POSTOFFICE

At Salem to Be Removed.

Postoffice Inspector Looking for a New Location.

The chances are the Salem postoffice will be moved from the present almost historical site, before the long-promised government building can be constructed.

Postoffice Inspector I. C. F. Gordon was in the city Friday, for the purpose of considering a new location. The inspector is long in the service, and does not make his presence or business known to the newspapers, but THE JOURNAL feels safe in saying a removal has virtually been decided upon. The government has through Mr. Gordon, considered the merits of all the available sites, and they are not numerous. There must be a side light and rear entrance. The building must be wider and deeper than the present.

The government has several locations in view, but of course would not disclose them. Mr. Gordon said for the number of persons who work the mails—nine at Salem—and the volume of business, the present quarters are inadequate to the needs of the government and the public. This is about all the most persevering interrogations could extract from the close-mouthed department official.

STIRRUP BOUND OVER.—Felix Stirrup, who was returned to Salem Friday afternoon and arraigned before Justice H. A. Johnson charged with larceny from a dwelling, waived his examination and was bound over to await action of grand jury in the sum of \$250 in default of which he is now in the county jail. The Statesman is mistaken in calling any man by name of Stirrup a German. It is more likely he is English.

Prof. Winkler Resigns.

Winkler, of the College of Music of Willamette university, has resigned but will fill his position until Christmas, after which time he will open a music studio at the Willamette hotel and will receive private pupils and classes in piano-forte playing, harmony, composition and piano-pedagogy.
