AGRICULTURE.

New Members Appointed on the State Board by Governor Lord.

Governor Lord has named the following as members of the Oregon state board of agriculture: Z. F. Moody, of Wasco county, to succeed J. H. Gray of Crook (who has been elected sheriff and requests the governor to make another appointment), for a term of four years, from December 1, 1895; S. H. Holt, of Jackson county, to succeed himself, for a term of four years, from December 1, 1896; Frank C. Baker, of Multnomah county, to succeed William Galloway of Yamhill for a term of four years, from December 1, 1896.

These appointments will meet with general approval. They represent the different sections of the state and in Senator Holt, Governor Lord has recognized one of the most conservative populists of this state. He is a farmer and will do all in his power as will the other gentlemen, to make the work of the State Fair board acceptable to the farming interests of the state.

Frank C. Baker, the well known ex-state printer, will prove a strong member of the board. He is a born manager of men, and possesses a rare degree of executive ability. Mr. Baker is enterprising, progressive and will leave nothing undone to make the fair a great success.

Ex-Governor Moody of Wasco is really a resident of this city ever since he was executive, although he has retained a political residence in Wasco county. He is an enterprising and obliging official and a strong man on the board.
