SENSATIONAL.

Not a Word of Truth in the Alleged
Bucketshop Frauds.

It is a cold day when the enterpris-
ing local reporter of the Oregonian
don't fabricate a first-class sensation
that as a rule rests on misrepresentation.

It is well known that some time ago
an error of one-half cent by an op-
erator who succeeded Wade cost several
wheat speculators some money. But
the error was traced to the incompe-
tent operator and the Salem "bucket-
shop" transferred its business to the
Postal Telegraph Co.

The Oregonian calls this "a Salem
Sensation," and "Bucket-shop op-
erators likely to come to grief." The
article sent is as follows:

SALEM, Or., Dec. 8.—The "bucket-
shop" business in Salem has brought
its proprietors into trouble, as well as
its patrons to grief. The Western
Union Telegraph Company is also
implicated to the extent of relieving
its manager, E. S. Eller, today, and
replacing E. C. Holinger, in charge.
The proprietors of the "bucket shop" are
P. P. Talkington and James Bot-
tger. It seems a thriving business has
been done lately, and there have been
some pretty heavy losses. There are
allegations of fraud, which, it is
charged, was made possible by bogus
dispatches that the Western Union
manager permitted to be sent on
the office blanks.

Frank Jaynes, the company's gen-
eral manager for the Pacific coast,
and William Dumars, manager, for
Oregon, are here today looking out for
the company's interest. It was decided
to relieve the manager until further
developments show him innocent of
any unofficial conduct.

There are several victims of the
alleged fraud, and a large sum of
money is said to be involved. The
firm of D'Arcy & Richardson has been
engaged as legal counsel, and sensa-
tional suits may follow.

General Manager James has done
Mr. Eller, the Salem manager of the
Western Union a great wrong, and
will have to make reparation.

None of the regular customers of
Talkington, Bottger & Co. are com-
plaining of losses or frauds.

A RETRACTION.
Following in the nature of a retraction
appears in today's Oregonian:

Salem, Or., Dec. 9.—Legal proceed-
ings have not yet been instituted in
the "bucketshop" affair. D'Arcy &
Richardson are counsel for a number
of victims of the alleged fraud, but it
has not been made known what
course will be pursued.

There are different rumors as to the
amount lost through deals within the
last few weeks. The alleged losses so
far made known amount in the aggre-
gate to about \$6000. It is said other
claims are kept back from the public.
Talkington & Bottger, proprietors
of the business, claim patrons have
sustained no loss through investments
made upon misinformation of "fake"
dispatches.

It seems that Talkington & Bottger
had taken their patronage from the
Western Union Company and were re-
ceiving reports of the fluctuations of
the Chicago grain market over the
Postal system. E. S. Eller, former
manager of the Western Union office,
admits of the office blanks matter
furnished by Bottger, but claims it
was represented to him as being made
up of genuine Chicago dispatches re-
ceived over the postal wires. This
Eller claims, was done as an accom-
modation to Bottger, who also repre-
sented that the firm had a corre-
spondent south, to whom the dispatches
were mailed. The matter pertaining
to be dispatches copied by Eller, were
on the postal blanks, and it is alleged
that "fake" dispatches were also
copied on Western Union blanks from
Bottger's handwriting. The
manager of the postal office says only
eight messages have been received by
Talkington & Bottger, from their
Chicago correspondent, since the
"bucketshop" patronage was trans-
ferred from the Western Union to the
Postal system. Copies of these mes-
sages are preserved in the office.

Eller's friends believe him honest
and hope that when the cases are ven-
tilated in court he will be exonerated.

HIS GRIP WAS STOLEN.—W. R.
Watson, a San Francisco traveling
man, last evening lost a grip contain-
ing besides numerous other things
\$75 in cash. Awaiting the arrival of
the southbound overland Mr. Wat-
son placed his grip just beneath the
ticket office window while he went to
the baggage room to look after check-
ing his trunks. Returning to the
waiting room it was discovered that
some one had stolen the grip. It is
supposed to be the work of tramps,
that undesirable element being pres-
ent at the depot, daily, in large num-
bers.

Chicago Wheat Goes Down.

Liverpool Wheat Market Is Advanc-
ing a Little.

