News at the State House.

Tax Rolls for 1896 Show Decline in Valuations.

The preliminary estimates of the valuation of property as shown by the assessment rolls is \$14,000,000 less than in 1895.

The regents of the State Normal school at Monmouth held their semi-annual session Friday and will submit a financial report to the legislature.

The long-delayed assessment rolls of Wallowa county reached the Secretary of State's office today.

B. S. Cook, of Salem, on recommendation of the Governor, was elected vice-president for Oregon, of the Omaha Trans-Mississippi exposition, June 1, to Nov., 1898.
