SENATORIAL BATTLE.

The Fight Has Been Opened at Salem.

SENATOR M'BRIDE IN CHARGE.

Recapitulation of the Next General Assembly.

In a hot contest the gold and silver forces in the next legislature are almost a tie.

The fight for the next Oregon senatorship has begun at Salem. The arrival of Senator Geo. W. McBride in this city, and numerous conferences of party leaders with this chieftain, the former secretary of state, are held at his headquarters, at the residence of this brother-in-law, B. F. Giltner. Senator Galbraith, of Yamhill, and ex-Senator Cogswell, of Klamath, and Representative Benson, of Josephine, were callers today. Senator McBride's success as the compromise candidate makes him the available man to harmonize the contending factions of Oregon Republicanism. Mr. McBride's long reach in Oregon politics has been frequently demonstrated.

In the above configuration W. H. Nosler is counted as a member, but it is claimed his seat will be contested, on the ground of insufficient residence in the state. Mr. Nosler must have had assurance of his being able to hold his seat or he would have withdrawn in time to hold an election. It is presumed that Mr. McBride is managing Senator Mitchell's candidacy. The two senators are warm personal friends. Their principal backers are the same men. Whether the combination will win remains to be seen.

THE JOURNAL on behalf of the silver voters of Oregon can only hope that no gold standard senator will be elected. Outside of the corporation's influences of Portland, in both congressional districts, there is an overwhelming silver sentiment. THE JOURNAL voices only the sentiment of the people, in demanding the election of a silver and people's senator, a man free from corporation control. It has no choice among candidates who represent the corporations and the gold standard. One of that class may be better than another but the common people have little or no preference as between them.

H. P. McNARY'S RECEIVERSHIP.

Not Acceptable to the Creditors of the Williams and England Bank. Now Ladd & Bush, George Collins, Ed. Hirsch, J. S. White and Fred S. Williams petition in the circuit court for removal of H. P. McNary. As creditors they allege that he is an unfit person to act as receiver.

The Williams & England Banking house closed its doors one year ago today. The day after the State Insurance Co. closed.

THE FACTS SET FORTH in the petition by the principal creditors are that he was cashier from the start and was not a proper disinterested person to appoint receiver.

That as cashier he was principal manager of the bank and most responsible for its financial troubles. That he was director, stockholder and creditor and in sympathy with stockholders who have not paid their stock and is protecting them.

That he is not impartially managing the affair in the interest of creditors. That he is not impartial, that a year has elapsed and he has collected less than one-fourth of the assets.

That he is indifferent to the management of his trust, is extravagant and wasteful, in keeping an office and hiring counsel.

That creditors ask to name a receiver who will act without compensation, will rent the building and cut off salaries of attorneys.

That present receiver will cause loss to creditors and deprive them of their just demands against the banking corporation.

Judge Hewitt has not yet set a day for hearing.
