ON THE GRID-IRON.

Notes of the Games and Players Participating in the Sport.
Ideal foot-ball weather!
Pacific College at Newberg, evidently has a very good football team this year. About ten days ago they defeated the McMinnville team with a score of 54 to 0. However, they will not participate in the Intercollegiate football tournament.

The game to have been played in Salem last Saturday, between the Chemawa and Willamette University teams, did not take place, owing to the failure of the Chemawa team to "show up." However, the boys may yet play.

Chester Murphy, who so acceptably filled the position of captain of the Willamette University football team last year, is winning considerable fame on the California gridiron. He is at present captain of the freshman team of Stanford University, which so badly defeated the Berkeley freshmen team last Saturday, with a score of 14 to 4. Mr. Murphy is in correspondence with members of the Salem team, and kindly keeps them informed as to the latest football tactics, which are utilized by the local team to the best possible advantage, under the existing circumstances.

On next Saturday afternoon the University team expects to go to Monmouth and play a match game with the team from the State Normal school, located at that city. The boys expect to make the trip in Basey's wagonette, and an interesting game is anticipated, should the weather be pleasant, a great many Salemites will probably accompany the team, and "whoop 'er up!"

Last Saturday afternoon the O. A. C. team, of Corvallis, played a practice game of football with the U. of O. team at Eugene, in which the "farmers" were defeated, the score being 2 to 0. The game was very close and exciting. The game gives evidence of a remarkable improvement on the part of the Corvallis team or, on the other hand, a weakening of the Eugene team. However conclusions may be drawn from the result of the final game. Speaking of the game the Eugene Guard comments as follows:

"W. U. of Salem, one of the strongest teams last year is weakened this season by the loss of some of its best material. O. A. C., of Corvallis, which did not put up so good a game as desired last year, has been reported all along to be much stronger this year. U. of O. of this city, has received more scientific training this year than last and is composed of equally as good material as it was last season. The U. of O., who hold the state championship, have believed all along that the fight this year for the championship would be with O. A. C., hence the result of Saturday's game, which is in reality only a practice game, was looked forward to as a forecast of the result of the final game of the series.
