WHEAT AND SPUDS.—A number of
farmers are rushing off their wheat, as
indications are of falling markets.
Wheat prices have been high when
most of the crop was out of the pro-
ducer's hands. Potatoes are not likely
to go much higher as consumption is
regulated largely by cheapness.

BUYING PRICES.—A farmer was in
today and canvassed the stores for
prices. He found good dairy butter
would bring 20 cents cash. Eggs were
bringing 22 cents cash. Baled straw is
worth \$3 a ton, just what it was
worth two or three months ago. Pork
brings 3c to 3 1/2c dressed. The ten-
dency of prices is not upward he finds.

WATCH THIEF.

H. J. Horner, of Stayton, Precinct, Ar-
rested Last Evening.

Late Thursday evening Fire Chief
O. D. Hutton arrested, in the Western
precinct, one H. J. Horner, a mu-
litter, who resides near Stayton,
charged with stealing a watch from a
Commercial street jeweler.

He was arraigned before Recorder
Edes this morning, charged with lar-
ceny from a dwelling. The prisoner
pleaded "not guilty" and was ordered
to his examination to be determined
upon in the meantime. Before re-
ceiving the county jail Horner changed
his mind and was again brought be-
fore Recorder Edes and was placed
under \$500 bonds to appear before the
grand jury. The prisoner is in cor-
respondence with relatives, who re-
side near Stayton, in hopes that he
may raise the required bond and en-
joy temporary freedom at last.

It seems Horner entered a jewelry
store last evening for the purpose of
purchasing a time piece, but after
looking over numerous watches he
suddenly decided that he did not need
one. Soon after he had left the store
the proprietor observed that a watch
was also missing. Fire Chief Hutton
was immediately notified and soon
had his man located.

SNOW.

Condition of Willamette River—Boat
Movements.

The gauge at the O. R. & N. dock,
at 10 o'clock this morning indicated
a falling of 6 feet since 5 o'clock last
evening. This morning the river reg-
istered twenty feet above low water
mark this morning, and was falling
quite rapidly. Should the river fall
with the same rapidity today and
Saturday the O. R. & N. and O. C. T.
docks that were almost completely
submerged, can be occupied. The
boat agents at Salem have had tempo-
rary offices near the business center
of Salem since the "flood" began.

Boats that have been tied up for
several days, owing to so much water,
are now able to navigate on the upper
river, although they will be unable
to pass through the locks at Oregon
City until the river reaches the 16
foot mark.

At 9:30 this morning snow began
falling and continued almost without
intermission all day. The fall was
quite heavy, at times, the flakes being
quite large. Snow thus early in the
season is almost reliable assurance
that Oregonians may expect good
sleighing ere the winter passes away.
It is with considerable difficulty that
cars were operated during the snow
storm and should the storm continue
much longer the more difficult runs
will have to be abandoned by the
street cars.

several obstructions from the river
bed at Salem. As the river falls more
of these impediments to successful
steamboat navigation, present them-
selves above the surface of the water
and they will all be removed. After
a snag has been pulled from the river
bed it is towed up the slough and is
deposited there.

RESIGNS.

Rev. Farmer's Retirement From the
Baptist Pulpit.

A special business meeting was held
Thursday evening at the close of
prayer meeting, at which the reports
of the trustees were read showing the
indebtedness of the church and amount
necessary to be raised by January 1,
to pay maturing obligations. A com-
mittee was appointed to solicit sub-
scriptions and collect funds to pay
the amount due Rev. J. P. Farmer,
the pastor, and other incidentals,
after which Rev. Farmer presented
his resignation as pastor, which was
accepted and letters were granted to
himself and daughter.

Mr. Farmer will occupy the parson-
age until his successor is chosen, when
he expects to remove to some other
portion of the city, as he will make
his home among us for a time.
