CONVENTION

Of Salem City Republicans.

Dr. J. A. Richardson for Mayor and Ed. N. Edes for Recorder.

Chairman W. J. Culver called the Republican convention to order Wm. Waldo was nominated for temporary chairman.

Jo. Baker moved his selection be made unanimous. Carried.

Geo. F. Rogers put Walter Stolz in nomination for temporary secretary. On motion it was made unanimous.

M. W. Hunt moved a committee of one from each ward on credentials. Carried.

Jas. Kyle moved a committee of three on order of business. Carried.

THE COMMITTEES were announced as follows: Credentials: M. W. Hunt, J. A. Baker, Ed. E. McKinney, Frank Hughes.

Order of Business: Jas. Kyle, Ross Moore, A. Gesner.

A. N. Moore moved that a recess of 15 minutes be taken and to reconvene at the armory. Lost.

A recess was then taken for 10 minutes.

The delegates reported were those elected in each ward at the primaries.

The order of business provided for election of mayor, marshal, recorder, treasurer, city chairman and ward committees.

The temporary organization was made permanent.

Harvey Jordan named a man who he said was one of the foremost and most public spirited citizens of Salem.

He possessed rare ability and the dignity required to fill the office. He presented the name of Dr. Jas. A. Richardson.

Senator Gesner named E. M. Croisan. He was so well known as to need no introduction.

Chairman Waldo named Captain M. W. Hunt. He possessed ideal qualifications for the place. Mr. Hunt declined.

The chair appointed A. N. Moore and Claud Gatch tellers.

FOR MARSHAL. Mayor Gatch in a pleasant manner nominated Addison C. Dilley for a second term for city marshal. He had sat in a fraternal order with his candidate and he had never refused help when charity was asked. He had come to Salem a poor, friendless boy and had grown up there among us. He had a big heart and a good nerve—just the combination required for this office.

Capt. Hunt warmly seconded the nomination. His salary had been twice cut during his first term, but he had never murmured but done his whole duty like a man. Mr. Dilley was nominated by acclamation and without opposition.

Capt. Hunt named Geo. F. Smith, "a man whose health and business had been ruined by these Democratic times."

O. Harvey S. Jordan was made city chairman. Following were named as ward committee men:

Then bring only three from the third ward, it was announced that at 2 o'clock p. m. Thursday a caucus would be held at J. L. Freeland's store in the opera house block it was asked that the names of the men then named should be added to the list of delegates.

W. A. Osborne moved to proceed to nominate candidates. Lost.

Mr. McAfee moved to adjourn until Thursday evening at 8 o'clock at the same place. Carried.

INDEPENDENT CONVENTION. The citizens and good citizenship organizations—in other words, the plain people—met at per call Wednesday evening at the Foresters' hall to consider the question of nominating a city ticket.

C. P. Bishop, chairman of the joint session Tuesday evening, called the meeting to order, by stating that they had adjourned to meet at the Foresters' hall and proceed with the business in hand. Mr. Rigdon was duly elected to act as secretary.

Mr. McAfee moved a committee of three on credentials, when the chair appointed Messrs. A. F. McAfee, W. H. Osborn and I. L. Kimber.

Dr. Mott and Mr. Ashley White were appointed a committee on finance to raise funds for hall rent, which these gentlemen proceeded to do. Dr. Mott in a few moments announced a surplus, and the secretary was made treasurer to handle funds.