Talkington's circular, Salem, Dec. 9:
The news from Argentine has been
the principal inspiration of the bulls
this week. There has been a great
deal of uncertainty as to the outcome
of the crop, but it seems reasonably
sure that the damage from locusts and
other causes has been sufficient to re-
duce the yield materially, and where
an export surplus of 30,000,000 was fig-
ured on, there is now a probability of
less than 20,000,000 bushels. This will
make it necessary for European coun-
tries to look to America for between
15,000,000 and 20,000,000 bushels, not
heretofore counted on.

THE MARKETS.
Indications are that hops and wheat
have touched the top of the market.
Close reading of wire reports and for-
eign mails shows shortages of wheat
have been adjusted from the surplus
stocks of other countries, and consump-
tion continues low. There is no basis
for a continuation of higher prices,
and predictions of declines have a
substantial bottom.

Salem feed stores offer only 36c cash
for oats, but the demand is such that
THE JOURNAL is compelled to hold to
the belief that they will go consid-
erably higher.

The market is bare of shorts, and
chopped feed, and active demand from
Eugene City to Puget Sound.

Good baled cheat and timothy is
advancing, as well as first-class straw.

PORTLAND MARKETS.
Oregonian, December 10: The
damage to the potato crop is quite se-
rious and will mean quite a loss to
the Northwestern farmers, although
there is a prospect for the crop which
was uninjured brinning much better
prices than last year. Wool is quiet
and inactive, and hops are a trifle
lower. Hides are down a cent. Butter
and eggs are unchanged. Game and
poultry is weak at low prices. There
is not very much life in the local
wheat market, a condition due to the
fact that there is hardly enough
wheat yet unsold to make a very
lively market. The European markets
have failed to respond to the repeated
reports of a shortage throughout the
world, and the tenacity at which the
Old World markets hang around fig-
ures reached several weeks ago would
indicate that the limit had about
been reached. The same influences
which forced wheat from 50 cents to
85 cents in Portland are still in force,
but as the higher figure has been ap-
proached another element in the case
has appeared. Corn and rice and
other cheaper foods have taken the
place of wheat, and the lower classes
of the world who have through the
past few years of low prices become
accustomed to eating wheat products
are now forced to return to the
cheaper food, thus curtailing the de-
mand and restricting the advance.

ORDINANCE NO. 338.
A bill for an ordinance to amend Section 42,
of Ordinance No. 203, entitled, "An
ordinance to provide for the good conduct,
good order, health, peace and cleanliness
of the city and of persons, and for the pro-
tection of persons and property, and to re-
peal certain ordinances and parts of ordi-
nances relating thereto."
Be it ordained by the common council of the
city of Salem:
Section 1.—That section 42 of Ordinance
No. 203, entitled "An ordinance to provide
for the good conduct, good order, health,
peace and cleanliness of the city and of per-
sons, and for the protection of persons and
property, and to repeal certain ordinances
and parts of ordinances relating thereto be
amended so as to read as follows:
Section 2.—That no person under the age
of 17 years shall be permitted to go abroad
upon, or wander about the streets, alleys or
public parks or the city after the hour of 8
o'clock at night during the months of Sep-
tember, October, November, December, Janu-
ary and February, or after the hour of 9 o'clock
during the remainder of each year, unless
such person shall have the permission, in
writing, of his or her parents, or guardian, or
shall be accompanied by such parent or
guardian, and it is hereby made the duty
of the city marshal to warn all such persons
by causing the university bell or some church
bell of the city to be rung at fifteen minutes
to 8 o'clock at night, each and every night
during the months of September, October,
November, December, January and February,
and at fifteen minutes to 9 o'clock at night,
each and every night during the remainder
of each year, and all persons who shall vio-
late the provisions of this section shall be
deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon
conviction thereof before the city recorder
shall be punished for the first offense, by a
public reprimand, to be administered by the
recorder; and for each succeeding offense by
a fine of not less than \$5, nor more than \$50,
and costs of the action; and in all cases where
such person shall fail to pay any fine imposed
upon him, under the provisions of this section,
he shall be imprisoned one day for every \$5
dollars of such fine.
