MARION COUNTY NEWS.

Items of Interest Gathered in the Court House.

John Manning, the Woodburn attorney, had business at the courthouse today.

The total volume of the floating county debt January 1, 1897, in form of outstanding warrants is \$75,000 in round numbers. As soon as taxes come in this will be reduced.

THE EXPERT'S REPORT.

W. S. Bozorth and W. I. Staley are closing up their work of experting the books of the county clerk's office for seven years back. Mr. Bozorth puts in all his time and Mr. Staley puts in only half of each day. Both get \$5 a day and will prepare a voluminous type written report which it is now thought will be submitted to the county court at the January term. Messrs Bozorth and Staley are doing very thorough work and will leave the books of all the county offices in perfect order.

SHERIFF SALES.

Between the hours of 10 a. m. and 1 p. m. today Sheriff F. T. Wrightman sold eight separate pieces of property on execution to satisfy judgments against the same. The eight sales were as follows:

In case of S. B. Crocker vs. Martha E. Adams et al, 220.45 acres were bid in by W. L. Vance for \$3,607.85. The judgment against the property held by Mr. Crocker only amounts to \$3000.

In case of P. A. Thomas vs. Geo. and Elizabeth Wright one acre on the Asylum avenue was sold to plaintiff for \$27. The judgment held by Mr. Thomas calls for \$110.75.

In case of Geo. W. Watt vs. A. L. Grimstead et al, 160 acres in section 10, township 9, south range 3, east was bid in by plaintiff for \$500.

In case of W. B. Peacock vs. R. and F. A. Reid 160 acres in township 8, south range 1, east sold to Mr. Peacock for \$550.

In case of First national bank of Halley, Idaho, vs. J. S. Whiston et al, 640 acres in township 7, south range 1, east sold to plaintiff for \$4,000.

In case of Ellen C. Glover vs. Jacob Dunster, 52 acres were bid in by plaintiff for \$470.53.

In case of the Northern counties investment company vs. Nancy Jane Lee, et al, one lot in Salem, was bid in by Plaintiff, for \$1,162.60.

In case of Breyman Bros. vs. Henry and H. C. Warren, 334 acres in township 7, south range 1 west, were bid in by plaintiffs for \$7,773.69.

MARKETS.

WHEAT.

Talkington, Bottger & Co's., circular for Jan. 2, 1897:

"We have, as is always the case with us, no predilection for either the 'bull' or the 'bear' side of the wheat question, but then we find the position of wheat to be so unusual as it undoubtedly is this season, we find it somewhat difficult to either think or to write other than in a confident tone upon the subject. When in fact we find the American visible supply this early in the season diminishing rapidly, and the primary receipts in the country 45 per cent less than last year. We are forced to the conviction that any moment within the next month or two demand may overtake the supply, a circumstance which in a season like this. When Europe wants so much wheat from America, becomes all the more serious on that account. Chicago May wheat opened at 83¢ and closed at 84¢ while cash sales were made a 80¢.

STATE HOUSE POINTERS.

People doing business for the state now have to wait till after the legislature for their pay. All money appropriated by the last legislature and remaining in the treasury on the 31st, was covered away or reserved for the next biennial term and cannot be drawn upon till the next legislature authorizes it to be done. This condition happens just after the first of every other year. While the state has plenty of money in the vaults there is, on alternate years, a period of two or three months that it is not get-at-able for current expenses.

Articles of incorporation of the Santiam Placer Mining Co., with W. S. Phelps, E. J. Daly and Edward Jager, as incorporators, were filed in the office of the secretary of state this morning. The object of the corporation is to do a general mining business in Oregon, with a capital stock of \$50,000. The Chas. F. Beebe company, to do a general merchandising commission business in Portland, capital stock of \$15,000, Chas. F. Beebe, Wm. D. Smith and Stewart B. Lithicum, incorporators, and the Silver Eagle Mining Co., to do a general mining business, F. A. Knapp, Wm. Jones and F. R. Strong incorporators, capital stock \$1,000,000, principal business office Portland, were also filed today.

The governor today appointed W. A. Wood, of Dent, Columbia county, a notary public for Oregon.

State departments observed New Years day as a holiday by keeping closed doors but in nearly every office heads of departments and clerks worked all day closing up business of the old year and preparing their reports for the legislature.

A Saloon Riot.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Jan. 2.—Two policemen were pounded half to death by a crowd yesterday, and two of their assailants were shot. The trouble was the result of a crusade, which the police have been waging against saloon-keepers, who have been violating the law.

Today Patrolmen Viergiver and Harrington found the saloon of Sommers & Treadwell doing a thriving backdoor business. As the officers entered the air was filled with clubs, bottles and glasses. Officer Viergiver was struck on the head and felled with a club. He was drawing his revolver as he fell, and as he fell he pulled the trigger.

Several shots were fired from the crowd and Harrington managed to get this revolver out and pulled it upon Treadwell, who was pounding him on the head with a bottle. The next-moment Harrington went to the floor. A great-crowd had gathered in front of the saloon and the excitement was intense.

A squad of eight policemen responded, with orders to arrest every one in the place, but most of the crowd had managed to slip away.
