SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Jack McAuliffe, the light weight champion and Jimmy Carroll, his old-time rival and three times his antagonist in the ring for that honor, met last night before St George's club in a tenround bout to forever settle the question of superiority.

At the beginning of the fight McAuliffe adopted rushing tactics forcing his opponent to the ropes repeatedly, but the pace was too hot to last, and at the end of the third round he had bellows to mend.

The men frequently indulged in conversation during the last few rounds, but in such low tones as to be inaudible to those at the ring side.

The consensus of opinion was that both men had outlived their reputations as fighters and that they had agreed to make it appear a genuine fight, but to avoid a knockout.

The Republican Leader Will Now Dine the Workers.

The big banquet at Hotel Portland Saturday evening (Nov. 21), to Hon. Sol. Hirsch, the State Republican chairman and virtually the Mark Hanna of Oregon, stirred political gossip to its greatest depths.

Judge Mallory, who was the speaker for the anti-Mitchell forces last spring in Multnomah county, expressed himself in Salem this week very bitterly against Mitchell—that he would ruin the party.

The big three are Dolph, Corbett and Mitchell, with a dark horse against Mitchell already agreed upon. Dolph claims the November elections indicated him on the money question.

The Oregonian and its benchmen are reading the Levitical laws to John H. Mitchell and he must kneel and kiss the golden calf tonight, or be cast into outer darkness.

It is claimed by Marion county Republicans, who will attend the banquet, that they have letters, in their pockets from Mitchell, written last spring to the effect that not for fifty elections would he compromise his personal convictions for free silver.

Liverpool Closes Four Cents Lower Than Yesterday.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 21.—Stocks of breadstuffs in the United Kingdom on the first of the month were but 10,000,000 bushels compared with 25,200,000 bushels a year previous. It is true that there is a large amount for the United Kingdom, and for orders, but visible stocks on hand would not supply the consumptive demand for a fortnight.

TEACHERS

State Association Coming.

But Will Not Assemble in the Legislative Halls.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Irwin has been agitating holding a winter session of the State Teachers' Association at Salem. The secretary of state will not consent to the use of the representative hall as a place of meeting.

Secretary Kincaid consulted the members of the legislature and about 90 per cent were opposed to holding an inaugural ball or any kind of conventions or grand lodges in the legislative chambers.

The teachers had a state association meeting in the summer at Newport. The law requires the state superintendent to hold a state teacher's association at least once a year.

REBELLION,

Cuban Situation Unchanged.

The Spanish Are Disappointed at the Result.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—There is no official verification of reports which have been current here and in London of a Spanish-Cuban armistice, and, in fact, every avenue of official information in Cuba is closed.

The United States, in the previous Cuban wars, sought to have adopted an agreement for an armistice. At that time, one of the chief difficulties in conducting peace negotiations was in securing the assent of the insurgents, and to this end Secretary Fish, on June 23, 1895, secured the signature of Morales Lemus, as "the authorized agent of the revolutionary party in Cuba," to a document agreeing to an armistice pending negotiations for a settlement. The settlement contemplated the independence of Cuba, and for this reason was not accepted by Spain, and the armistice failed.

PANAMA CANAL.

PANAMA, Nov. 21.—There has been much activity on the work on the canal during the last few months. Another batch of 150 laborers has arrived from the West Indies, and has been put to work on the Culabra cut. The steamer Castle Eden is daily expected to arrive at Colon with another consignment of 500 laborers from the west coast of Africa.

PROBATE.

And Other News Gathered at Old Marion's Cathedral.

Mrs. Olivia E. H. Holmes has been appointed administratrix of the estate of her husband Dr. H. R. Holmes, who died in Portland on October 21. Her bond for \$13,470 was also filed with the county clerk. W. H. Holmes and A. J. Sweigle acting as sureties. The deceased left property in Marion, Clackamas and Multnomah counties aggregating \$685,200. The widow is the only heir-at-law and resides at Salem.

RUNNING PER SCHEDULE.—Commencing with the north bound California overland which arrives in Salem at 6 a. m., trains over the S. P. railroad, resumed their regular runs this morning. There was no overland train passing through Salem last night. All water has receded from the track in the vicinity of Oregon City, and trains can now be safely operated over the whole road through the Willamette Valley.
