"MEDIC'S"

Of the Willamette University

A Flourishing Department and a Live Faculty.

Few persons are aware of the steady growth and good work done in the Medical college of Willamette University since its removal to Salem about a year ago.

This department has a faculty of eighteen professors, a full four-year professional course, and an attendance of twenty-five students, including four ladies. It has an equipment of anatomical specimens, botanical and chemical cases, collection of herbs and chemicals, manikins, surgical instruments, department of dental pathology, operating room, clinic facilities, library, facilities for hospital practice, etc.

The school is now in the basement of the main building of the university. Most of the professors are gentlemen of high standing in the profession, many residents of this city holding responsible positions in public institutions, substantial citizens of the best character, association with whom is in no wise detrimental to the young gentleman and ladies who are students.

A LECTURE HOUR.

The lecture for the hour the reporter spent there was on the text "omnino virum ex vivo" and while professional ethics do not permit eulogy of any one professor, an outline of the methods of imparting knowledge to physicians in embryo is not devoid of interest. One of the students puts the vital principle of the morning's discourse on the blackboard and then all attention is directed to dissection of the same.

"What are the antiseptic properties of coaltar?" Name the symptoms of inflammation," etc., etc., are some of the questions rapidly poured out and jotted into note-books. Authorities are cited and references are given by the learned professor, and the subject is impressed in a very interesting manner and gone over in all its bearings until it is virtually mastered. All Latin is rendered into common English, not to say Chinook, until the dullest can understand.

Homely practical illustrations taken from everyday life are employed in many of the lectures, while the members of the faculty, who are in daily practice, bring to their classes the freshest results of actual experiences with patients to illustrate and verify their theories.

Some of the most successful surgeons of the Capital city are lecturers, while one of the justices of the supreme court lectures on medical jurisprudence. The working hours extend from 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Many of the students are "working" their way and receive every encouragement. To say that all have to work is only the truth. The student who keeps up has no time to waste and the medical students of Willamette are not awarded diplomas for perfunctory performance of duties. Persons interested in the practical workings of a medical college will find the one at Salem an interesting place to visit.

OUR SATURDAY NIGHT.

There would be much less discontent in the world if we could understand what is real wealth. What right has one who is wealthy in real possessions, and is conscious of possessing that wealth, to be otherwise than happy and content? What are the primary elements of wealth? Anything to be wealth must possess value and must be desirable. Hence the saying, he has an elephant on his hands. It is only another way of saying that a person is poor. Honest poverty is greater wealth than dishonest riches. An Athenian general once spoke a noble sentiment. He had given the hand of his daughter to a poor but honest young man, in preference to a rich one of different character. He gave as a reason that in the choice of a son-in-law he preferred merit without wealth to wealth without merit. That was only another way of saying that merit was real wealth, and riches without merit, poverty indeed. Thucydides relates that Callias, the wealthiest citizen of Athens, was reproached with permitting his relative Aristides with his wife and children to live in great poverty, while he himself wallowed in riches. Aristides was summoned and declared that Callias had often pressed him to accept large sums of money, which he had obstinately refused to accept, declaring he had more reason to boast of his poverty than Callias had of his riches. Aristides showed that while many made good use of their wealth, but few bore poverty with equanimity, not to say magnanimity and devoid of feelings of envy and covetousness that no person had cause to blush at his poverty unless he had been reduced thereto by idleness or dissolute conduct. He went on to show that a man is wealthy in proportion as he suppresses the desire for superfluous things and confines the wants of his life to the necessities. He is freed from a thousand cares and left master of his time for the development of his talents, the improvement of his intellect and the service of his fellowman. It is related that as he ceased speaking there was a murmur of applause and not a person in the assembly but would have chosen to be Aristides the poor rather than Callias with all his riches.

Ruskin has given a noble definition of wealth as life "Life, with all its boundless capacity for joy, for hope, for admiration. That man is richest who having developed his faculties to the utmost, has contributed most to the happiness of his fellow mortals." The first impression of his definition of wealth carries with it the idea that it is better to be a live dog than a dead lion. Then observe the transmutation of the thought into the sublime ideal of joy, hope and love. First, the individual shall develop to his utmost. That is real wealth, but not the greatest. In honor preferring one another says the epistle.
