

THE FUNDING BILL.

Oregon has a tremendous interest in the bill to fund the debts of the Pacific railroads and virtually extend the time indefinitely for payment of \$90,000,000 debt at a low rate of interest. How will her congressmen and senators vote on this question? The San Francisco Examiner says:

The foundations of the Funding bill were laid when, on July 1, 1862, the President signed the Act to promote the building of a transcontinental railroad from the Missouri river to the Pacific ocean. By this Act the Union Pacific was chartered, and with the Central Pacific Company was given the right to construct a railroad that should form a continuous line across the continent. The Act gave a right of way 200 feet wide across the public domain, alternate sections of the public lands within twenty miles on both sides of the road, and a direct subsidy of thirty years' 6 per cent bonds of the United States to be issued in certain proportions as the construction of the road proceeded. These bonds were to be secured by a first mortgage on the roads.

Under this Act, except to put a strong lobby in Washington, through the influence of which the Act was amended July 2, 1864, to allow the roads to issue first mortgage bonds to the same amount as the bonds allowed by the Government and secure the Government bonds by a second mortgage. The companies were given more favorable terms in other ways. Under this Act construction went rapidly forward. The promoters formed themselves into construction companies, to which, as railroad directors, they voted themselves as constructors, the bonds, stocks and money raised on the basis of the roads. The amount advanced to the Central Pacific by the Government was as follows:

The total advanced for all the roads was \$64,623,512.

By a decision of the supreme court payment of interest on these bonds was not required of the companies until the bonds fell due, and the government has had to pay the 6 per cent for the thirty years, with only such repayments as it could secure from the transportation charges and the 5 per cent of the net earnings. During the life of the bonds the sinking fund of the Central Pacific has grown till it is now \$6,952,674.59. This covers the payments falling due in 1895 and most of those for 1896, but in 1897 the government must draw on its own resources to settle the bill. It has already settled for the \$109,178,231.79 in interest that has thus far fallen due on the subsidy bond. (Of this sum, \$48,593,478.98 was advanced for the Central and Western Pacific.) Of the total due to interest \$28,894,704.67 has been repaid in transportation service by all the companies and \$1,103,619.75 in cash payments from 5 per cent of net earnings. There is now due \$64,623,512 in principal of the

debts and \$79,179,007.37 in interest paid by the United States, and due from the companies as the bonds mature. The debts of the Central and Western Pacific to the government, principal and interest, are now, in round numbers, \$60,000,000. The roads propose that the government should redeem the 6 per cent bonds as they fall due, and accept from the companies a new second mortgage bond covering the principal and interest due and to fall due in the next two or three years. The refunding scheme contemplates the payment to the government of 2 per cent interest on these bonds by the companies, and such other payments, from time to time, as would extinguish the debts in a little under ninety years. The average yearly payments of principal and interest under the Huntington bill now pending equal about 24 per cent for the term the debt is calculated to run. As the government is paying 34 per cent in interest alone on the money it has already advanced on account of the subsidy bonds, the bargain offered by the companies is not looked upon as a good one for the nation. The government would lose about 14 per cent interest a year if all the payments of the Huntington bill were to be counted as interest, and would in the end have to pay out of the treasury the money it has borrowed to pay the interest and the money it must borrow to redeem the 6 per cent bonds that are now falling due.

An infant babe was found in the receptacle of one of the water closets on the upper floor of a hotel in Eugene. The hotel is one which has been closed for several months and is now being overhauled for reopening.

R. H. Gordon, of Looking Glass, is now down 143 feet with his artesian well, and the flow of petroleum is increasing. Professor H. O. McClure, of the state university, writes that the flow assays about 6 per cent crude petroleum.

According to the East Oregonian Pendleton has a colored boy black, who once was a preacher. He says he couldn't preach well, but he could shine boots equal to any one, so he made up his mind he would follow the latter profession.

On last Monday Prof. Edwin Morrison, of Newberg, received through the mails a live bat all the way from Southern California. It was sent by Edmund Robinson, from Artesia, who is always ally to the interests of Pacific College.

Superintendent Hubbard, of the Clackamas hatchery, expects a shipment of 3,000 young salmon from the station at Battle Creek, Cal., this week. The Clackamas hatchery now has 800,000 young fish in the hatchery trays, many of which are nearly ready to be turned loose.
