MILITARY.

The Adjutant General's Office Closed at Salem.

The office of Adjutant General Tuttle at the state house has been closed and cleared out by Secretary of State Kincaid and will be used by the legislature as a committee room.

General Tuttle maintains an office at Portland, where he keeps as clerk Sidney Collins, who is also brigade inspector on the staff of Brigadier-General Beebe. The official work of General Tuttle's office is very well done as Adjutant Collins served several years in the regular army.

To HILLSBORO.—H. P. Pinto, of the state penitentiary, left on Monday with Jos. ("Bunco") Kelly for Hillsboro. Kelly will serve as a witness in the murder case of State vs. X. N. Steeves, of Portland. Kelly is in the penitentiary, under a sentence of life, for the murder of Wm. Sayres, at Portland, a few years since and X. N. Steeves is now being tried as an accomplice to the cold blooded murder. While awaiting the arrival of the 2:20 local Kelly appeared the most unconcerned of any of the passengers. He seemed to be enjoying the cigar he was smoking and the short "vacation" he was having.

D. P. Thompson, of Portland, Mr. Goodall, of Union, and G. Wingate, of Astoria, members of the state board of equalization, arrived in the city this morning. The last named gentleman served as president of the board the past year.

Senator Geo. C. Brownell, of Oregon City, is understood to be the man to make the speech nominating United States John H. Mitchell as his own successor, in the session of the legislature next January. Senator Brownell also nominated Senator Dolph for re-election two years ago. He came to Salem a Silver man in 1895, went over to Dolph, and abandoned Dolph in the closing days of the session.

FORGERY.

\$20 Secured on a Check.

The Smooth-fingered Gentleman Suddenly Leaves Town.

"Chas. Fryer, of Rossland, B. C., is at the Cook Hotel" was the substance of an innocent personal that appeared in the personal column of Monday's JOURNAL. But it appears that Fryer is not as innocent by any means as the personal regarding his presence in the city.

Monday morning the man called on Rev. W. C. Kantner, pastor of the Congregational church, and introduced himself as a man of considerable capital in search of desirable property for the investment of his money. He suggested that the reverend gentleman give him a letter of introduction to one or more of Salem's substantial business men. Rev. Kantner was considerably interested in the man by this time by the apparent earnestness of the individual and complied with the request, granting him an introductory letter to Gilbert Bros. the Commercial street bankers.

In the course of two hours the man presented himself at Mr. Gilbert's place of business and went through the same preliminary conversation he had with Dr. Kantner, being extremely anxious to be informed of an investment that would insure satisfactory results financially. When about to bid "good day" he produced a check for \$75 drawn on a Tacoma bank bearing the signature of Rev. W. C. Kantner. Mr. Gilbert refused to cash the check since he doubted the genuineness of the signature. The stranger bid good morning and immediately left the bank.

Shortly afterward he put in an appearance at Bush's bank where he presented the check to Jos. Baumgartner, receiving teller, requesting that it be cashed. Mr. Baumgartner declined to comply with the request of the stranger, but suggested that check be left there for collection. But Mr. Fryer objected to this and as the only means that remained for securing any money on the worthless bit of paper, suggested that he be given a small allowance on the check. He was accommodated to the extent of \$20 when he properly endorsed the check and returned to the Cook Hotel but he has not since been apprehended.

The check was presented at the Capital National bank before Mr. Kantner had endorsed it, but an advance was refused.

About an hour later Mr. Gilbert happened in Bush's bank and in course of a conversation mentioned the presentation of the check at his place of business and inquired if the same had been presented there, when informed that it had he stated that he had just seen Dr. Kantner on the street, who denied having signed such a check, but admitted that he had granted the letter of introduction. This proved the affair to be a clear case of forgery and the police were immediately notified of the offense. Outgoing boats and trains were closely watched yesterday and today, but as yet the man has not been apprehended, although it is hourly expected.

IN THE STORM.—Horses and cattle suffered Monday in the sleet and rain. One team stood shivering several hours in front of the Postoffice in the sleet with plenty of blankets and rubber cloths to have covered the horses. Policeman Hutton found the owner by a warm stove and persuaded him to start home with alacrity. On the two horse and state house squares there have been named McKinley and Hobart and given the freedom of the city.

Salem City Politics.

In the matter of an independent move in city politics, the names of Wylie A. Moores and J. M. Payne are mentioned as candidates for city recorder, while W. T. Latourette, former policeman and J. E. Baker, former manager of the Goodale Lumber yards, are the only men in the field for marshal.

EQUALIZERS.

State Board in Session Today

Personell, Politics and Officers of the Board.

The state tax equalization board consists of nine members, who sit for thirty days at \$10 each per day.

Seventeen counties had up to this morning forwarded their assessment rolls, fifteen being yet delinquent in that regard as follows: Clackamas, Coos, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Josephine, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Linn, Marion, Multnomah, Umatilla, Wall, and Yamhill.

The state board of equalization met at the state house at 2 o'clock, in the room opposite the State Land office. Following were present:

W. C. Wells, of Prineville, Rep.; Robert Walker, of Bandon, Rep.; A. C. Aldron, of Lakeview, Rep.; J. H. Holland, of Vale, Rep.; O. P. Goodell, of Union, Pop.; D. P. Thompson, of Portland, Rep.; G. Wingate, of Astoria, Rep.

There was no dearth of candidates for clerk and pages. Last year the secretary and clerk were allowed \$10 each a day, and the boy page \$3. Some of the board favor cutting these rates in two.

After a short session this afternoon, in the absence of Messrs. Wingate and Goodale, the board adjourned until Wednesday, when they will organize. H. L. Wells, of Portland, for secretary, and Frank Davey, of Salem, for clerk, seem to be in the lead.
