gorge themselves; in short, anything that tends to disturb the even tenor of their ways. The handling of the cow should begin with the calf, and if continued habitually and gently the operation of milking will be regarded as a relief, instead of something to be avoided or resisted.—Milk Reporter.

The Arkansas Experiment Station has discovered a new mixture to kill lice on fowls and animals. They call it kerosene extract of pyrethrum. One and a half gallons of kerosene are soaked through two and a half pounds of pyrethrum (Persian insect powder) forming a yellow, oily extract. Dissolve one pound of soap in one gallon of the extract and churn till thoroughly emulsified. When using, mix one pint of this emulsion with four pints of water. This mixture combines the properties of kerosene and pyrethrum and is cheaper and more convenient than either. It is a splendid spray for either sucking or biting insects on plants or trees.

How to Kill Poultry Lice.
Take lime enough to make a light whitewash and when thoroughly well mixed, stir in a good portion of kerosene oil and mix well. After thoroughly cleaning your poultry house take a common spray pump and spray the walls and nests with the liquid. In this way you can more surely saturate every crevice. Should there in a few days be any signs of more lice give them another dose. This is the most satisfactory way yet to rid a ranch of vermin.

How to Make Limburger Cheese.
The curd is made by aid of rennet in the usual way, then cut up and placed to drain in a perforated box lined with a linen cloth. When the whey has drained off, salt, parsley, tarragon, and small onions washed into pulp are added, and well mixed with the curd. It is then put into moulds and left to drain for thirty six to forty-eight hours; then the cheese is taken out of the mould and placed in a well aired room, at a temperature of 65 to 70 degrees F., on an osier hurdle covered with wheat straw, where it remains for six or eight days. It is then salted and placed in a cellar upon shelves covered with fresh straw. The salting is repeated after two or three days, after which the cheeses are merely turned from time to time.

Strawberry Plants.
Strawberry plants have a tendency to go to their wild state, and unless they are bred up and kept free from diseases that are weakening to the constitution of the plants they will not be able to produce a profitable crop of berries. More intending growers of small fruits have failed from setting weak plants that from any other cause. The simple fact of the matter is this: If you want a large crop of berries, set nothing but healthy, vigorous and robust plants, of some reliable variety that is adapted to the locality and climate where you wish to plant. The culture of small fruits is very simple for the ordinary grower home use. But that business, like every other branch or profession, requires constant study. No person can ever make it a paying business unless they adopt systematic and practical rules. After plants are set, cultivate freely. Keep all weeds exterminated; keep runners cut from plants, as the runners draw the vital strength from plants, it will be evident that the success of small fruits depends upon the integrity of the grower.
