The receivership of the Portland Savings bank has been passed over to ex-Senator Dolph, and the firm of Dolph, Mallory & Simon are counsel for the receiver. Judge Denny expects to be absent from the city for some time on private business—probably to make a senator at Salem. Mr. Denny has been receiver now for two years and there is a balance on hand for the use of general depositors of \$4,826.42.

The Surgeon General of the Army has reported that the colored troops of the regular army surpass the white troops in physical condition, freedom from vices, are more temperate and gamble less, and in average weight and stature surpass both the American and foreign. There are 2009 colored cavalry along the Platte river and they endure the hard climate as well as any others. So much for the colored race.

Uncle Paul Krueger, of the Transvaal republic, demands \$5,000,000 of Great Britain as indemnity for the Jameson raid. After having been brought to time in the Venezuela boundary controversy by Uncle Sam it would be humiliating indeed to the British to have an old Dutchman with a calico necktie and who shames himself bring the tears to the lion's eyes. But it was Napoleon who said that men who governed others shaved themselves.

The Spokane Spokesman-Review is waging a vigorous battle against the annual distribution of railroad passes among the legislators and public officials of Washington. Strange to say, there are now state and county officials in that state who have the old-fashioned regard for the constitution of that state which says no passes shall be issued or accepted. But then Washington is a region of darkest Bryanism, of benighted Populism and rampant silverism, and as the Oregonian says, what can be expected!

We are glad that our friend "Protection" is coming to his senses. He says in his last editorial review that: "we today are tax ridden and at the mercy of political bosses and corruptings." So far the organized bossism of the day has proved successful and the primaries are usually so managed that the voter is relieved of all duty but to vote. All the peril that threatens the nation comes from this management of the primaries." Is he a reform candidate for the senatorship? We shall dedicate to him the second edition of our book on primaries.

Harper's Weekly tells Mr. McKinley that his message to congress on the 4th of March next shall reinforce the doctrine of "sound money" and organize his administration for the purpose of "reinforcing" that victory; that the present tariff "of an average of something like forty-five percent" under the Wilson bill is high enough, and "if the infant industries could thrive before the war on 20 percent they can now live on 45 percent protection." But Harper's assures us that Mr. McKinley "will have a good deal to say in behalf of the protective policy" in his message, but we are to infer he will do nothing on the subject of tariff revision only after "consultation with sound money Democrats." Mr. McKinley is not to call an extra session of congress, Mr. Dingley is not to even consider bringing in his tariff bill, the Wilson tariff will yield revenue enough with increased importations, etc.

The Des Moines, Iowa, News prints extended statements of how the Iowa Homestead, the leading farm paper of Iowa, that had always been a free silver paper, was bought up to come over gradually and carry its constituents with it to the gold standard. It is interesting reading, but it is nothing but what Mark Hanna did all over the country. With unlimited cash at his command he bought pages in the leading magazines and sent plate matter and illustrations to all the papers that would use them. But if we are to be made prosperous thereby, what's the difference? What does principle and conviction amount to when you can get prosperity by corrupting the politics of a great nation? And then besides didn't our brother and Evangelist Moody order us to hold union prayer meetings everywhere on the 8th of October? And didn't we assemble and pray that the wicked silverites might be consigned to outer gloom and that we might have not more money but better money? And was it not all done to uphold the honor and integrity of the nation? Now let us not complain at the way the victory was won.

The Salem Statesman, if it had not surmised before, realizes now what a trap it was caught in when it supported McKinley in the hope of getting protection for Oregon industries. It now cries out, "Oregon must have protection," and its only reply is the chuckle of the Wall street crowd that says "tariff be d—d," and the Oregonian echoes the cry. The Oregonian is consistent in insisting that the paper money must be retired and gold bonds issued to the amount of \$500,000,000. But that will destroy the Republican party, cries the Statesman, to destroy the legal tenders. The Oregonian says it may be necessary to destroy the Republican party to carry out Cleveland's idea of the single gold standard. The Oregonian and Cleveland are consistent and the Statesman was caught supporting a Wall street candidate because he was once a high protectionist. We weep with our friend but can not admire his judgment in falling in with the crowd he is now crying out against. Any man who voted for McKinley this year voted with his eyes open to contract the currency and issue bonds, just what the Republicans condemned for years, but this year were forced to swallow.

UNSUCCESSFUL.

General Weyler's Return.

He Fails to Carry Out His Program.

HAVANA, Nov. 25.—The unexpected arrival here of Weyler, from the province of Pinar del Rio without having been successful in bringing about an engagement of any importance with the insurgents under Antonio Maceo, is causing considerable comment here today and there are many rumors that there will shortly be important changes here. La Luchas, a correspondent in the field, had an interview with the captain-general previous to the latter's arrival here from Artimo. The captain-general was asked for an opinion as to the course of the campaign and said:

"I am content with it. We entered Rubio hoping to give battle to the combined insurgent forces and you know the result. They went southward, much to our regret. Maceo has gone towards Mercurras, Mavria and Corojal da Yaniguas. Nevertheless our columns, in two divisions arrived without firing a single shot and only saw about 150 insurgents in the woods near San Luis."

In insurgent circles it is said that the return of Weyler to Havana, with out bringing about an engagement with Maceo, is equivalent to a defeat of the Spanish forces, for the latter have completely failed to carry out their program mapped out by the Spanish commander, and he returned here in every way successful. It is asserted that the plan of Maceo was to avoid an engagement with the Spanish troops as he feels confident that the wearisome campaign, as conducted by the Cubans, must eventually exhaust the Spaniards and bring about a concession of all, or nearly all, the demands of the insurgents.

Lee in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Consul General Lee was at the state department Tuesday's. When asked as to the report that the Competitor printers had been tried at Moro Castle contrary to the protest made by him before he left Havana, General Lee said:

"I do not believe the trial has occurred. If it had, the facts would be speedily reported here by Vice-Consul Springer. There have been some preliminary steps towards trial and the depositions of the prisoners were taken, but further than this nothing has been done that I know of."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—A dispatch from Jacksonville, Fla., reciting a cipher telegram received from Havana in which it is stated that General Weyler was driven to return to Havana through fear, is discredited here. From the Spanish point of view it
